Neidlinger And Gleason-**Lions Club Award Winners**

Culver - Ralph Neidlinger, lifetime Marshall County resident and resident of Cuvler since 1937 was recipient of the Lions Club "Outstanding Service to the Community Award."

Ron Gleason received the "Outstanding Citizen of the Year Award at the dinner banquet held at the Beach Lodge on January 109.

Art Birk, Culver Lions Club president, speaking about Neidlinger, said, "He has always loved animals, has been very active in work with retarded children and has played Santa Claus for 25 years (wearing out two suits) to give of his time and resources to provide a real Santa for needy children."

Neidlinger started a deer park on his farm in 1963, then added peacocks, Canadian geese, ducks, swans, wild turkeys, pheasants, quail and pigeons. In 1970 the Neidlingers bought two buffalo, Barney and Babe, In 1974 two black bears named Bess and Ben were added.

Approximately 1,000 people a year have received personal tours of the farm in the past 15 years.

Ralph is past vicepresident and board member of the Marshall Starke Development Center (MSDC). The students from MSDC and many other groups have been invited to his farm for field days to enjoy picnies, fishing contests and pony rides.

In 1975 the Neidlingers and their son Max (an MSDC student) showed hogs in Louisville, Ky., and received top awards. In 1977 Max went with his parents to the State Fair and their 1,155 pound boar won first place.

Ralph is also a member of the Fraternal Order of the Culver Eagles and a trustee of that group.

Ron Gleason was an ordinance officer for three years in World War II. He attended college at Antioch, Indiana State, Chicago University and Northwestern (where he received his B. S. and M. S. degrees).

Gleason taught for 23 years, 14 of those at CMA as Counselor and was Head Counselor there for two of those years. He was also Commandant for four years and Director four years at Woodcraft.


Ron retired in 1971 and became township trustee in

In 1977 Gleason received the Eagles "Outstanding Citizen Award."





FARM PROGRAMS WORKED IN 1978

"The 1978 farm programs were successful in strengthening the farm economy, William E. Elliott, Chair-person of the Marshall County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee said.

He pointed out that U. S. producers had enrolled 1.2 million farms in the voluntary wheat, feed grain and cotton programs. They cut back production by setting aside a percentage of their crop acreage and by diverting additional acres to conservation uses. They used the three year reserve to keep their grain off the market and established a wheat and feed grain reserve of one billion bushels. And farm facility loans were used by farmers to build 754 milion bushels of new on farm storage space.

Elliott said the voluntary programs were designed to bring some stability into the production and marketing of

'The effect of the new programs is seen in the prices received by farmers," Elliott said, "which were mearly 23 percent higher than a year earlier when the 1977 farm bill was passed.' Average corn prices are up 18 percent; wheat, at \$3.04 a bushel is 32 percent higher and soybean prices increased 21 percent to \$6.41 a bushel. Cattle, after four years of have rebounded nearly 52 percent, while hog returns to farmers continue 28 percent higher than in October of 1977.

The ASC official said the next year farmers can be in an even stronger bargaining position than they are now through the loan, reserve and farm storage facility loan programs. They will control six out of every ten bushels of wheat and corn, and the grain will not be for sale until farmers get a decent price.

Watch what you eat if taking certain drugs, suggests a recent publication from the U.S. Food and Drug Admini-

For instance, if you're taking high blood pressure medication from the class of drugs known as "MAO inhibitors," you should avoid at all times such fermented or aged foods as salami, sharp cheese, yogurt, sour cream, beef and chicken liver, bananas and avocados, beer, sherry, Chianti and other wines in large quanti-

Foods can also hinder the effectiveness of certain drugs. For example, milk and other dairy products impair absorption of the tetracycline antibiotics. (Do not drink milk one hour before or after taking this medication.) Excessive consumption of foods rich in vitamin K, such as liver and leafy green vegetables, may reduce the potency of anticoagulants.

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



REMEMBER WHEN

Argos - This news story taken from the Argos Reflector dated November 16, 1950, tells the interesting

history of Harvey's Cafe. "Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Umbaugh, proprietors of Harvey's Cafe, bought the building in which the restaurant is located from Mr. and Mrs. Mark Lane yesterday. The consideration was not named.

The building has an interesting history. It was the first "modern" store building, with ceilings of reasonable height, erected in Argos. Its construction marked the end of the old structures with their 12 and 14 foot ceilings.

fhe building was erected for the Lanes by W. B. Butler and R. W. Shafer, early Argos contractors. The building is 24 feet wide and 85 feet deep, and was originally intended as both a restaurant and hotel. Hot water is still piped into the upstairs rooms, which are used as living quarters for the Umbaughs.

The restaurant passed through several hands. The Lanes, after many years, sold to Harvey Hommon who gave the cafe its present name. Miller operated it alone and in partnership with Fermin Cox. The Umbaughs purchased the business on June 25, 1949.

Through the years, Har-vey's Cafe has built up an eviable reputation among travelers along U.S. Highway 31, for the excellence of its meals. The Umbaughs nlan a continuation of present high quality of the restaurant, and also certain improvements building
