



important in staying alive!


The advanced members of the Art club attended the Art Museum and the Union Statin In Indiapolis to study the fine arts and architecture of the buildings of Indianapolis.

OEA. Office Educators Association. is sponsored by Mrs. Slyh. This club helps to prepare students for business.



They also went to Indianapolis to attend a "business contest." This allowed the students to demonstrate their talents in some of the business fields.



Members of the Drama Club put on 2 performances each year. This year, they put on "Greater Tuna" in the fall, and "You Can't Take It With You" in the spring.


Several members attended a drama workshop in South Bend this year. A lot was learned, and everyone had a great time.










