So Americans Visit Culver

Culver - Four young men from Lima, Peru and a young lady from Santiago, Chile were visited and photographed in Culver on Saturday and Sunday by the Culver Citizen editor.

Monica Vasquez from Chile has been staying at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Baker. She arrived in December to re-visit the family she stayed with as an exchange student 10 years ago.

Then, 15-year-old Monica, was sponsored by the Spanish Class at Culver Community High School and attended classes here while living with the Bakers and their son Michael (18 at the time) and daughter Barbara who was 16.

Monica's parents are Ismael and Silvia Vasquez and she has a sister, Pamela, 11 years old and two brothers, Ismael, 23 and Jorge, 20. Her mother is a high school Spanish teacher, her father an engineer and both brothers are studying engineering.

Aside from some new businesses coming to Culver, Monica says the town hasn't changed too much. She said

she enjoyed the snow ten years ago, but after experiencing the very cold weather now, she'd like to visit Culver the next time in the summer or fall.

On this trip to the U.S. she visited San Antonio, Texas for a week, toured CMA and also visited the Spanish Class at the high school.

Following her exchange student days, Monica went home to finish school and attended Pontificia Universidad Catolica De Chile and received a degree in Psychology. She speaks Spanish, English and a little French.

Miss Vasquez returned to her home in Santiago (population three and a half million) this week.

The fourth young man to arrive in the community from Lima, Peru, is 19 year old Miguel L. Segura. Miguel has been in the U.S. since the 6th of January, but stayed with families in Lakeville and Rochester prior to coming to Culver. He has finished high school and didn't visit the schools in those towns, but is now attending classes at CCHS., while staying with Mr. and

Mrs. Art Birk, their son Bill and daughter Ruth.

While in this country he has visited Chicago and Battle Creek, Mich. Miguel will remain with the Birk family for four weeks. He and the Birk children attended the basketball game Friday at CCHS and when they forgot the tickets and had to run home to get them, Miguel found Culver's climate extremely cold. However, he thoroughly enjoyed the performance by the Cavallettes and the disco dance following the game.

He's also acquainted with another exchange student here, Enrique Rodriguez, whose picture appeared in the Citizen the week of January 25 with the Cary Flora family. He and Enrique attended the same school in Lima.

Minguel will have a job in a factory awaiting him or his return to Lima.

Federico (Hamann) Vaccari, age 16, from Lima, has moved from his first Culver home with the Pat McCarthy family to stay with Rev. and Mrs. Richard Bennett for his remaining four weeks in this country.

He has been attending CCHS since his arrival here on Jan. 10 and upon returning home to Lima, will begin his last year in high school in April when their school year begins.

Federico says that he likes the small town atmosphere. There are 4,000,000 inhabitants in his home town. He visited the State Exchange Bank to get some bicentennial coins for his dad and he reports that it just took a few minutes. He said if he went to a bank in Lima it would take at least an hour to do the same thing.

Federico attended the Century Center Car Show in South Bend and while there he met Monica Vasquez.

He will be 17 in October and this is his second visit to the U.S.

Cesar Watanabe, 16, from Lima, changed residences Sunday for a two week visit with Dan Adams, Culver Junior High math teacher. I arrived at the Adam's residence to take a picture during the final moments of the basketball game between Notre Dame and the UCLA Bruins, so the picture taking session waited until a time out in the game.

This is Cesar's first visit to the United States. He has

two sisters, one living in Iowa and one in Venezuela. He also has an older brother in Lima and an aunt in New York City.

He's attending all the basketball games while a student at CCHS. He said that he'd seen snow before, but had never felt it until his visit to Culver. Cesar also arrived on Jan. 10 and following his two week stay with Dan and Dan's Old

English Sheep dog, Barney, he will spend his remaining two weeks with his first Culver family, the Paul Winn's again.

All four Peruvians are a part of the Lion's Club International Student Exchange Program. The Citizen would like to add its welcome to these four young men and hope that they will return to visit us again as Monica did.

A BIG HIT - The Mac Frampton Show At CMA

Culver - It's difficult to find adjectives to describe a really great performance such as that Mac Frampton last Thursday evening at Eppley Auditorium. The old standbys, "fantastic," "superb," and "fabulous" all apply to this young man's show which played to a near capacity, very appreciative audience.

Mac on the piano, Tom Cahall on bass and percussionist, Art Montgomery attended the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music. They got together there eight years ago and have been playing engagements all over the United States since.

Frampton gained national prominence as a Bronze Medalist in the 1969 Van Cliburn International Piano Competition. He broke away from the classical tradition and developed a blend of rock, Broadway and jazz styles. Supported by the bass and drums, he brings to the keyboard the restless vitality of a searching, dynamic talent that refuses to be pinned down by the

label.

The program included classical renditions as well as popular movie theme music such as the "theme from Rocky" and "Star Wars." There were also ear pleasing solos by all three young men.

Although they were greeted warmly by the audience, Frampton said, "Being from Atlanta, I'm not used to your winters here and I have to get the ice-cycles off my fingers." The rapidity with which his talented fingers traveled over the keyboard couldn't have left them cold for long.

I've seen performances by Jascha Heifetz and Rubinoff on violin, but can truly say I didn't enjoy them one bit more than I did Mac Frampton and his combo at the academy.

The Atlanta Constitution wrote of his performances "Mix Horowitz, Liberace, Victor Borge and you've got the picture. Frampton's thing is ELECTRIC!"

Hats off again to theatre director, Harvey Firari for bringing such fine talent to Culver.

A Birthday Message For Danny

You were two months old the first time I held you. Never having had a baby to care for, I suppose I was awkward.

I'd signed up with the Michigan Children's Aid Society to care for children. In some instances they were

temporary wards of the court to be returned to their parents when they were able to care for them.

In other cases, as in yours, they'd stay in a foster home only until suitable adoptive parents could be found. The case worker made it very clear that "you do not adopt the baby you take care of." I guess this rule was made so couples who did want to adopt babies wouldn't get too attached to the ones they were caring for in hopes of getting that child.

I doubt if that rule ever accomplished its purpose. How do you turn off your love for a baby?

Each time the lady visited our home, I'd start bugging

her about letting me keep you and she kept reminding me of the rule. As it turned out, the legalities and red tape involved in your case caused the agency to leave you with me much longer than was usual. Time was on my side. I kept badgering and they kept investigating and they found that your mother's background, as far as race, religion and physical characteristics was not unlike mine. The "rule" was broken and I was allowed to adopt you.

The agency also had another unwritten "rule" - to tell the child that he or she was adopted before they reached school age. I'll never forget that day. You were four years old and your baby sister was born to us three months before that day.

In fact, shortly before she was born I'd taken you with me and stopped by the doctor's office to pick up some vitamins. The waiting room was crowded and when the nurse went to get the pills you said, in a loud voice, "did she go to get our baby?" I figured that now was a perfect time to tell you about the meaning of adoption.

Wanting to make the explanation simple enough for you to understand, I said, "Do you remember when your sister was born?" You said that you did. I continued with my story and said, "Well, we had to have her, but we picked you out especially for us. We had the chance to see you, take care of you and then keep you for our own."

You were helping me with dishes at the time and I watched your face as I went on at great length explaining the difference between an adopted child and one that was born to parents. When I finished, quite proud of myself for my unique explanation, I said, "Do you understand what I mean?" You answered, "Yes, didn't you want my sister?" Now, as your 28th birthday approaches, I'm sure you're aware that I wanted all of your sisters and your brother. And I'm aware that motherhood doesn't necessarily depend on giving birth.

My feelings are summed up in the following poem I read somewhere along time ago. It was entitled "To An Adopted Child."

Not flesh of my flesh,
Nor bone of my bone,
But, still
Miraculously, my own.
Never forget
For a single minute,
You didn't grow
Under my heart
But - in it.

Happy birthday, son.

that food prices, housing costs, medical care and petroleum have all risen more than 10%. These basic necessities have been averaged with non basic essentials to come up with a lower figure. If we must take 80% of our income to buy basic items, that leaves 20% for non basics. Thus, 80% of our everyday costs went up over 10% last year with 20% going up less than 8%.

Unfortunately, we can trim the non basics - but in most cases we cannot trim the basics. If inflation continues, this non basic 20% will be completely eaten away by the inflation of the other 80%.

When this happens - who will buy the new automobiles, new appliances, new boats, take vacations, etc. The non basics that keep our country running will no longer be purchased by the average family.

Our economy appears to be going back to the circumstances at the turn of the century. The average worker will only be able to afford what is essentially needed. One big change has occurred since that time - free time. The fourteen hour workday is now down to 7 or 8 hours.

Whatever happened to the "Great American Dream."

We are continually hearing about inflation with many percentages being used. It depends upon who is giving the speech whether the percentage figure will be high or low.

The latest figure for the year 1978 hovers between 8% and 9%. It is then assumed that we can use this range to figure if we are ahead, or behind the cost of living game. However, in the next release given by the federal government we find

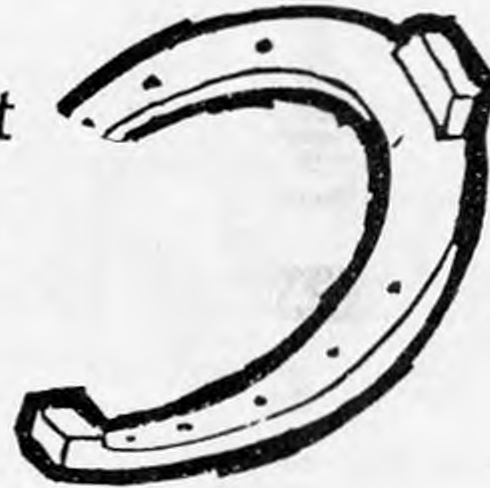

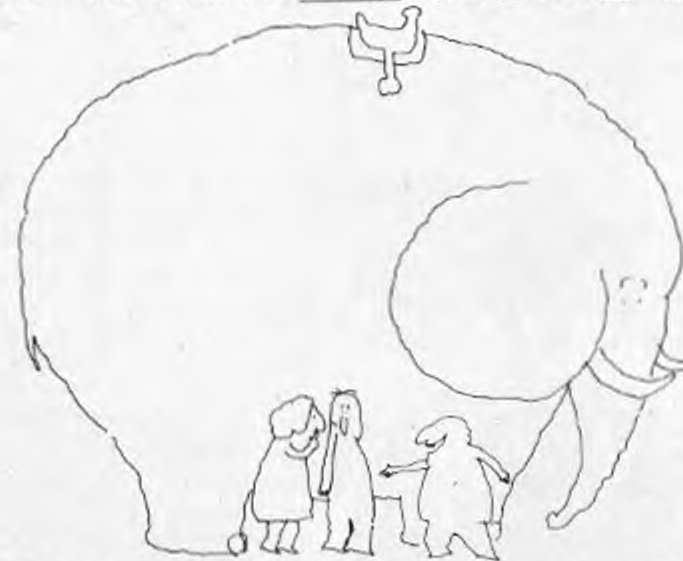

application for an improvement location permit shall be accompanied by a check payable to the Town in an amount of \$25.00 for new construction of a principal building and \$20.00 for an accessory building or for alteration of an existing building.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication according to law.
