CULVER SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT PROJECT APPROVED

Culver - Dr. Robert Irvine of the civil engineering department of Notre Dame University has notified the Culver Town Board that funding for a two year project at the towns sewage treatment plant has been approved. Notre Dame University, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Indiana's State Board of Health are cooperating on the Culver project, the first of its kind in this country.

According to the Culver Town Board, the goal of the is improved project treatment of the Towns' wastewater by a newly developed "Batch" treatment process which is expected to reduce the amount munity schools may be the of energy and chemicals used.

The U.S. EPA and Notre Dame are providing money for the installation of new equipment and for an engineering study over the next two years. The engineering study is expected to result in an operational process specifically designed for small towns throughout the country which have limited manpower and financial resources.

According to Robert Breyfogle, Culvers' sewage treatment superintendent, Notre Dame University intends to hire two local persons to assist as project technicians. Applicants for these jobs should have a background in chemistry and math and a desire to learn wastewater treatment operations.

DR. DARRELL BEACH RECEIVES AWARD

Culver - Dr. Darrell H. Beach holder of the Eugene C. Eppley Chair of Chemistry at Culver Military and Culver Girls Academies and chairman of the American Chemical Society's Advanced Level Examination Committee, has been named one of eight high school instructors in the nation to receive the 1979 Manufacturing Chemists Association's Catalyst Award. The 1979 award is also to be given to six college instructors and four junior college insturctors. The MCA program is

believed to sponsor the only national chemistry award honoring high school, twoyear college and four year college teachers with identical awards, with award winners chosen on the basis of teaching excellence, motivation of students to careers in chemistry and allied fields, dedication to science instruction and scholarship, and ability to highlight the relevance of chemistry to society and good citizenship.

Announcement of the awards was made originally at a meeting of the National Science Teachers Association in Atlanta, Ga., and was made internationally on April 2 at the American Chemical Society's International Congress in Honolulu, Hawaii. Dr. Beach was in attendance in Hawaii to accept the award.

Dr. Beach, a co-winner in 1977 of the Outstanding High School Chemistry Teacher award presented by the Purdue University Section of the American Chemical Society, has taught at the Academies since 1965. He has been listed in "Who's Who in American Education" since 1961 and in "community Leaders and Noteworthy Americans" since 1975 and in the "International Biographical Dictionary."
