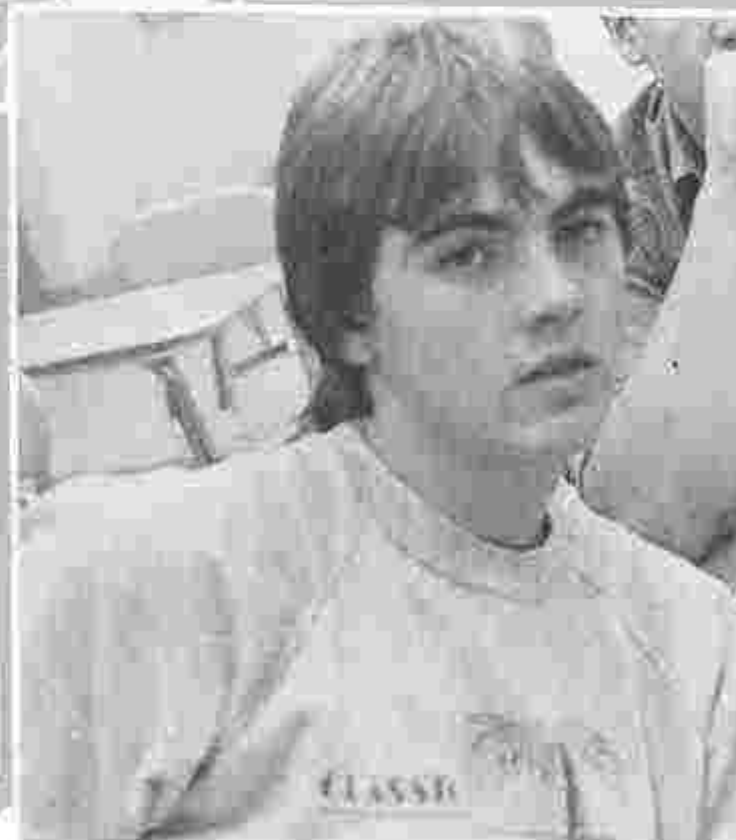

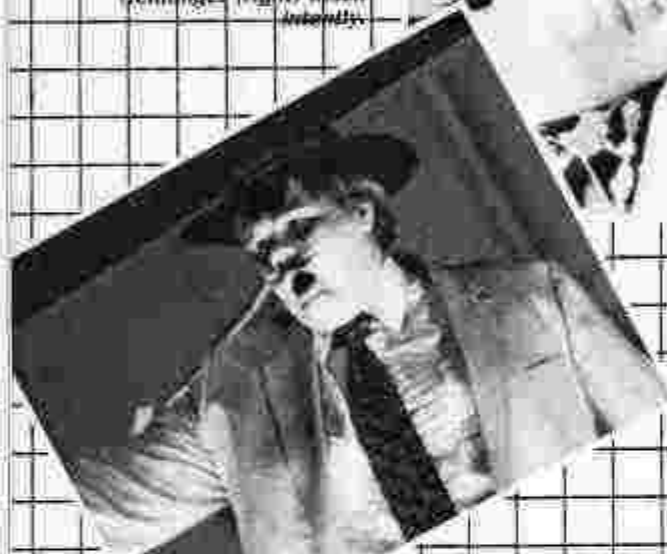

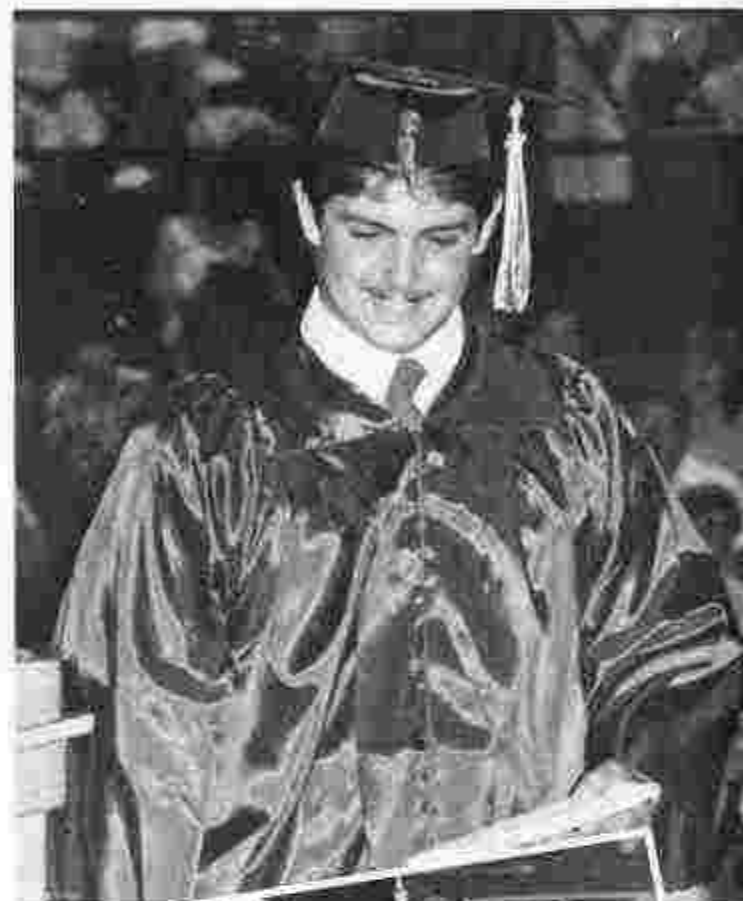

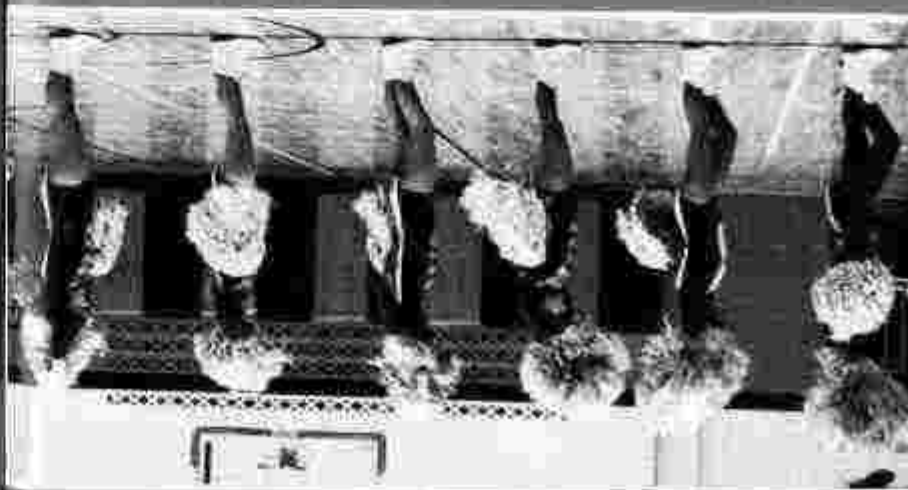

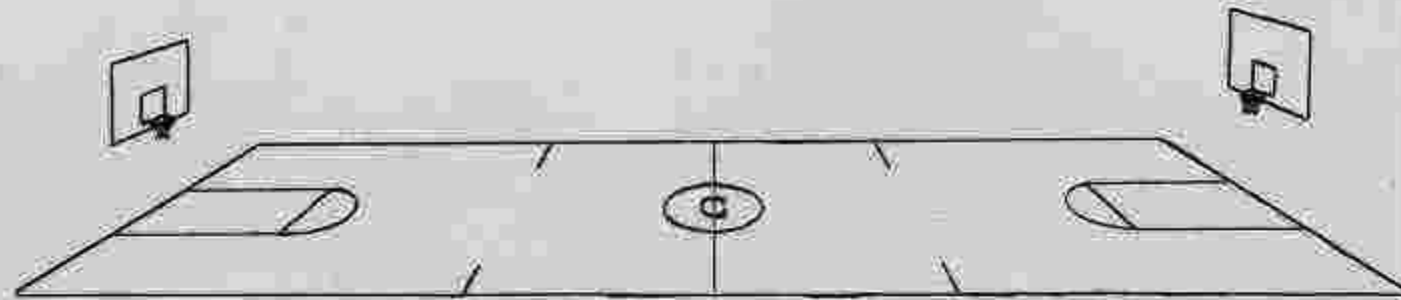

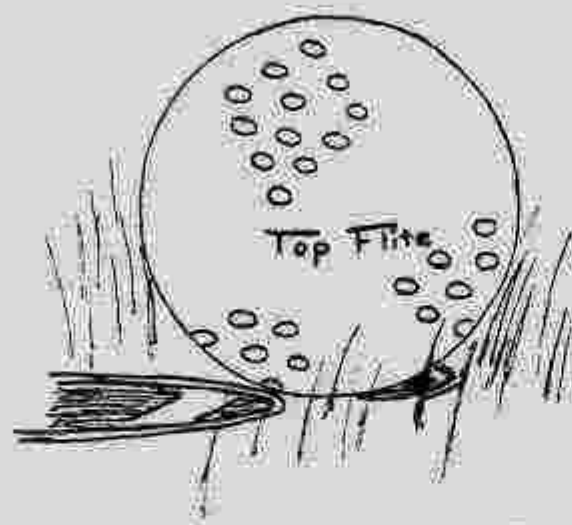

"Now, everyone stand up for your exercises. That's right — your exercises!"

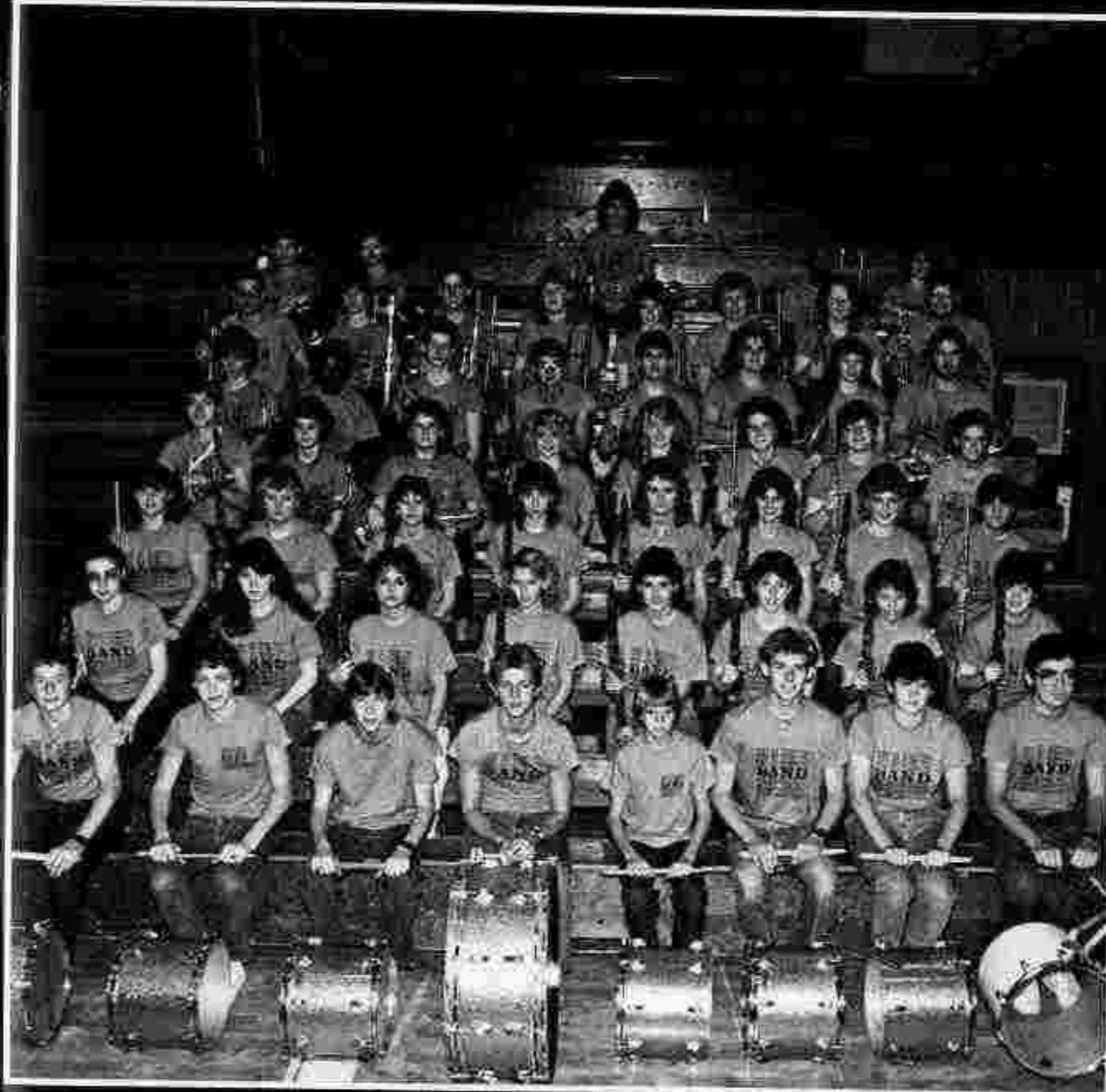
As the chorallers warm up their vocal cords to a C scale, the harmony is heard in the hallways.

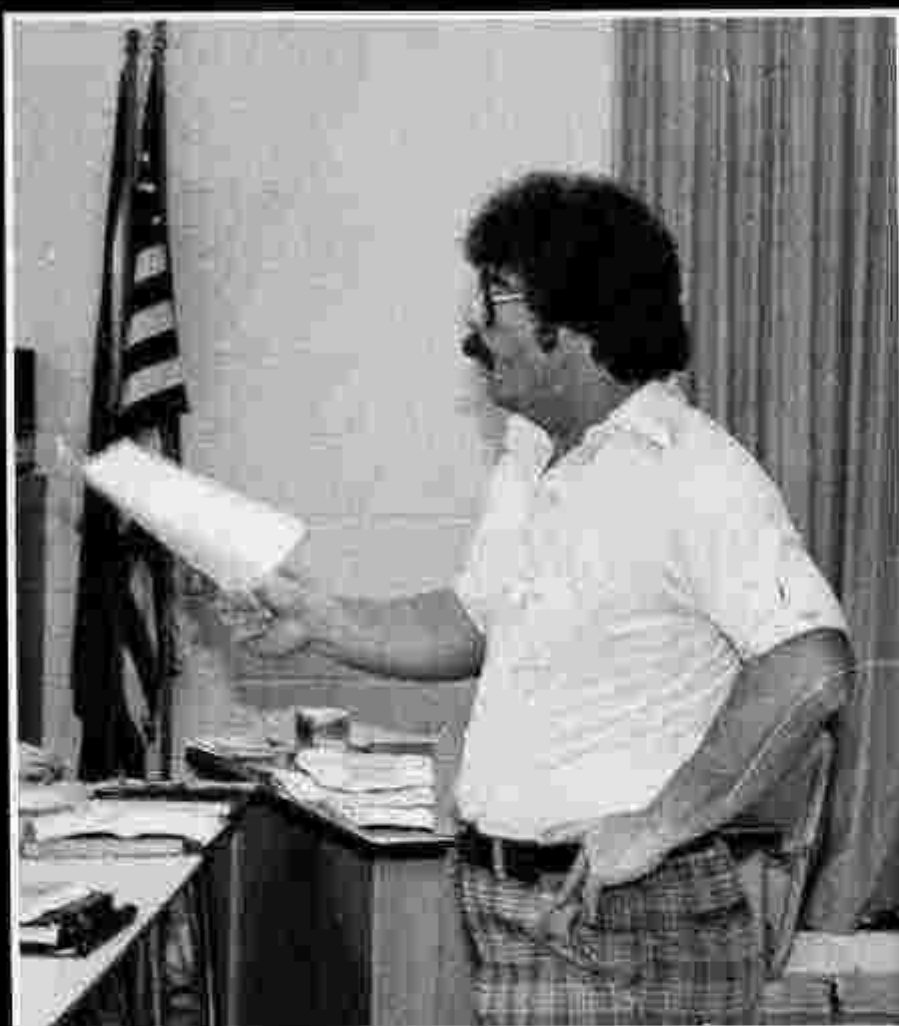

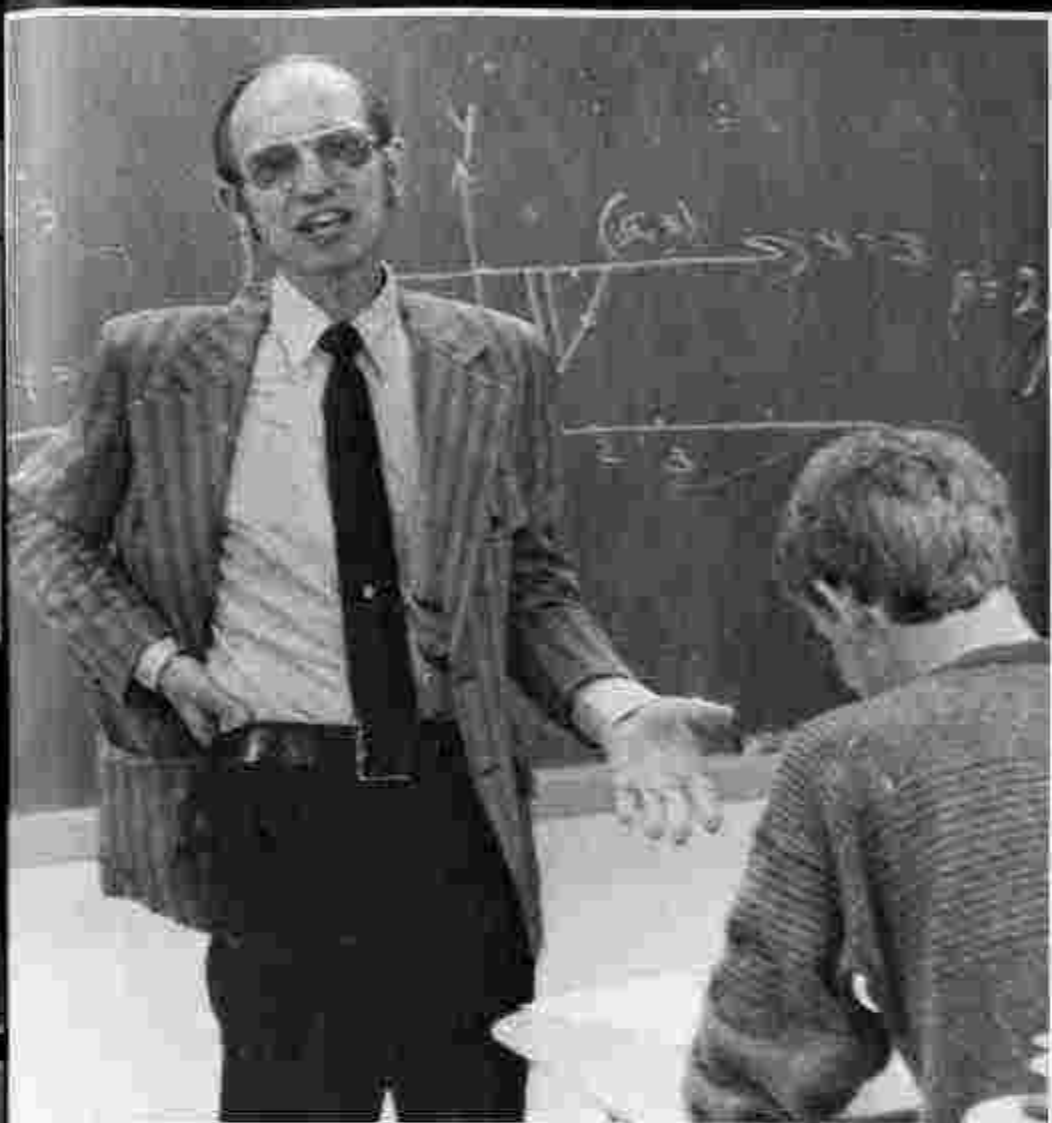

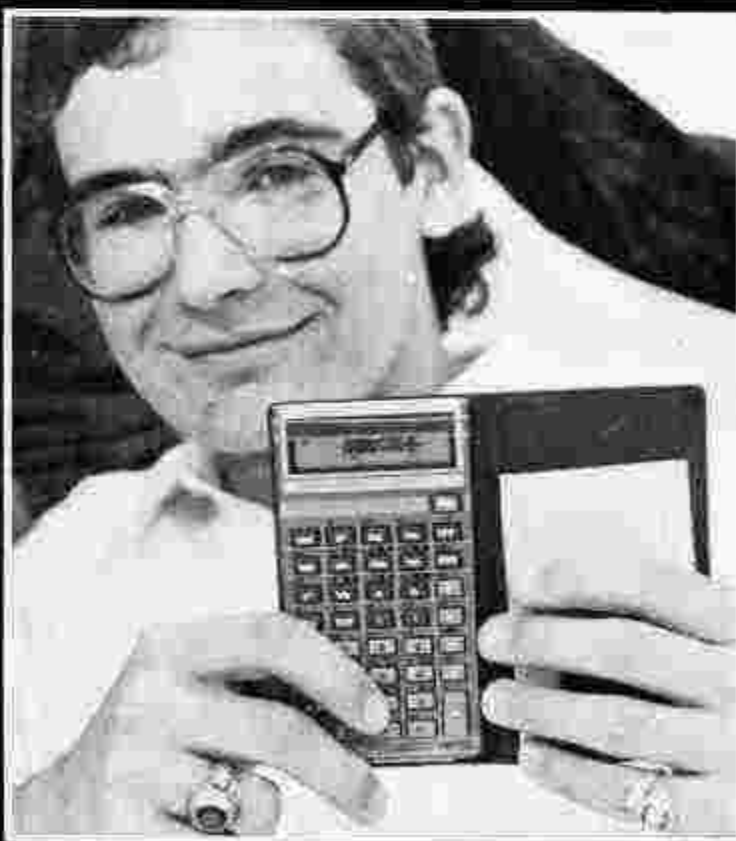
Whether solving algebra equations, writing a computer program, or struggling through geometry proofs, math students were taught well by their terrific math instructors.
