## CMA Captures Trophy In Drill Team Competition

Culver - For the fourth year in a row, Culver Military Academy has captured the Overall Championship Trophy in its annual drill team competition involving high schools from Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Virginia. Finishing second to Culver Military Academy in the overall category at Culver's Fourth Annual Invitational Drill Meet held last Saturday on the Academy Campus was Indianapolis Ben Davis, followed, in third position, by Portage High School of Indiana.

Portage's third-place showing of 1511 points, overall, was sparked primarily by its third-place finish in the Female Exhibition Drill category. In the Female Exhibition category, Indianapolis Northwest was the first-place finisher, followed by Gary Roosevelt in second, Portage, Broad Ripple in fourth, and Gary West in fifth.

In the Regulation Drill category, the Howe Military Academy 'B' team took top honors, followed by Indianapolis Northwest in second, Muncie South Side in third, Frankfort, High School in fourth, and the Howe Military "A" team in fifth. In Individual Drill Competition, Culver Military Academy Cadet David Schermer captured first place, followed by Cadet Shady of Concordia Lutheran High School, Fort Wayne, in second, Cadet Waters of Muncie South in third, Cadet Bridges of Portage in fourth, and Cadet Perry of Indianapolis Shortridge in fifth.

The Best Commander At Meet Trophy was awarded to Cadet Ryan Collins of Indianapolis Ben Davis. The Culver meet was sponsored by VFW Finney-Schilling Post 6919 of Culver, and past post commander and present post advocate Gene Riestler, along with Culver superintendent John R. Mars, the formal trophy presentations.

Everyone in Culver and Marshall County can't help but feel happy for the Argos Dragons this week. After all, it's not often a small school destroys a team the size of Elkhart Central. David did defeat Goliath though, didn't he?

It seems every time Argos faces a pressure situation, their shooting percentage improves. Against Elkhart, they only shot 65 percent from the field. Even more impressive in the land of the giant redwoods, the Blue Blazers only outbounded the Dragons by a mere 29-28. Last week, it was mentioned that 3 undefeated teams might be at the Fort Wayne Semi-State. With South Bend Adams and DeKalb falling to the wayside, Argos enters the Fort Wayne field with the states best record (26-0). Here is a brief look at the Fort Wayne field:

Rose Jacobson, Vickie Garn, Donna Shock and Beth Nies came off the bench to help with the scoring. Tracey Nelson was unable to find a bucket this season but she nevertheless was an important part of the team showing much enthusiasm defensively.

Rebounding honors go to Julie Kline and Shelli Overmyer, followed closely by high jumping Barb Talcet.

Lisa Girton, darci Lowry, and Jill Johnston proved to be the spark plugs of the team with fine defensive

scorer, as well as city scoring champ. He scored 26 and 33 in regional action. Four of their five losses were by 5 points or less, all to Fort Wayne schools. Upset undefeated DeKalb in regional final.

# Argos Town Board Honors Basketball Team

**ARGOS BOARD PROCLAIMS DRAGON DAY**

Argos - At a recent meeting of the Argos Town Board, Trustees, Trustee Scheetz, Attorney Gifford read aloud a resolution he had been asked to prepare that saluted the Argos Varsity Basketball team for an undefeated season and the recent sectional win. After Attorney Gifford completed reading the resolution, Trustee Leallen moved that the resolution be adopted as read. Trustee Scheetz seconded the motion. The motion then carried by the vote of 3 Ayes and 0 Nays. The resolution is as follows:

in a row, after never having won a sectional title before and in the process defeated Bremen, LaVie, and the Big Red of Plymouth, the first time an Argos Basketball team has defeated Plymouth in over twenty (20) years; and

Whereas in winning said Sectional, Argos shot an amazing 71% from the field in defeating Plymouth and an even more astounding 73% in defeating LaVie in the championship game; and

Whereas the victory over LaVie was Coach Weybright's 100th career win as a varsity basketball coach, a notable and fine distinction for any coach, especially when achieved over a relatively short six (6) seasons as head coach; and

Whereas the three (3) victories recorded in the Sectionals now brings the season record to 24 wins and 0 losses upon entering into Regional play against Whitko in the Elkhart Regional; and

Whereas Argos High School is the smallest high school team still left in the State Tournament after sectional play and remains (1) of only four (4) unbeaten teams in the State both of which are noble accomplishments in their own right;

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Town Trustees of the Town of Argos that the Team and its Coaches are hereby honored for the successful season thus far recorded; and

Further resolved that all citizens of the Argos area are hereby encouraged to support the Dragons by attending the Regional Tournament in Elkhart on Saturday, March 10, 1979; and

Be it further resolved that Saturday, March 10, 1979, be and hereby is declared as "Dragon Day" in the Town of Argos, Indiana.

Passed and Adopted by the Argos Board of Town Trustees at its regular meeting held on March 6, 1979.

## ARGOS BOARD APPROVES CONSTRUCTION BUDGET

Argos - Board members Scheetz, Lewallen and Faulkner were present for the regular session Town Board meeting on March 6, 1979 at 7:30 p.m. Clerk-Treasurer Zentz, Attorney Gifford, Chief Hasko, and Supt. Hochstetler were also present. The March 6 regular session Town Board meeting was held in the Police Station/Town Court building at 152 S. Michigan Street.

John Middleton, the civil engineer for the HUD Grant, presented the preliminary engineering report for the streets, curbs, and sidewalks for the target area. The approved HUD Community Development Block Grant Program Application includes three line items for improvements within the several "local" street right-of-ways area. These were:

Street Improvements (1,190 @ \$20.00/ft.) = \$39,800.00. Street Construction (18,620 @ \$3.50/ft.) = \$65,170.00. Sidewalk Construction (8,680 @ \$8.00/ft.) = \$69,440.00. Total \$174,410.

The total budgeted amount of \$174,410 includes all costs of contract construction and engineering. The amount which should be allocated for contract construction is computed as follows:

Total Budget Amount - \$174,410.00. Design Engineering @ 8.75% + = \$13,300.00. Total of \$161,110.00. Construction Engineering & Inspection @ 4% + = \$6,430.00. Balance remaining for construction - \$154,680.00

The total estimated funds available for actual contract construction is then \$155,000.00 + for all curb, sidewalk, and street construction to be accomplished under this project. It is recommended that only one construction contract be developed to include all curb, sidewalk, and street construction. One contract should result in lower unit prices, and will make overall project coordination and administration easier and less costly for all parties concerned.

The Board after some discussion on the matter approved Lawson-Fisher preliminary engineering report subject review by the Citizen Advisory Committee which will be meeting on March 8, 1979. The motion was made by Trustee Scheetz and seconded by Trustee Lewallen. The motion then carried by the vote of 3 Ayes and 0 Nays.

It was noted that the job would have to meet all the government wage guide lines. Also that some assistance from the County Surveyor would be required to determine where some of the road-right-of-ways are. Bob Sante also requests that the lease with the Railroad for some of the street in the area be reviewed.

The Board of Trustees also noted that the Ordinance raising the building permit fees, has been advertised, and the new charges are effective as of this date.

Clerk-Treasurer Zentz noted to the Board that there were plans to apply for a "701" local Comprehensive planning assistance grant in the near future. The grant would be for updating the present Zoning Ordinance, Subdivision Control Ordinance, and the Zoning maps for the Town.

## RED CROSS BOARD MEETING

Culver - Mrs. Margaret Herbst was named Volunteer of the Month at the February 24th meeting of the Marshall County Red Cross. Mrs. Herbst, Supervisor of Guidance at LaVie Jr. Sr. High School, volunteered many hours coordinating efforts for the Bloodmobile held at LaVie School.

Dean Byers, Red Cross Board Chairman, announced that some money had been received from all three United Ways in the county. The Plymouth United Way will be sending a total of \$14,000, Culver \$1900, and Bremen \$3000.

In other business, the 1979-80 Bloodmobile schedule was approved. And the date for the Red Cross annual dinner meeting was set for June 28th at the Mint Still in Bremen.

Culver Disaster Preparedness Representative, Norma Runkle, stressed the need for housing to aid the burnout victims in Culver. She is also preparing a schedule for Culver volunteers to be trained in disaster procedures.

American Red Cross Month will be observed nationally during March. Sandra Cardwell, Publicity Chairperson, received the Board's approval to ask high school students to make posters for Red Cross. These will be displayed throughout the county. An effort will be made to thank companies in the county for their support of the United Way.

Bea Mosing volunteered to start a Dial-A-Friend program in Culver.

Jill Libby reported that the Marshall County Hairdressers Association purchased paper cups with the Red Cross symbol to be used at Bloodmobiles.

The Board approved a motion to sue funds received from the Swim Across to sponsor one or more persons at Camp Limberlost. A high school student attending the camp for ten days receives intensive First Aid and Water Safety training, and can become a Red Cross instructor in various programs.

Ken Gilliland, CPR Instructor Trainer, gave a very informative demonstration on cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

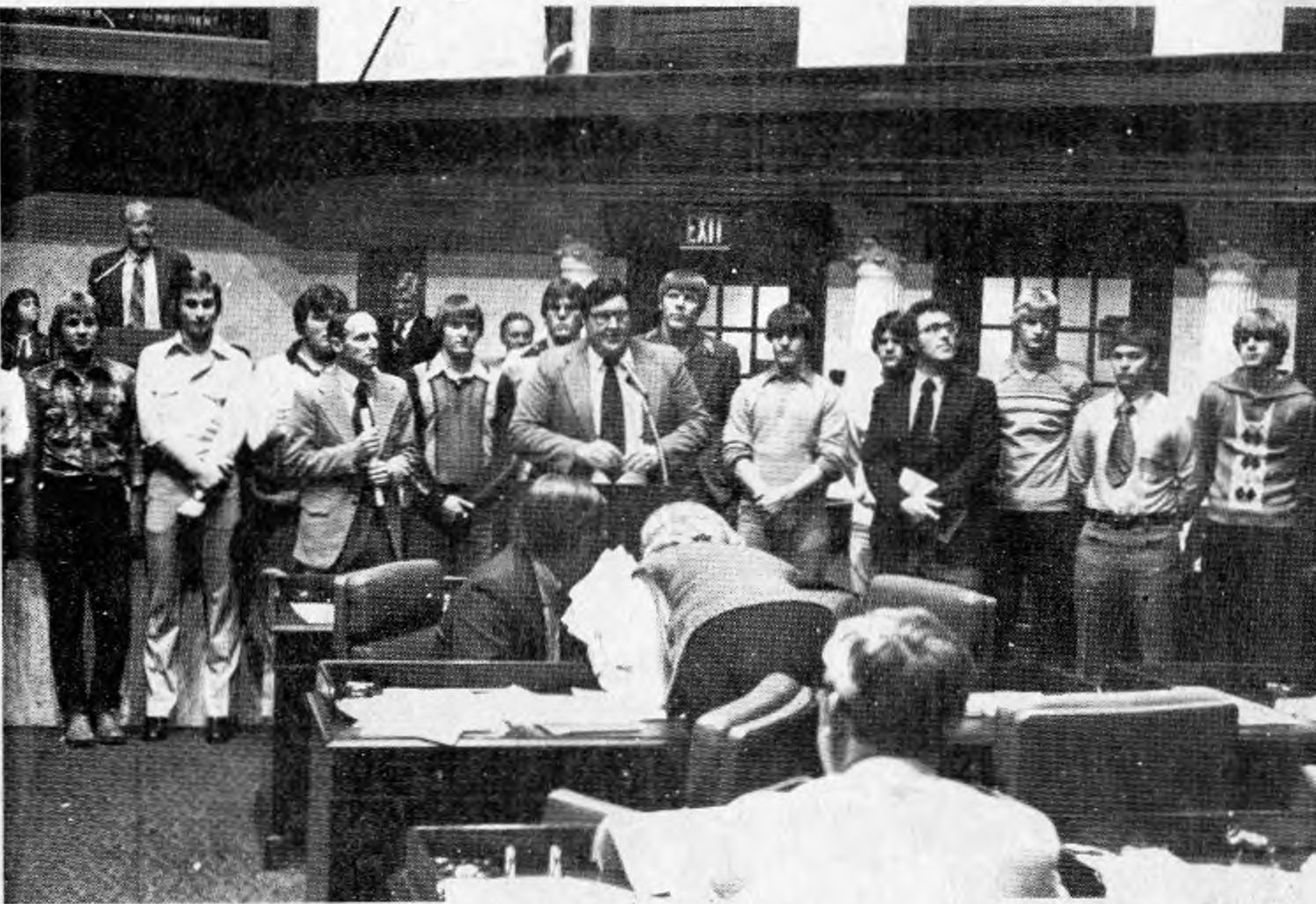

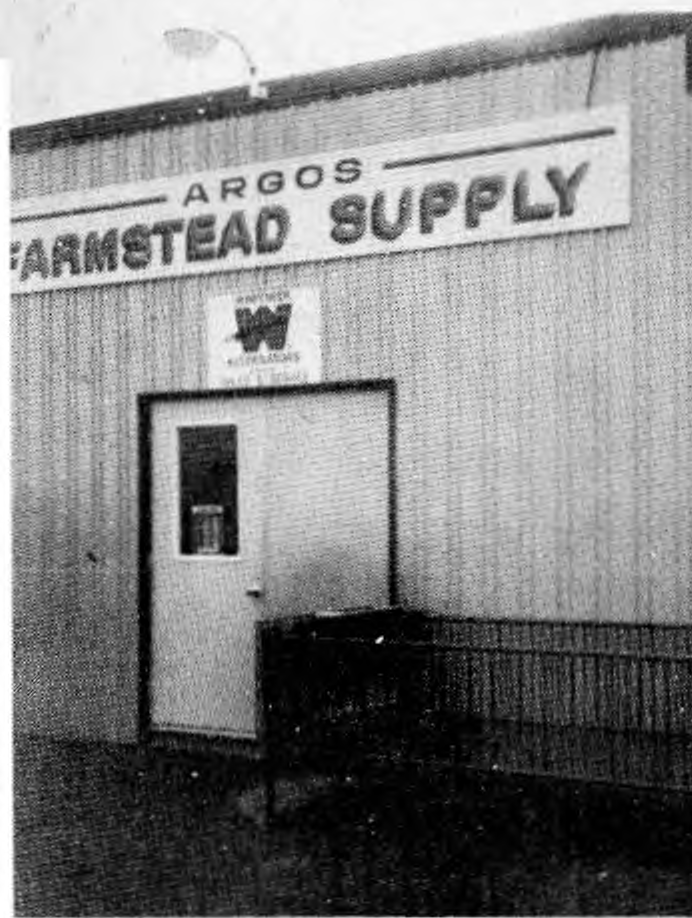
