## DELINQUENT DOG TAX

Culver - Culver residents are reminded that their 1979 Dog Tax was due on or before April 1, 1979. Records indicate that several persons have not yet purchased current tags and these persons are asked to do so by contacting the Office of the Clerk-Treasurer during regular business hours.

These tags are required under Indiana State Law and local ordinances for all dogs six months of age and older. It is also mandatory that all dogs be vaccinated against rabies and dog owners are urged to check their records in keeping yearly rabie vaccinations up to date.

## Two Instructors Honored At CMA

Culver - Two master instructors of the Culver Military and Culver Girls Academies in Culver, were honored recently by their colleagues at a special faculty banquet held in recognition of their combined 56 years of service to Culver and their pending retirements from teaching in June.

They are Myron E. Benner, holder of the Academies' prestigious William Pitt Oakes Memorial Chair of Mathematics, and Wallace H. Helber, distinguished senior instructor in the schools' department of science.



Mr. Benner, who, upon retirement, will have completed 33 years of service to Culver, has been a member of the Academy faculty since 1946, prior to which he served a four-year tour of duty with the U. S. Air Force in the North Atlantic.

During his Culver career, Benner has taught physics, chemistry, and mathematics, having been for many years instructor of the senior Advanced Placement mathematics courses. He was named to an endowed chair position in 1975.

In paying tribute to Benner, Culver Superintendent Dean John R. Mars said: "Myron's quiet dignity and competence have always been evident, whether it be in his teaching or in his avocation of home improvement. As a teacher, he has never failed to respond to a student's quest for learning; and, in the process, he has earned the respect of countless students, parents, and fellow instructors. He will leave behind him a challenge to future Culver faculty to approximate his example of excellence in teaching procedure."

The second of Culver's pending retirees, Mr. Wallace Helber, has been associated with the Academies since 1956. A graduate of Southeast Missouri State College (1941) he earned his master's degree in education from the University of Missouri in 1955 and an MAT degree in earth sciences from Indiana University in 1968. Post-graduate credits include those earned at the American University, the University of North Carolina, Denver University and Earlham College.



Helber has been a teacher of chemistry, geology, astronomy, and biology at Culver and, in his spare time, has established himself, as well, as an accomplished organic gardener. In 1969, he was a contributing author to Chemistry: Experimental Foundations, a secondary school textbook published by Prentice-Hall, Inc., whose writing team was headed by Dr. Robert W. Parry of the University of Michigan.

Superintendent Mars praised Helber's Culver teaching career by saying: "Wally Helber has had the respect of all of his fellow instructors, but especially is that true of his department colleagues, who have seen at close range his teaching expertise and dedication. The science department is losing a dedicated gentleman, one who will be remembered for many years to come as one of the kindest human beings we all have had the pleasure of knowing."

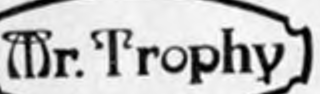


#### GRADUATION DAYS

### THREE DAY WORKSHOP FOR 4-H YOUTH

Culver - A three day workshop for 4-H youth who have a special interest in agronomic and horticultural projects will be conducted again this year at Purdue University, according to David Trotter, Marshall County Extension Agency-Youth.

The event, known as the Plant Science Jamboree, will be held June 4-6 on the Purdue campus.

Last year more than 150 boys and girls attended the workshop, gaining a better understanding of these fields and then sharing their new knowledge with other youths in their respective counties.

Youths who will be enrolled in grades 9 through 12 this fall are eligible to attend. But the delegates must have participated in one or more years of 4-H work in field crops or horticulture. This includes projects in corn, soybeans, wheat, oats, alfalfa, commodity marketing, flowers, gardening, strawberries, potatoes, and home grounds improvement. Supportive projects in entomology, soils, water conservation, tractor, etc.

Trotter said each county is eligible to select one delegate from each of the four categories, corn, hay silage and pasture; soybeans, wheat, oats, and barley; ornamentals, trees, flowers, shrubs and lawn; and fruits, and vegetables, strawberries, garden, potatoes and tomatoes.

Sponsoring the Jamboree program again this year are the Indiana Farm Bureau Insurance Companies, the Indiana Crop Improvement Associations, the Crops Division of the Indiana Farm Bureau Cooperative Association, Inc., the Cooperative Extension Service, and the Departments of Horticulture and Agronomy at Purdue.

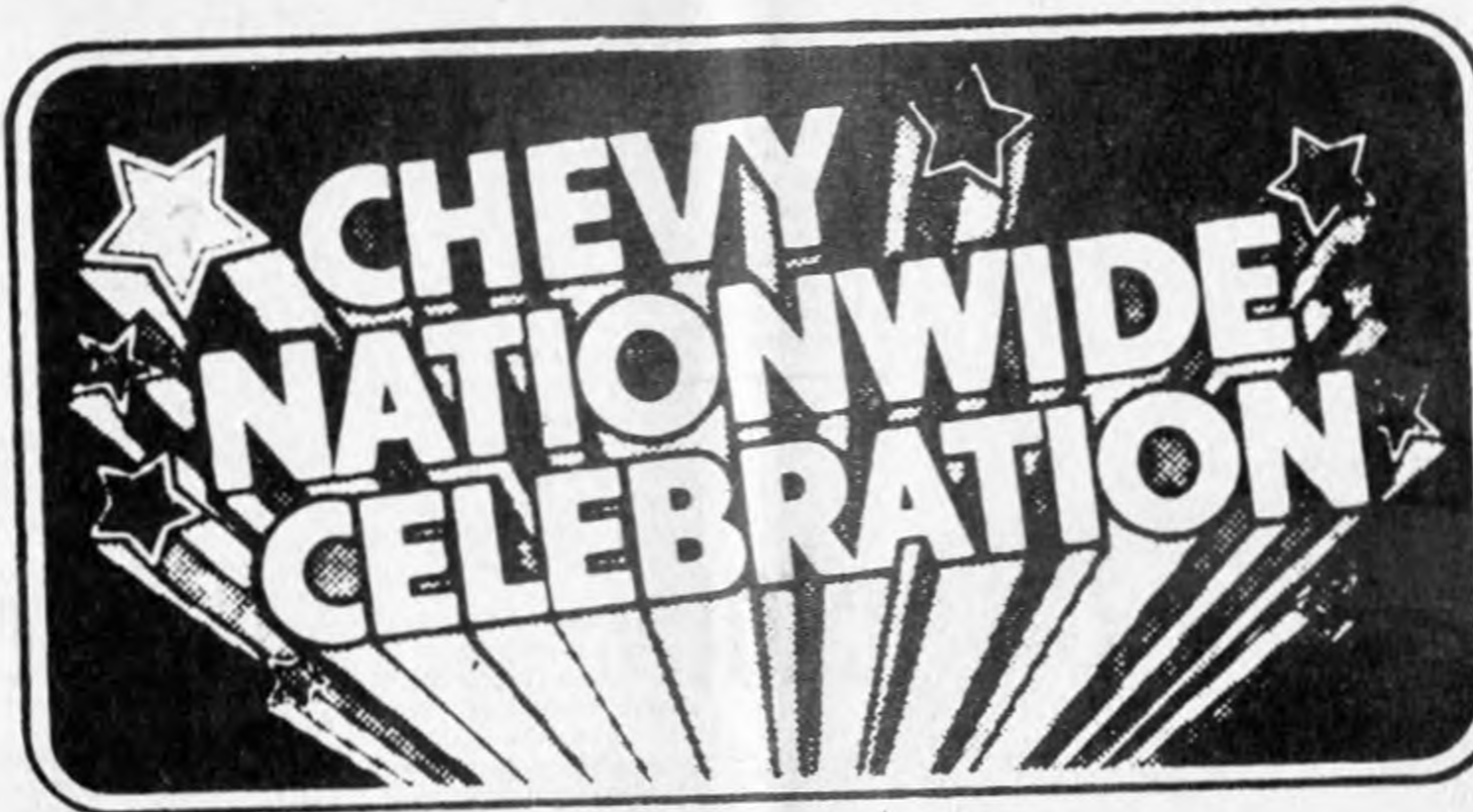

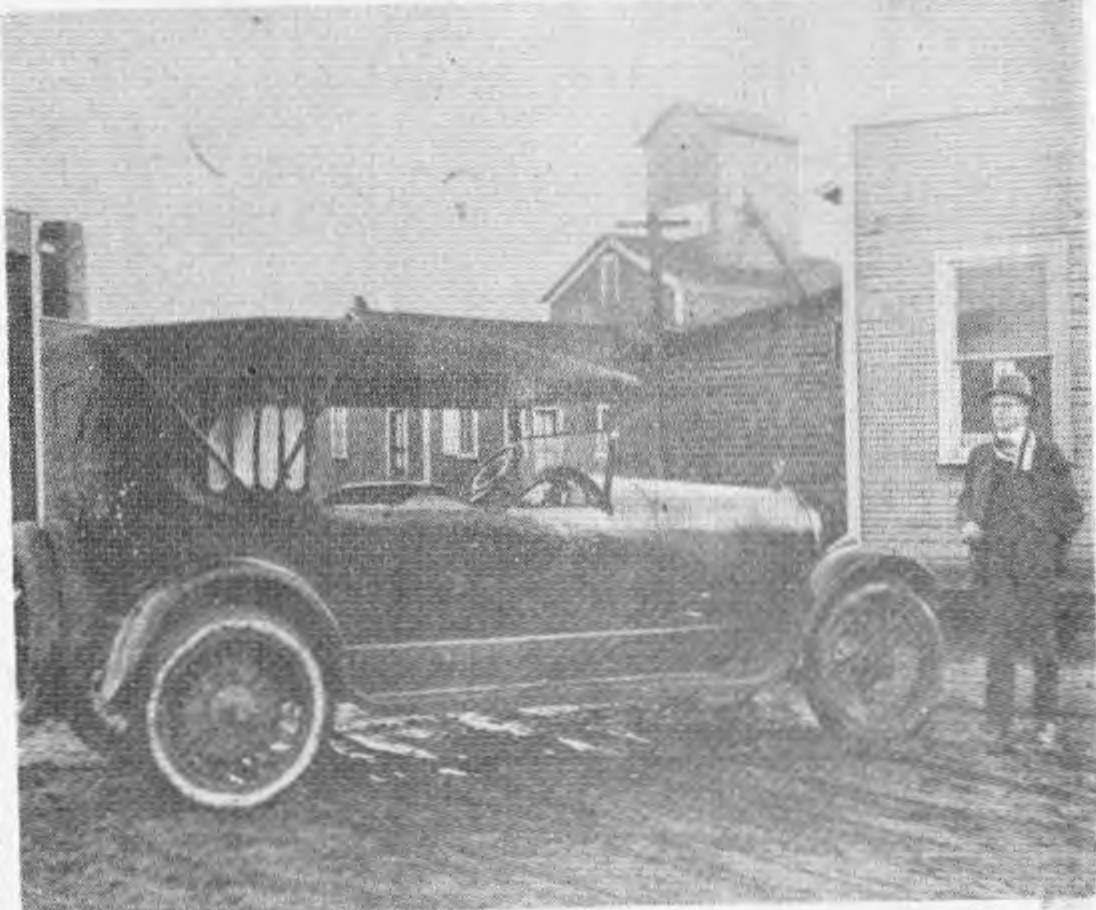

Steam heat was installed in the Argos school in 1907.

In 1923 Argos school added an agriculture and home economics course.

Argos school added a gym, stage, and large auditorium.

The new school at its present location on Yearick Street was completed.

The "Argos Community Schools" now include Green and Walnut Township Schools.

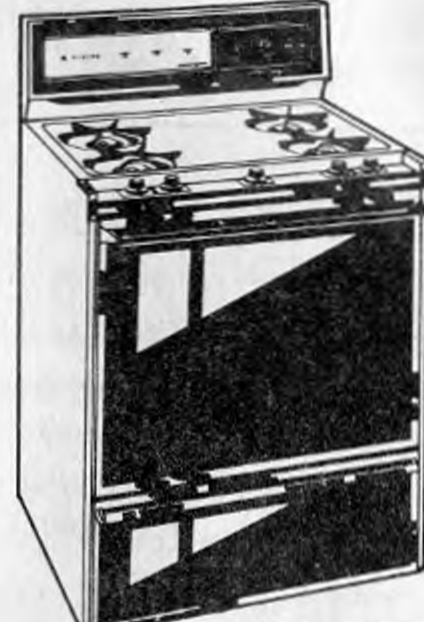

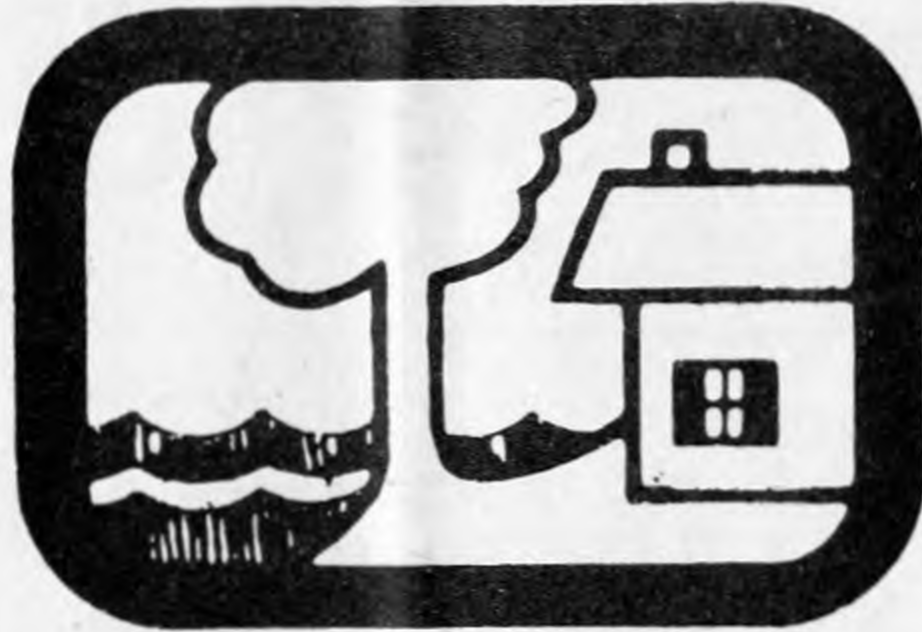

Argos, with a record of 8-8, will play Triton on Monday at the Plymouth Country Club.

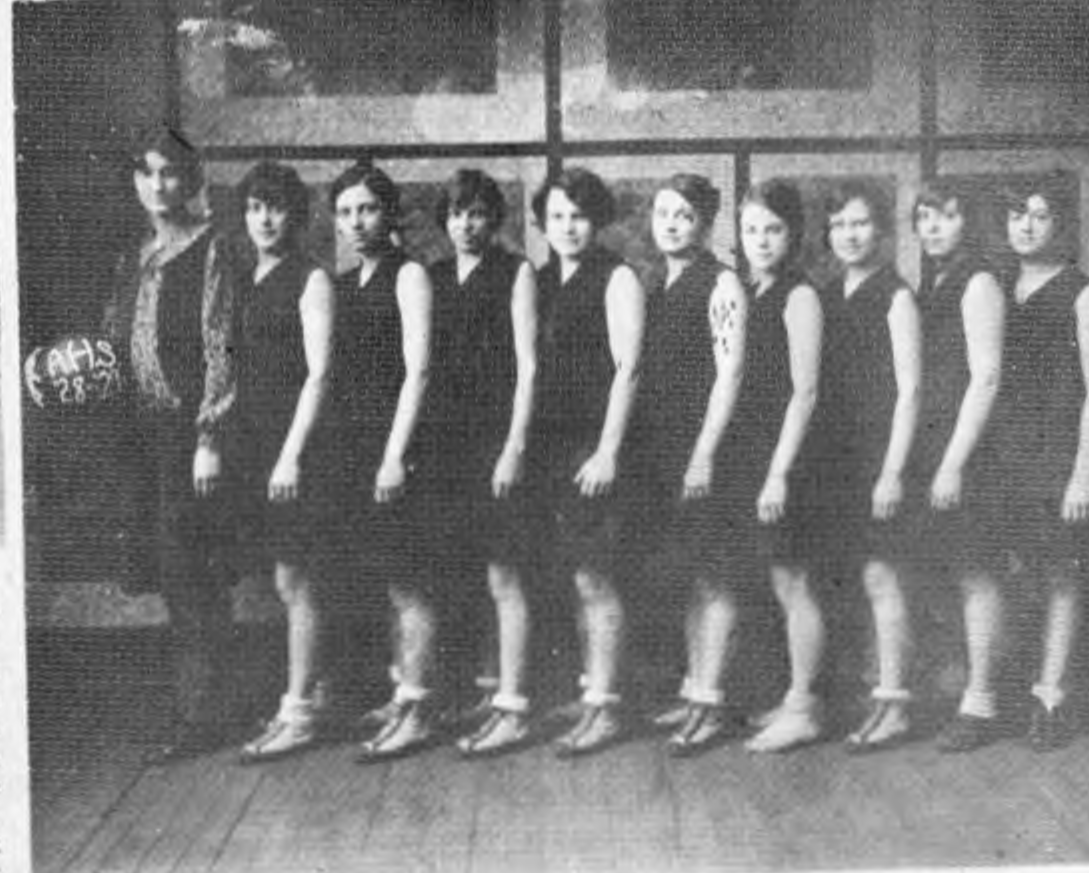

## '79 Was Not The Only Undeclared Season In Argos Basketball History

Argos - Contrary to popular belief 1978-79 was not the first undefeated basketball season in Argos. In 1928-29 the Argos girls' basketball team played an 18 game undefeated season. In a post-season game they were defeated by Wabash. Out of a total of 47 games between 1926 and 1929 the girls lost only 3.

At that time "Three court basketball" was played by girls' teams. The guards stayed in the back court and got control of the ball. It was then passed to the center or side center who stayed in the middle court. From there the ball was passed to the front court to the forwards, who were the only players allowed to shoot.

This picture was loaned to the Argos Tribune by Mary (Bowell) Ritter. Mary played on the county basketball team the two years following 1929. During the next two years she served as a referee. Mrs. Ritter is now retired from the high school office of the Argos Community Schools.

Argos - Gerald M. Hess, superintendent of the Argos Community Schools, has released the following information.

Students will be in regular attendance full days through Thursday, May 24, 1979. Teachers will finalize grading and do recording on Friday, May 25, 1979.

Graduation exercises were held at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday, May 20, 1979, in the school gymnasium.

Report Cards will be distributed in the following manner:

1. If a student brings a stamped self-addressed envelope to one of the school offices, the card may be placed in the mail as soon as Friday, May 25, and if not then, by no later than Tuesday, May 29.

2. Cards will be available at the school offices as follows: a) From 4:00 p.m. until 4:30 on Friday, May 25. b) From 8:00 a.m. until noon, and from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of the following week.

3. Cards remaining after May 31st will be mailed on Friday, June 1st.

High school summer classes in Driver Education and Typing are scheduled to start on Thursday, May 31st and continue through Thursday, July 26. An Economics class will begin on June 29 and be completed on July 26.

Elementary summer school begins on Thursday, May 31 and ends on Thursday, July 12. Classes in remedial math and reading will be held from 9 to 10 a.m. during the thirty-day period.

No summer school classes will be held on Wednesday, July 4.

The Angry 12 originally presented under the title of Twelve Angry Men as a live TV play, is the Culver Academies Commencement play. This first performance will be given on Friday, May 25 and is open to the public without admission charge. The final production is June 1, with both starting at 8:00 p.m.

During rehearsals on the stage of Eppley Auditorium, the play has undergone some changes. Four of the male characters have been replaced by angry women. The play has also been slimmed down, running about an hour without intermission, and the Culver version is now close to the original on TV, which won an Emmy for Author Reginald Rose.

Regardless of the changes, The Angry 12 remains a dramatic study of one of our most important democratic institutions - the jury system. It shows the functioning of this system as

twelve ordinary people confront one another in their struggle to reach a verdict.

Two jurors who lock in a deadly battle to dominate the thinking of the others are portrayed by Alex Hernandez of Kankakee, Ill. and Brian Begley, Columbus, Indiana, who is a star of Culver's State-Championship hockey team. The play is under the direction of Harvey Firari, whose original script of Deadlock was brought to the stage last winter.

This play has all the suspense of great courtroom dramas - and more, said Director Firari. "A young man stands accused of murder. Although his actual trial is never presented in the play, the jury's deliberation becomes a trial in itself. Here the tension builds to explosive force. It is not only the boy who is on trial, but the twelve people of the jury and the jury system itself." (See Letter to Editor).

1, 1979; (2) The residence is located in Indiana; (3) The individual has a beneficial interest in the taxpayer; Examples of a beneficial interest could be a life estate, a trust, or an individual who, has a financial interest in a corporation and the corporation owns the property in which he or she resides; (4) The taxpayer either owns the residence or is buying under a contract, recorded in the Marshall County Recorder's office, that provides he is to pay the property taxes on the residence.

Other information and instructions follow.

File by July 1, 1979, at Marshall County Auditors by mail or in person, The "Home Credit" is not to be confused with deductions such as mortgage, age, blind, etc., because they are deductions from valuation while the Homestead Credit is a percentage reduction of the tax liability attributed to

the residential portion of the property. It will appear and be administered much in the same manner as the property tax replacement credit.

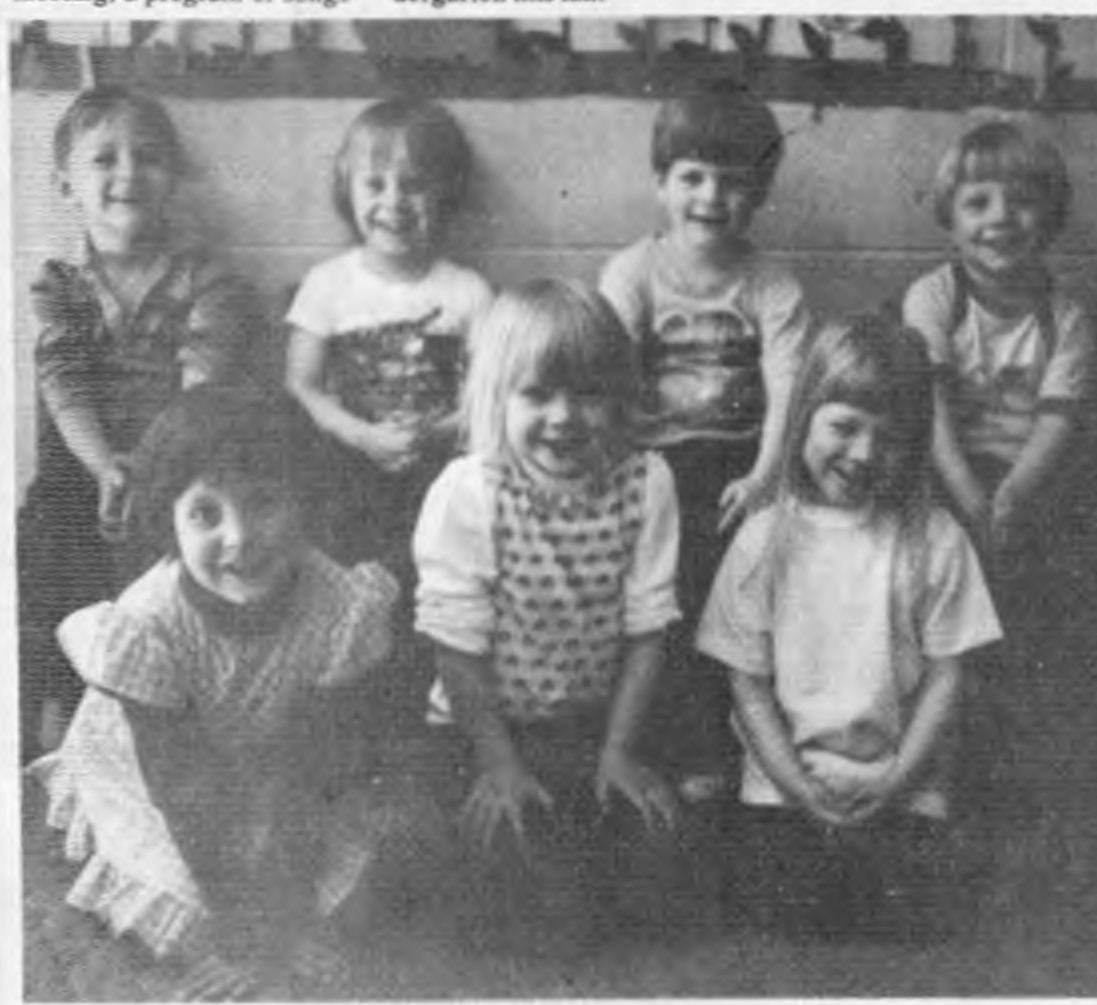
**Argos Nursery School Graduates**

**ARGOS HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS**

1859 - Hague & Brothers and J.M. Wickizer opened general stores.

1863 - Robert Railsback built and opened a steam flouring mill.

1864 - The first Argos Methodist Church was built. War prices: whiskey \$100 a gallon, corn \$50 a bushel, wheat flour \$200 a barrel.

1865 - Mr. Dennison opened a small drug store.

1866 - The Argos band was organized. Jonathan Pickel and Wesley Spencer started a boot and shoe store. Nathaniel Chapman and son opened a hardware store.

1867 - Al Wickizer opened an undertaking establishment; ambulance service was provided by a horse drawn rig. Charles Riddle began publishing a semi-weekly, "Argos Globe."

1868 - Leonard Bock bought half interest in the flour mill. The north-south railroad was completed from LaPorte to Argos. Within a few months it was extended on to Peru.

1869 - In December Argos was incorporated under Indiana laws. The Argos Masonic Lodge #399 was organized. Daily mail service began via railroad. On December 4 Argos held its first election.

1870 - The Church of God was dedicated.

1874 - The new Congregational Christian Church was dedicated.

1878 - A.C. Firestone began publishing in "Argos Reflector". The Marshall Co. Medical Society organized in Argos on May 13.

1880 - Argos had 7 grocery stores, 12 doctors, 3 hotels, 2 saloons, and 3 billiard halls. The population was 622. Maple Grove began being used for burials.

1881 - Argos had a six month school term. Wheat yield was 12 bu. per acre. The Rupe brothers opened a Sorghum factory and cider mill.

1882 - The Nickel Plate Railroad began operating east and west through Argos. The Conner Hardward was opened for business.

1883 - Schoonovers opened. Argos high school got a 3 year commission.

1886 - Argos high school graduated its first class - 5 young women.

 You are invited to attend showings of the Commencement play, The Angry 12, on Friday evening, May 25 at 8 p.m. You may, if you wish, attend the final production on Friday, June 1, at 8 p.m. A pre-showing was held on Sunday, May 20. During rehearsals on the stage of Eppley, the play has undergone some radical changes (hopefully without violating the original intention of the author). Four of the angry men have been replaced by four equally-angry women.  
 The play has also been slimmed down and runs one hour and ten minutes without intermission. In essence, then, the Culver version will have taken the play full circle.  
 The Angry 12 was first presented as a live TV play under the title of Twelve Angry Men and won an Emmy. Later, in 1957, Author Reginald Rose expanded the hour long drama into a full length film. Now, as an old movie, it occasionally appears on TV.  
 The expanded version was adopted for the stage as a three act play. The expansion, plus two intermissions, may have released the tension. The Culver version will determine if it was a mistake to expand the play. I certainly will appreciate your evaluation of our version, and I will pass any valid judgments along to Reginald Rose.  
 Regardless of the changes, The Angry 12 remains a dramatic study of one of our most important democratic institutions -- the jury system. It shows the functioning of this system as twelve ordinary people confront one another in their struggle to reach a verdict.  
 Meantime, the search for another concert-series program continues, but scheduling problems have eliminated some very promising shows. But don't give up; miracles have happened in the past. If, however, no show can be integrated into the tight schedule of May, an attempt will be made to make next year's concert series the best one ever, (including a return engagement of the extraordinary DIMITRI and some exotic Polynesian performers.)  
 Some excellent student dance programs and music concerts will be presented during Commencement week. If you need more information, call me or the Fine Arts office.
