## TRI KAPPA SPONSORS EXPLORERS VISIT TO CULVER

Culver - The Epsilon Nu chapter of Tri Kappa sponsored a visit to Culver of Richard Stillwagon, the man who portrayed French explorer Jean Michel in the re-enactment in 1976-77 of the original LaSalle Expedition 300 years ago.

Mr. Stillwagon, a science teacher from Crown Point, gave two different programs Thursday, March 1st at the high school auditorium for 700 children in grades one through eight.

Appearing in original hand sewn clothing made for the expedition, Mr. Stillwagon detailed his clothing and interesting points of the journey, showed slides and entertained questions.

23 men, including 16 recent high school graduates re-enacted the original expedition as closely as possible. They spent two years in preparation for the trip, which had a budget of \$600,000, funded partially

by the governments of the United States, England and France. Mr. Stillwagon received special training in order to act as the expedition's doctor. The 16 boys just out of high school received 15 hours of college credit and a \$1,000 scholarship.

Leaving Montreal, Canada in August, 1977, they followed the St. Lawrence Seaway, the Great Lakes and then the St. Joseph River and arrived in South Bend during the winter of 1977. At that point, because the rivers were frozen, they were forced to walk across Indiana to Illinois and down the entire length of that state to meet the Mississippi River, carrying their canoes and all their supplies.

The expedition ended at the Gulf of Mexico in April 1977.

Each year the Culver Tri Kappa chapter sponsors an educational program for the children in the Culver elementary and junior high schools as a community service.

## HEAR ABOUT CONSERVING ENERGY

Monday, March 5 Argos senior citizens arrived at the Argos United Methodist Church to hear Harley Justus of R.E.M.C. Each was quite upset over the raise in their electric bills, which is understandable, because most are on a very limited income.

Harley explained that there had been a 57 1/2% price hike for Argos and an 18 1/2% price hike on the R.E.M.C. line. He stated that the high peak on the lines were at 5 p.m. when everyone seems to turn on everything.

Mexico has a vast amount of reserve gas and oil but are holding out for high prices. In St. Louis, garbage is being sorted and then used to manufacture gas.

Ways to conserve energy at home, all year around - grow a wind break of trees; plant shade trees on the east and north side of the house; insulate fully attic and walls; use double glazed windows; install storm windows and doors; awnings and fans should be used in the summer; attic vent and at least several windows should be opened to let in fresh air.

Take showers instead of tub baths (showers of no more than 5 minutes save 1/2 the water used); close drapes to keep out the sun, and in the winter the cold; use insulated drapes if possible; locate thermostat on an inside wall; keep the heat turned as low as to be comfortable. Older people must watch as they sometimes need more heat than a younger person; install a good water heater and have the heat adjusted on it so as not to waste energy; check furnace filters weekly; close off unused rooms; dress right for the weather; wear several layers of clothes instead of one heavy one; wash only full loads of dishes or clothes; keep your refrigerator and freezer full, it uses less electricity; use cold water and a cold water detergent or warm water for your laundry whenever possible; fix leaky faucets; light right fluorescent lights use less electricity.

Automobiles use 12% of all the energy. Keep the car in top condition; watch tire pressure; use radial tires; drive 55 miles per hour drive and the same speed constantly; accelerating gently saves gas; share a ride, that doesn't mean pick up strangers but share with friends.

The careful driver can get 30 percent more gas mileage than the average driver who speeds and then slows down.

Harley gave time for questions and there were many. I am sure each learned something. Many thanks to him for his time.

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# Schwartz with Sports

Six games now stand between one of 64 teams and the state basketball championship. This column connected correctly on 45 of the 64 sectionals predicted for a respectable 70 per cent. Of the 19 picked missed, 6 picks lost in the championship game (5 by 3 points or less), while 9 lost in the semifinals. Only 3 predictions lost in first round action. In the immediate area, Oregon-Davis and Argos came through as predicted at North Judson and Plymouth respectively, while Tippecanoe Valley surprised everyone at Triton. No less than 32 teams defended last year's sectional crown with another championship, while the remaining 32 sites will have new representatives at the regionals. Two of the biggest surprises in the sectionals were at Frankfort and Kankakee Valley. Kankakee Valley upset North Newton (19-2) on the way to winning its own sectional. Clinton Central defeated Tipton 76-74 to win the Frankfort Sectional. Clinton Central lost its coach 2 weeks ago, when Jim Lowe announced

his resignation effective immediately at that time. Apparently assistant coach Ron Slaton has inspired the team through adversity. Argos and Elkhart Central could meet again in the Elkhart regional championship. Last year the Dragons fell to Central 80-67 -- should be much closer this time. Defending state champion Muncie Central faces Richmond in first round regional action at New Castle. The two met back in December at Muncie, with Richmond winning by 1. The two also battled in last year's regional. The eventual state champs barely survived winning 53-52 in 2 overtimes. Should SB Adams, Argos, and DeKalb survive regional competition this week, 3 of the state's 4 undefeated teams could be in the Fort Wayne Semi-State field. The Marion regional winner (probably Marion or Logansport) would be the fourth team there. Don Higgins finished a fine career by becoming the all-time career scorer at CCHS. His 20 points against Winamac lifted him past Mike Bauer's record 900 points.

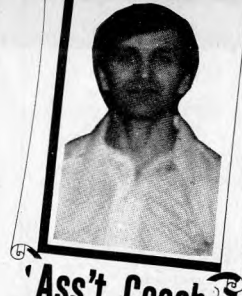

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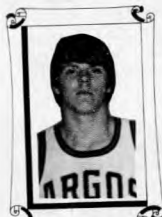

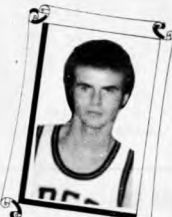

**COMMITTEES APPOINTED AT SCHOOL BOARD MEET**

Culver - The Culver School Board hear a report from Architect Richard Miller, Monday night concerning the corrosion of copper pipes at the high school. The recommendation was to install a chemical feed system using sodium silicate to coat the pipes and stop leaks. This would cost a maximum of \$3,600.00 to install. More information will be gathered concerning the problem before final action is taken.

Committees were appointed to set up a frame work for long range planning in the corporation. Serving on the finance committee will be Marvin Good, Paul Snyder and Phil Mallory. A committee to study buildings, equipment, and facilities include board president Howard Hildebrand and members Peggy Clark and Paul Davidson. The third committee will inspect the needs in curriculum and extra curricular activities including the athletic program. Mallery, Snyder and Don Keller will serve on this committee.

A memorandum was read by Supt. William Mills concerning the sports program in the corporation. Mills said "I have a deep concern and conviction about the Culver Community Schools Athletic program below the varsity level." Mills said that he realized at the varsity level winning is important because many times students are working toward a possible athletic scholarship.

He said "this is not the case below the varsity level, I am convinced that every child on athletic teams should be allowed to participate it concerns me that a student conscientiously practices day after day and then doesn't get to participate in the actual game. I believe fundamentals, team play, and sportsmanship should be stressed in athletics. When I initiated the fifth and sixth grade intra-mural program a couple years ago one requirement was that every boy and girl could paly at least one quarter. I now feel this needs to be done in every level of up to the varsity level."

Mills recommended that

every player in basketball, football, and volleyball be allowed to play one quarter or an inning in basetal in each game, except in tournament play.

This would exclude an injured player, one who had missed practices or one who is being held out of the game for disciplinary reasons.

He stated that students who smoke, drink or use non prescription drugs should not be allowed to participate on school athletic teams.

Mills said "I hope that this will take the pressure of winning off of some of our coaches and will casue them to be more concerned with developing the athletic ability of all players in stressing team play."

His recommendation was put to a vote, passed unanimously and drew applause from the audience of approximately 100 corporation residents.

In other action the board: - voted not to allow motions to be made on items by individual school board members on the agenda until that item was discussed and placed specifically on the agenda for the following meeting.

- appointed Mills as chief negotiator for the corporation and Hildebrand to serve on the negotiation team.

- gave permission for use of the Aubbee school and grounds for the Strawberry Festival at Leiters Ford in June.

- the next meeting will be held at Bass Lake Horse Palace on Monday, March 19th.

# DR. KOVACH NAMED DIPLOMAT OF ABFP

Argos - Dr. Drew Kovach, of Argos, Indiana, has been named a diplomate of the American Board of Family Practice (ABFP) as a result of passing a certified examination offered by the ABFP. He is now certified in the medical specialty of family practice.

The intensive 2-day written examination is designed to prove the candidate's ability in the areas of internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics, gynecology, pediatrics, psychiatry and community medicine.

To qualify for the examination a physician must have completed either a 3-year family practice residency or have been in family practice a minimum of six years and successfully completed 300 hours of continuing medical

education approved by the American Academy of Family Physicians.

ABFP diplomates also must continue to show proof of competence in the field of comprehensive, continuing care of the family by being recertified every six years. No other medical specialty requires diplomates to prove competence on a continuing basis.

The latest group of diplomates brings the total number to more than 19,000. Most are members of the Academy of Family Physicians, the national association of family doctors. The Academy was the first national M.D. group to require members to take continuing medical study, and was chiefly responsible for securing specialty status for family practice. This year is the 10th anniversary of the specialty.

Argos - In May the seventh Older Hoosier of the Year Award will be presented to one of our many deserving senior citizens during the banquet of the Indiana Older Hoosiers Federation. The award is sponsored by the Indiana Commission on Aging.

The Older Hoosiers Award originated in 1973 as the highest honor of the Indiana Commission on Aging that can be bestowed on a Senior Citizen in the State of Indiana.

The award, given annually has a three fold purpose: (a) to recognize an outstanding older Hoosier for a life time of service to his/her community, State and mankind, (b) to encourage continued achievement and service, and (c) to interpret the public the pleasures and challenges of retirement living.

The recipient will serve as an official representative of Older Hoosiers at meetings, conferences, and gatherings throughout the State and will serve as a spokesman on those occasions when he or she is available.

The award presentation is made in May, which has been designated as Older Americans Month, at the Annual Conference of the Indiana Federation of Older Hoosiers. The recipient is presented with a Proclamation from the Governor of the State of Indiana and an appropriate personal plaque or award. A permanent display, which bears the names of the annual award winners is located in the State Commission on Aging office.

Either organizations or individuals may make nominations. To be eligible for the award, one must be a resident of Indiana, at least 65 years of age and available to attend the awards ceremony if chosen to represent this area with expenses paid.
