A surprise birthday cake was baked by Barbara Hann for the birthday of Bonnie Bunch and served to the club members.





ARGOS BOARD APPROVES CONSTRUCTION BUDGET

Argos - Board members Scheetz, Lewallen and Faulk-ner were present for the regular session Town Board meeting on March 6, 1979 at 7:30 p.m. Clerk-Treasurer Zentz, Attorney Gifford, Chief Hasko, and Supt. Hochstetler were also present. The March 6 regular session Town Board meeting was held in the Police Station/Town Court building at

152 S. Michigan Street. John Middleton, the civil engineer for the HUD Grant, presented the preliminary engineery report for the streets, curbs, and sidewalks for the target area. The approved HUD Community Development Block Grant Program Application includes three line items for improvements within the several "local" street right-ofways area. These were:

Improvements Street (1,190 @ \$20.00/ft.) = \$39,800.00. Street Construction (18,620 @ \$3.50/ft.) = \$65,170.00. Sidewalk Con-struction (8,680 @ \$8.00/ft.): \$69,440.00. Total \$174,410.

The total budgeted amount of \$174,410 includes all costs of contract construction and engineering. The amount which should be allocated for contract construction is computed as follows:

Total Budget Amount -\$174,410.00. Design Engineering @ 8.75% + - \$13,300.00. Total of \$13,300.00. Total of \$161,110.00. Construction Engineering & Inspection @ 4% + - \$6,430.00. Balance remaining for construction -\$154,680.00

The total estimated funds available for actual contract construction is then \$155,000.00 + for all curb, sidewalk, and street construction to be accomplished under this project. It is recommended that only one construction contract be developed to include all curb, sidewalk, and street construction. One contract should result in lower unit prices, and will make overall project coordination and administration easier and less costly for all parties concern-

The Board after some discussion on the matter approved Lawson-Fisher preliminary engineering report subject review by the Citizen Advisory Committee which will be meeting on March 8, 1979. The motion was made by Trustee Scheetz and seconded by Trustee Lewallen. The motion then carried by the vote of 3 Ayes and

It was noted that the job would have to meet all the government wage guide lines. Also that some assistance from the County Surveyor would be required to determine where some of the road-right-of-ways are. Bob Sante also requests that the lease with the Railroad for some of the street in the area be reviewed.

The Board of Trustees also noted that the Ordinance raising the building permit fees, has been advertised, and the new charges are effective as of this date.

Zentz Clerk-Treasurer noted to the Board that there were plans to apply for a "701" local Comprehensive planning assistance grant in the near future. The grant would be for updating the present Zoning Ordinance, Subdivision Control Ordinance, and the Zoning maps for the Town.

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


