y purpose in writing this is not to dictate to you what you must do or must do in regard to your duties and obligations as a member of the Board of the Culver Community Schools, but to express my view as a concerned citizen of the community. You the Board and your oath of office obligates you to the best of your ability, the entire community which you represent; this, I am sure is the desire of each one of you. I was trustee of Aub-

beenaubee Township at the time the Culver Community School Corporation was formed. I automatically became a member of the first School Board. From this experience and from my experience as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Woodlawn Hospital for the last thirteen years, I know what it is like to have others try to make decisions for me. I know that we are agreed on this one point - "we want the best school that we can afford." To achieve this we must have good teachers working harmoniously under the most favorable conditions. This we have had and would like to maintain here in Aubbeenaubee Township. The thought of losing this is why so many

people in our community are so greatly disturbed, and certainly this is easy to understand. I only wish each Board Member could have visited the school here when it was in session. I know they would have been very favorably impressed. Good teachers, good school facilities, including well heated and lighted classrooms, large gymnasium, ten acre well equipped playground, cafeteria, rest rooms and a good location - these are the factors that have made the Aubbeenaubee School the good school that it was. I sincerely hope that before making your decision in regard to any long range plans for the future of our school district you will momentarily imagine yourself living in our community and having had the privilege of sharing its benefits and good qualities with us. I believe too, that from an economic viewpoint it would be wise and feasible to continue using the school site at Letters Ford as long as the buildings are structurally sound. This should be for several years, considering they have been in use for only 25 years. The extra cost for maintenance and operation would be small compared to even the interest on the bonds for a new building. I am enclosing a letter written to me by W. O. Osborn, after Ralph Stayton and I have talked to him in regard to our school situation. We had also previously discussed the matter with George Stevens of Plymouth. His opinion was no different from that of Mr. Osborn. Both believe that there should be a school at Letters Ford. Mr. Osborn and Mr. Stevens were the attorneys in fighting the battle to bring the Culver Community School into existence.

**CULVER SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT PROJECT APPROVED**

Culver - Dr. Robert Irvine of the civil engineering department of Notre Dame University has notified the Culver Town Board that funding for a two year project at the towns sewage treatment plant has been approved. Notre Dame University, the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency and Indiana's State Board of Health are cooperating on the Culver project, the first of its kind in this country.

According to the Culver Town Board, the goal of the project is improved treatment of the Town's wastewater by a newly developed "Batch" treatment process which is expected to reduce the amount of energy and chemicals used.

The U.S. EPA and Notre Dame are providing money for the installation of new equipment and for an engineering study over the next two years. The engineering study is expected to result in an operational process specifically designed for small towns throughout the country which have limited manpower and financial resources.

According to Robert Breyfogle, Culver's sewage treatment superintendent, Notre Dame University intends to hire two local persons to assist as project technicians. Applicants for these jobs should have a background in chemistry and math and a desire to learn wastewater treatment operations.

At least one of the project employees is expected to be retained by the Town of Culver in a full time capacity at the completion of the two year project. Personnel interested should contact the Culver Town Hall; telephone 842-3140.

### DR. DARRELL BEACH RECEIVES AWARD

Culver - Dr. Darrell H. Beach holder of the Eugene C. Eppley Chair of Chemistry at Culver Military and Culver Girls Academies and chairman of the American Chemical Society's Advanced Level Examination Committee, has been named one of eight high school instructors in the nation to receive the 1979 Manufacturing Chemists Association's Catalyst Award. The 1979 award is also to be given to six college instructors and four junior college instructors.

The MCA program is believed to sponsor the only national chemistry award honoring high school, two-year college and four year college teachers with identical awards, with award winners chosen on the basis of teaching excellence, motivation of students to careers in chemistry and allied fields, dedication to science instruction and scholarship, and ability to highlight the relevance of chemistry to society and good citizenship.

Announcement of the awards was made originally at a meeting of the National Science Teachers Association in Atlanta, Ga., and was made internationally on April 2 at the American Chemical Society's International Congress in Honolulu, Hawaii. Dr. Beach was in attendance in Hawaii to accept the award.

Dr. Beach, a co-winner in 1977 of the Outstanding High School Chemistry Teacher award presented by the Purdue University Section of the American Chemical Society, has taught at the Academies since 1965. He has been listed in "Who's Who in American Education" since 1961 and in "Community Leaders and Noteworthy Americans" since 1975 and in the "International Biographical Dictionary."
