## Bonds Purchased For Street Garage

Culver - The State Exchange Bank of Culver paid \$60,678.34 on February 13 for Culver municipal bonds to finance the construction of the new street garage. Land was donated by McGill Manufacturing Corp. for the site of the new structure which is scheduled to be completed in the spring.

State Exchange Bank President, W. O. Osborn, presented the check to Clerk-treasurer, Marizetta Kenney in the bank lounge here. Also present were Executive Vice-president of the bank, Fred Adams and Culver's

town lawyer, Fred Jones. Mr. Osborn celebrated his 94th birthday on January 27 and has been in the banking business for more than 70 years. Beginning with one bank at Culver the State Exchange now has branches in Argos, Plymouth, LaPaz and Bremen.

When the news media gathered to take pictures of the check presentation, Adams asked Mr. Osborn, "When was it you came here, right after the Pilgrims came over?"

Osborn quipped in reply, "No, I came over with them."

Mr. Osborn never misses a day at his office in Culver and during the blizzard of '78 he still made it to work. He accomplished this by driving behind the snow plow on his way into town.

Many stories are related in this community about how Mr. Osborn has helped people over the years. One young man he aided was involved in one of the bank robberies, but Osborn states, "No one ever let me down who I'd had confidence in."

The bank's motto "The Bank that Good Will Built" is in an appropriate one.

The members from Culver joined with nearly 200,000 spectators to view the world's largest farm equipment show and championship tractor pull at the Kentucky State Fairgrounds. The entire event is housed in enclosed heated buildings, making it a very comfortable show in mid-winter.

"It was all very, very interesting," reported Greg Zehner, FFA member from Monterey. "Some of the outstanding exhibits were the new kinds of tractors featuring larger engines up to 450 H.P. and air-cooled diesels, custom-built tractors for contests with as many as 24 cylinders, combines that could harvest

In addition to the machinery displays, there were many educational displays by different colleges, including Purdue University. The Purdue display featured the many options in engineering which are attractive to students with interest in agriculture and related fields. The display included exhibits in agricultural engineering, mechanization, forestry engineering, and food engineering.

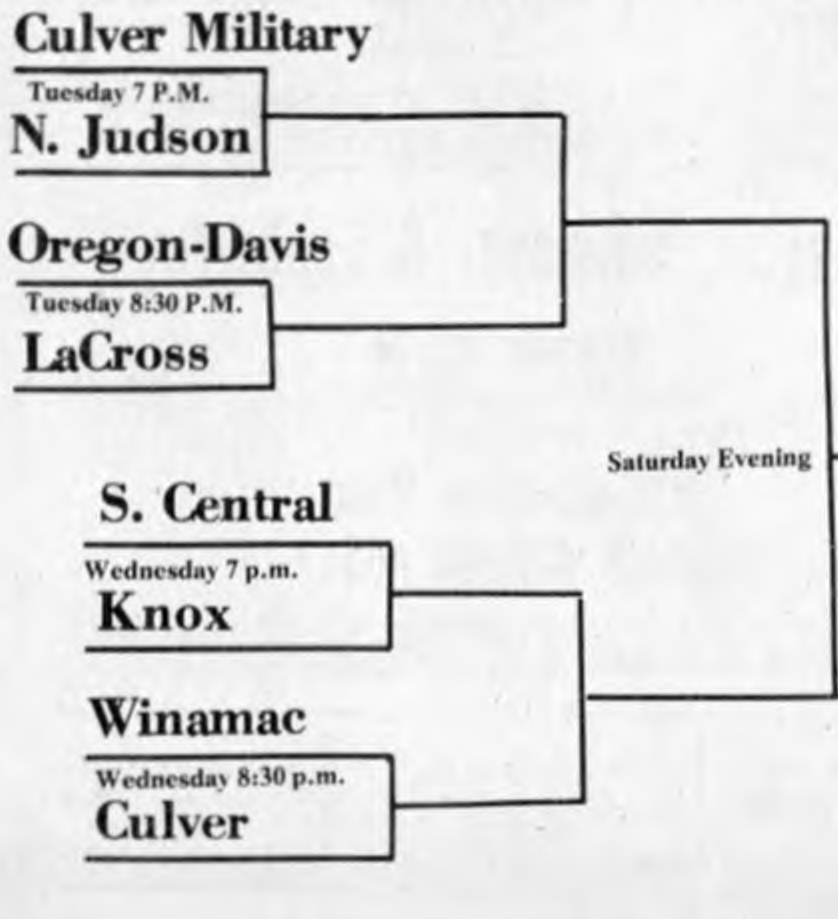
## Views In The News

### Schwartz with Sports

Culver - Last Sunday, this reporter and 10 members of the CCHS Volleyball team ventured to Michigan City Rogers High School to watch the U. S. Men's Olympic Team face five time NCAA finalist Ball State in an exhibition match.

Being the volleyball coach at CCHS, I thought this would be a great learning experience for the players. We weren't disappointed, as we viewed 100 mph spikes, diving passes, and sophisticated offenses and defenses.

Even though volleyball originated in this country, the United States has fallen way behind in international play. In an effort to be competitive, the U. S. team has set up a national training center in Dayton, Ohio. A great idea but an expensive one. Many of the players spent entire savings to move to Dayton. Dayton area employers have found jobs for the players. They work around practices and matches. They usually practice until ten each night and six hours each day of the weekend. They just finished a month long tour of Europe, and are preparing a similar tour to Canada. Hopefully these three years of hard work will pay off in the 1980 Olympics.

A last minute addition to the program Sunday was a

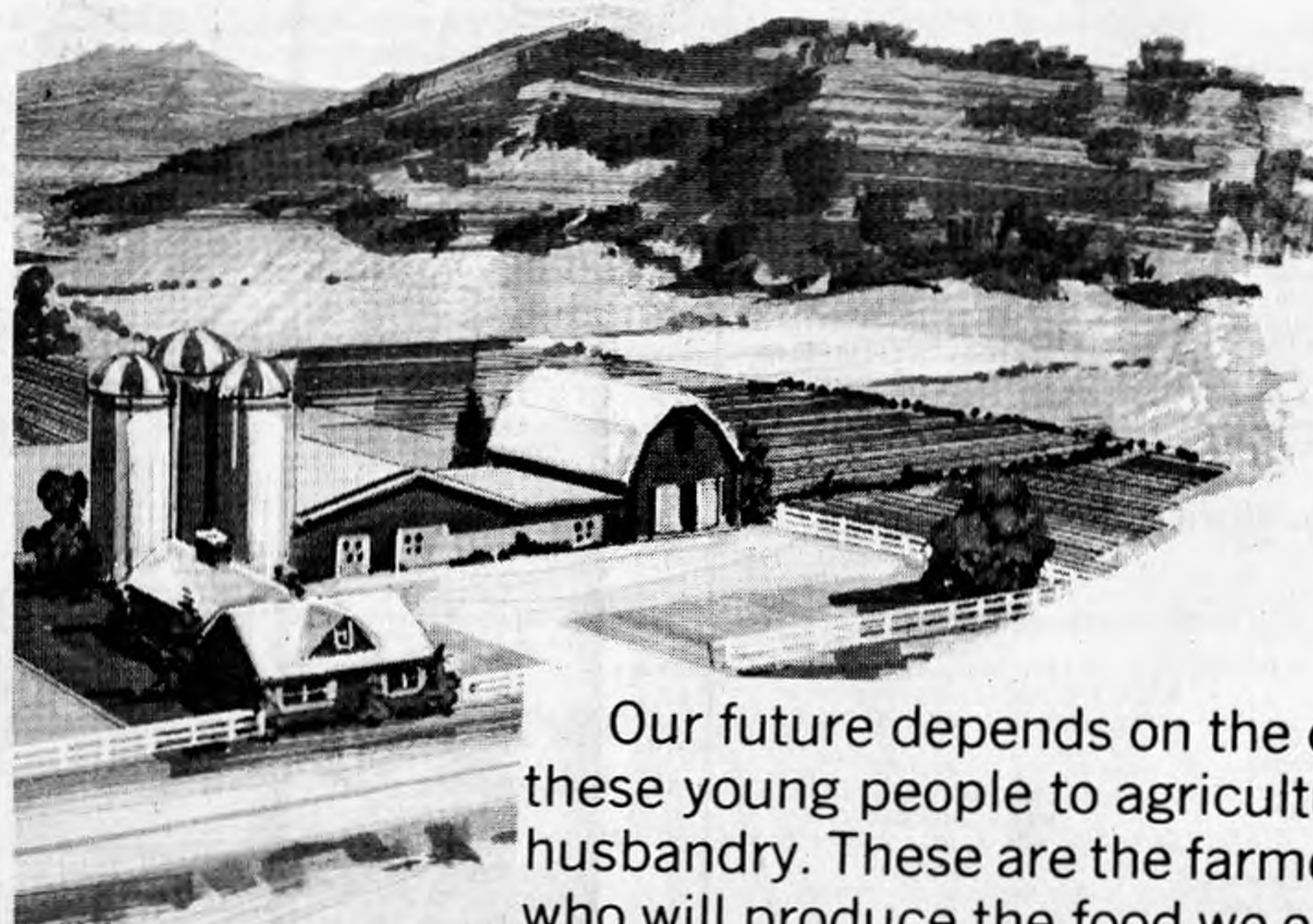

**ORDINANCE NO. 289**

An Ordinance Amending Ordinance No. 254, Otherwise Known as the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Argos, Indiana Article V, Section 508 Relating to Changes in Fees for Application for Improvement Location Permits

WHEREAS, the Marshall County Commissioners have, effective as of January 1, 1979, established a fee for services of the County Building Inspector on all permits issued by the Town of Argos; and

WHEREAS, the fees to be paid for said services are in excess of the fees currently being charged for the issuance of improvement location permits by the Town of Argos thereby causing an economic drain on the Town funds; and

WHEREAS, the Argos Town Board has found this to be detrimental to the best interests of the community and has submitted this to the Argos Plan Commission for public hearing;

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Town Board of Argos, Indiana, that Zoning Ordinance Number 254 for the Town of Argos is amended to read as follows:

Article V, Section 508 Fee for Application. Each application for an improvement location permit shall be accompanied by a check payable to the Town in an amount of \$25.00 for new construction of a principal building and \$20.00 for an accessory building or for alteration of an existing building.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication according to law.
