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William L. Calhoun, 50 Succumbs to Long Illness

William Loren Calhoun, age 50, died Monday evening at his home in Culver after an illness of 18 months. He was born in Wayne, Mich., on July 9, 1900 lived in LaGrange, Ind., for 9 years and spent 3 years in Florida before coming to Culver in 1941 where he was employed as a baker at the Academy.

Surviving relatives include his widow, Edythe Marie; two sons, Robert and Richard both at home, and two half brothers. Funeral services will be held at one o'clock Thursday afternoon at the Easterday Funeral Home where friends may call. Rev. Meredith Sprunger will officiate and burial will be at the Culver Cemetery.

Circulate Petitions To Bond Twp. For New Grade School

Petition bearers are at work this week contracting freeholders throughout the township in their effort to get every property holder to sign the petition for the bond for the new grade school building.

The petitions for signatures are being carried under the direction of the Union Township Parent Teacher's Association. Mrs. Oscar Wesson, president, stated that it was hoped that workers would see freeholders in their respective areas at once so that the signed petitions can be presented at the earliest possible date. Carriers of petitions are working under the direction of nine captains appointed in various geographic areas in the township and the town of Culver.

Petitions were circulated immediately following the public meeting held last Wednesday evening at the Community Building where under the auspices of the PTA, the program and plans for the new building were discussed. Ralph Osborn, Jr. presided at the meeting where the need, plans, and methods of financing for the new grade building were presented.

Mr. Osborn presented Principal F. M. Annis who told of the need for the building in terms of the order of the state fire marshall and in terms of the enrollment factors. Leroy Bradley of Fort Wayne, architect, presented tentative plans for the building. These plans were carried in last week's Citizen. Maurice Curtis, trustee, discussed the various methods of financing.

Mr. Curtis explained that in 1947 arrangements were made for the establishment of a sinking fund. This was to extend over five years and will end in 1951. By the close of the coming year when the 75 cent levy expires there will be \$168,000 in the fund. With the addition of a 2 per cent bond levy on the civil and school township there will be a grand total of more than \$400,000 available for the building program. The bond issue would be for ten years.

It was pointed out at the meeting that the front wing, consisting of ten rooms and service rooms, will cost an estimated \$247,500. The complete eighteen room building which will meet the need for the grades is estimated at \$384,500.

Don Hand Victim of Unusual Accident

Christmas in one Culver home wasn't too pleasant even though every member of the family had carefully made plans for the day. At the Don Hand home plans for Christmas were jarred when Don was painfully injured in an unusual pre-Christmas accident last Saturday noon. Suffering from severe bruises, possible internal injuries and shock, he is progressing as well as could be expected at the Parkview Hospital.

Friends and neighbors, shocked at learning of the untimely accident, are rallying to the aid of Don to insure that his Soft Water Service will not suffer. Under the direction of Verl McFeely, Culver water superintendent, and Dr. Meredith Sprunger, some 50 men have volunteered to contribute an hour or more a day. Assignments are being worked out and everything will be done to carry on his business until he is able to return to work. Many of those who signed up will work evenings.

Shortly before noon last Saturday morning Don had returned to his place of business on East Jefferson Street after having made a service call. He was taking the mail out of the box on the front of the building when he was struck by a driverless truck which had been parked in the alley back of the restaurant. The heavy truck parked on the down grade came across Jefferson Street, veered slightly, hit the curb catching Don as it crashed into the building.

Although he half turned when the silent moving truck hit the curb it was impossible to escape the onrushing vehicle. The impact of the truck was hard enough to cave in the base of the building. Extricating himself, Don collapsed on the walk. It was feared at first that he had suffered possible severe fractures and internal injuries. Attended by Dr. Robert Witham, he was rushed to Parkview Hospital.

Mr. Hand is President of the Culver Town Board, Treasurer of the Reformed Church Board and he is active in various civic organizations.

Farm School Days For County Farms Begin January 18

School days begin again January 18 for farmers and homemakers in Marshall County. Extension specialists from Purdue University will be along with information on new developments in many fields of agriculture and home economics.

County Agent R. C. Harvey announces the schedule for this series of extension schools as follows: Farm Management School, January 18, all day; Farm Machinery School, February 27; Poultry School, February 13, afternoon, and Dairy Caravan, March 15, all day. Details of the schools will be announced soon.

Extension schools are sponsored each year by the county extension office county committees, and by Purdue. Specialists report on timely subjects requested by the counties.

Last year 505 persons attended the schools in the county. A total of 66,641 went to the 433 schools throughout the state, which set a new record for the 20 years they have been held. Attendance has more than tripled in the last 10 years.

Farm Account Books Available

Farm account books, prepared for Indiana farmers by the department of Agricultural Economics at Purdue University, are available now in the County Extension office, County Agent R. C. Harvey announced today. The books are on sale for a nominal fee.

Two types of books are provided, the agent said. The Indiana Farm Record Book is designed especially for income tax use by individual farmers. The Indiana Farm Account Book, for farm business analysis, is designed so that a complete summary of the business can be made, with provision for entries for both tenant and landlord. The latter also has an income tax section.

Bulletins on farm income for 1950 are available without charge in the extension office, which is located in the County Court House, Plymouth. Within the next month information on the social

security program as it applies to farmers, and applications for social security, may be procured in the office.

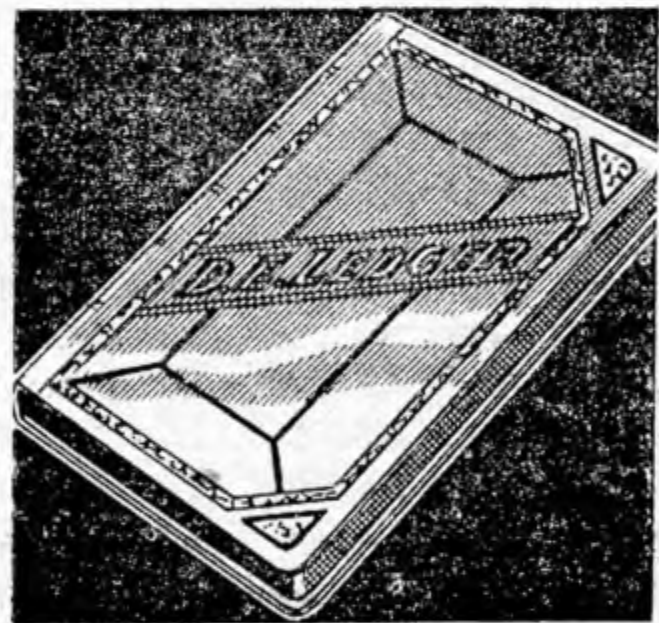

Literature Group Meeting

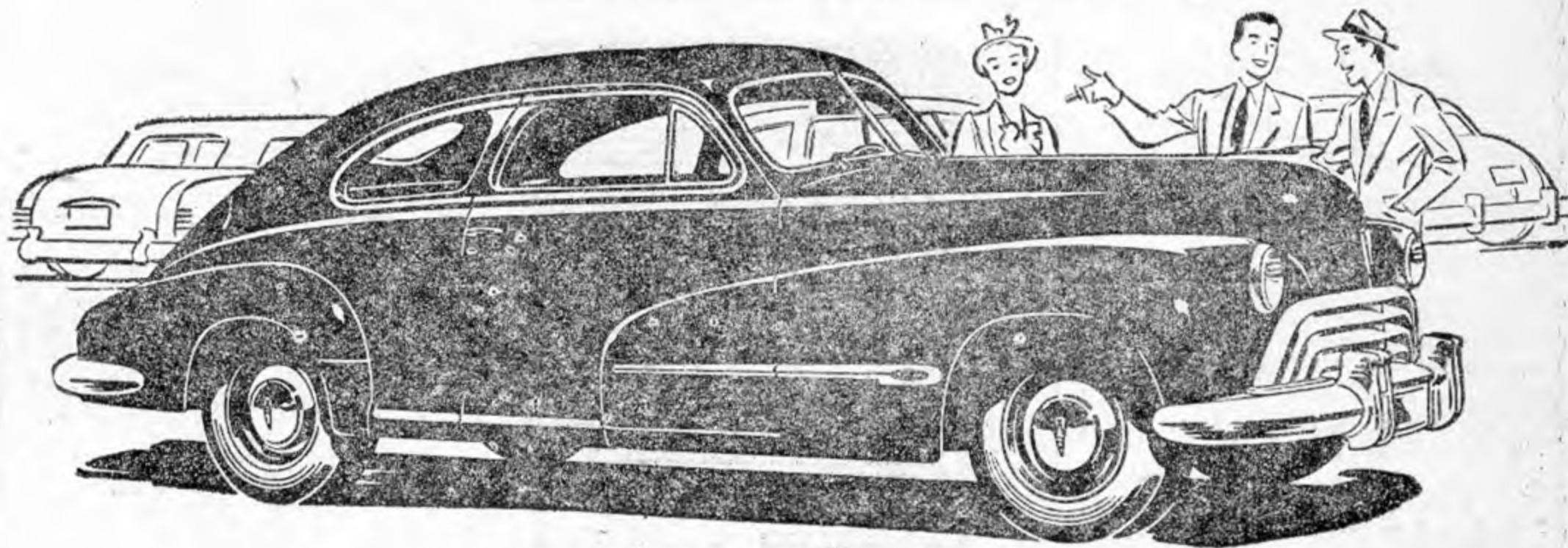

New Year Observed March 25 in England Before Calendar Change

Prior to England's adoption of the Gregorian calendar in 1752, New Year's Day was observed on March 25, and of course, New Year's eve was March 24.

The English always had a big time on New Year's Eve, and

after the Puritan government abolished Christmas and absolutely forbade any solemnization or celebration thereof, the people vented all their holiday spirit on the New Year.

Even after the restoration of the Stuarts brought about a revival of Christmas customs and traditions, Christmas never re-attained its former eminence; but New Year went right along, surviving Puritanism and later, in 1752, the switch in calendars and the date of its observance.

Curiosity And Hope Greet New Year

Curiosity and superstition always have greeted the New Year hand in hand with man's bright hope for the future.

In other years families sought a glimpse into the year just beginning by observing the 'dipping' custom. With his eyes closed, the head of the house opened the family Bible and indicated a passage with his finger; the text, solemnly read and interpreted by the family, was indicative of the luck—good or bad—that was in store.

Probably one of the most widespread superstitions concerned the "first-footer," the first person to cross the threshold on New Year's morning. Women and light-haired men were considered unlucky "first-footers," as were people who walked pigeon-toed.

In some villages, the superstition was taken so seriously that a dark-haired man was given the first footer job, and, going from house to house, he would be the first person to cross the threshold thus preserving the good fortune of the community.

Anglo-Saxons, believing that something might happen when the New Year burst in often climbed upon the roof on New Year's Eve so as to have a good view of any such event.

And we moderns make as much noise as possible, presumably because our primitive ancestors believed that noise would keep evil influences at a distance.

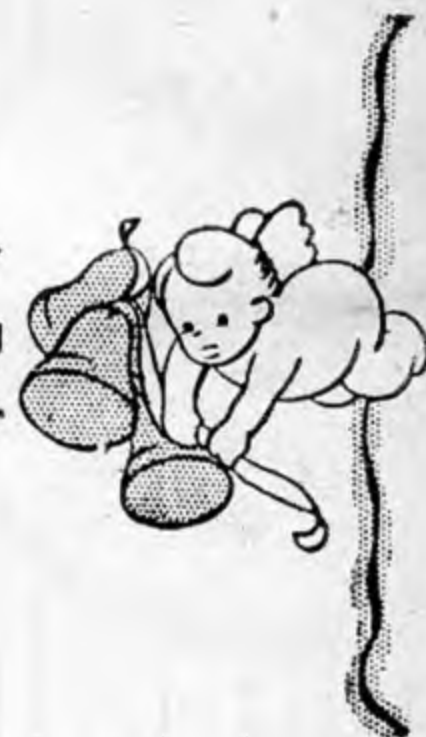

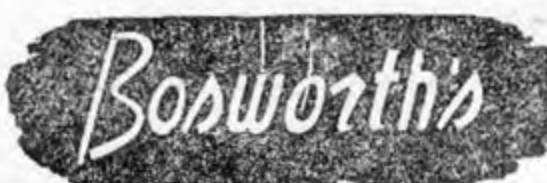

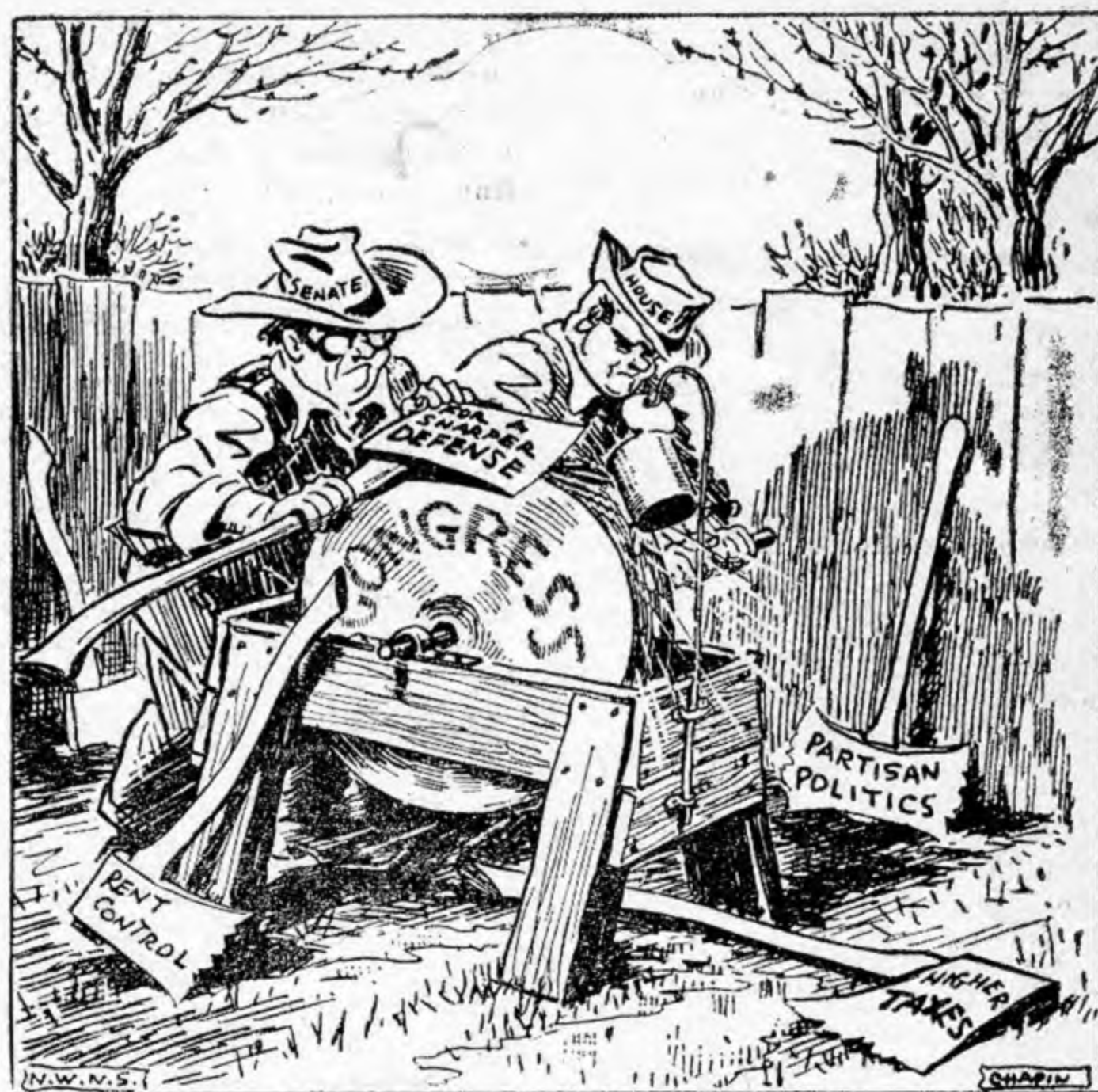

BACK TO THE GRIND



Hearty Breakfast Essential for Efficiency

Man's efficiency is lessened if he omits breakfast. Miss Opal D. Stech, extension nutrition specialist at Purdue University points out that studies have been carried on with men who ate a "basic" breakfast and those who ate none. The men who ate a breakfast of fruit, cereal, whole milk, sugar, two slices of toasted enriched white bread, butter and jelly

could do maximum amount of work. This breakfast was sufficient to furnish one-fourth of the day's food requirements of these men.

When these same men omitted breakfast, they complained about being hungry and also showed rather violent fatigue, especially after strenuous work. Some of them were dizzy and became nauseated. There was a significant decrease in the amount of work these men did when they had no breakfast and the majority also were slower in their movements. Many accidents occurred to them between the hours 11 and 12 a. m.

Similar results are shown in other studies. When individuals with the no-breakfast habit changed to a daily good breakfast routine, they found they could work through the morning without being tired. Often there was an improved skin condition. These same individuals were less nervous and had fewer colds.

The good breakfast should be adapted to the body's food needs, and furnish from one-fourth to one-third of the day's needs. Men who do more physical work need a protein, such as meat or eggs, added to the basic menu which was used in the quoted study.

to the times ever displayed. Entitled "Give Us the Faith and Courage of Our Forefathers," this fine poster portrays Uncle Sam kneeling in prayer with the light coming down from above. Painted originally for the Layman's National Committee of New York City, this Committee made it available on a public service basis to the Army and Air Force Recruiting Service for reproduction as a national Christmas poster. It has already had a most encouraging response.

Mr. Christy has done several posters for the Armed Forces, including "Freedom Is Your Business," which appeared nationally during October and November of this year. He has always exhibited a fine public spirit in commemorating the

paintings of notable events and historical personages.

One of his best-known works is the "Signing of the Constitution of the United States," which he was commissioned to paint by the Government. It depicts the signing of our Federal Constitution and is displayed at the Capitol Building, Washington, D. C. The painting is regarded as the greatest picture of that historic occasion ever created by any artist. It was viewed by millions of people while on display with the Freedom Train.

Recently, Mr. Christy, a native Ohioan, painted a mural depicting the life of Thomas Alva Edison. It was presented, with appropriate ceremonies, to the people of Ohio.

Howard Chandler Christy has painted many of the great men of this nation as well as many of the women leaders of society and civic affairs. He has also portrayed most of the great international leaders. One outstanding painting not yet made public is the signing of the United Nations Charter in San Francisco, in 1945.

Indians Win 43-40 Upset Over S. B. Washington
