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


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

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COMMITTEES APPOINTED AT SCHOOL BOARD MEET

Culver - The Culver School Board hear a report from Architect Richard Miller. Monday night concerning the corrosion of copper pipes at the high school. The recommendation was to install a chemical feed system using sodium silicate to coat the pipes and stop leaks. This would cost a maximum of \$3,600.00 to install. Mills said that he realized at the varsity level winning is important because many times students are working toward a possible athletic scholarship. He said "this is not the

case below the varsity level,

I am convinced that every

child on athletic teams should be allowed to participate it concerns me that a student conscientiously practices day after day and then doesn't get to participate in the actual game. I believe fundamentals, team play, and sports-manship should be stressed in athletics. When I initiated the fifth and sixth grade intra-mural program a couple years ago one requirement was that every boy and girl could paly at least one quarter. I now feel this needs to be done in every

level of up to the varsity level." Mills recommended that

every player in basketball, football, and volleyball be allowed to play one quarter or an inning in baseball in each game, except in

tournament play. This would exclude an injured player, one who had missed practices or one who is being held out of the game for disclipinary reasons.

He stated that students who smoke, drink or use non prescription drugs should not be allowed to participate on school athletic teams. Mills said "I hope that this

will take the pressure of winning off of some of our coaches and will casue them to be more concerned with developing the athletic ability of all players in stressing team play."

His recommendation was put to a vote, passed unanimously and drew applause from the audience of approximately 100 corporation residents. In other action the board:

must continue to show proof of competence in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. No other medical specialty requires diplomates to prove competence on a continuing basis.

The latest group of diplo-mates brings the total number to more than 19,000. Most are members of the Academy of Family Physicians, the national associa-tion of family doctors. The Academy was the first national M.D. group to require members to take continuing medical study, and was chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for family practice.
