The Emergency Medical Service - Three Years Later

Culver - It was in a general meeting three years ago that Ron Gleason, the Union Township trustee, told the residents of the town and townships about the changes in the ambulance service that would be required by January of 1980. Since the group at the meeting felt that an area service was a necessity, it was decided that the Culver - Union Township Emergency Medical Service should be formed.

The remainder of that year was busy for the small group of people who were responsible for bringing together the manpower and resources that would get the program underway. Two way radios were needed for communications between the base station and the emergency medical technicians (E.M.T.'s) the community responded, and

by September, money began to come in from groups throughout the community. Volunteers for training as E.M.T.'s were recruited during the summer and fall with the result that the first group of ten men and women started class work in February of 1977. Other classes were to follow, and the ranks of the E.M.T.'s grew.

It was in September of 77 that the E.M.T.'s began to assume their duties under the auspices of the Bonine Funeral Home. At first, the group worked only during the night, but as their numbers increased they began to cover the day shift as well. Under the guidance and leadership of Jim Bonine, the confidence of the E.M.T.'s grew. Soon the blare of the radio during the day, or the ring of the telephone in the middle of the night no

longer brought that instant of doubt as it had on that first call. We were in business - in the first six month of operation, the E.M.T.'s answered 107 calls with Mr. Bonine.

We were aware of the fact that a new ambulance would be needed, and we knew that part of the cost would be borne by the state and federal government. The big question was whether or not the community could raise their share of the twenty-five thousand dollar vehicle. The answer was a resounding yes. Starting in October of 1978, the people began to respond to the call. Farm groups, clubs, sewing circles, industries and individuals gave... and gave... and gave. The net result was that by early June this year, the community had given nearly nineteen thousand dollars - enough to pay for

our share of the ambulance and the equipment to put in it.

It may sound as though all of the problems have been solved, but such is not the case. Although the big financial tests are now behind us, the service still needs people, and always will. These service needs people who can serve as ambulance drivers - no special license is necessary, only a desire to serve. Dispatchers are also needed - no experience is needed, we will be happy to train you.

If you are interested in either position as a volunteer, then contact Jack Easterday, or Ron Gleason both would be delighted to hear from you. Please remember that this is our service - yours and mine - its up to us to make it work.

During the regular season, and especially during the playoffs that were played at Culver, only compliments are heard from opposing teams and officials, who remembered the conditions a year ago.

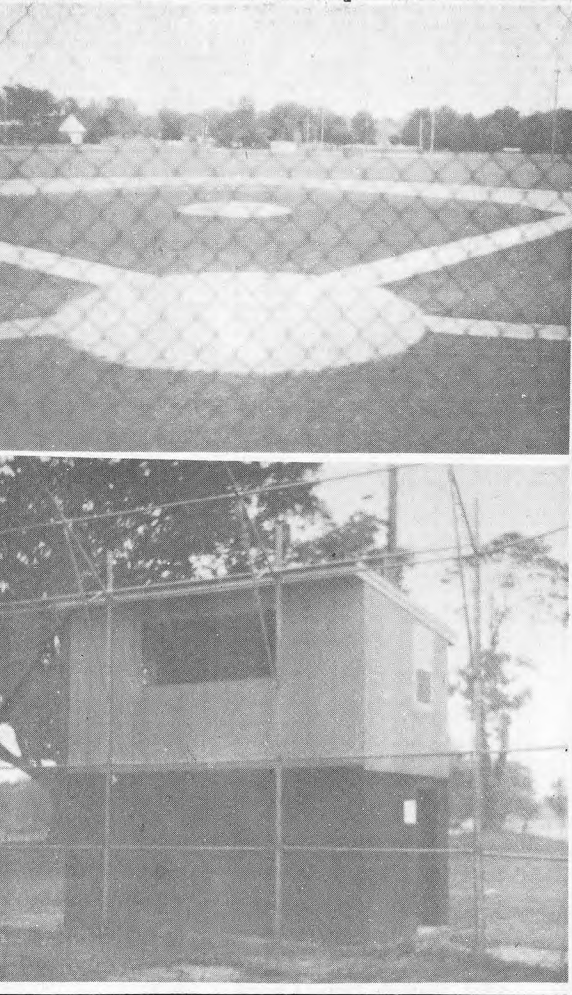

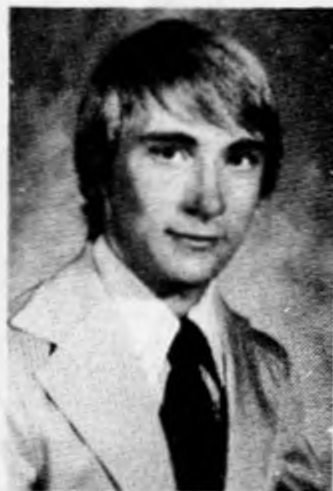

Mrs. Albert Northrop presented a delightful and interesting program on the art of china painting. She was assisted by Mrs. Teeter who gave a demonstration of the technique and materials used.

June, month of brides, finds registration of lists of the kinds of china and patterns preferred by the bride at local shops. Included in these may be pottery Corelle, ironstone, melmac or porcelain. The latter was first found in China by Marco Polo and much time and research was spent in Europe trying to figure out how the seashell finish was produced, the type of clay used and the secret of pentuse, a crystalline substance that produces the sheen and gloss.

Bone ash is mixed in for strength for the bone china of England and honey was originally used for the gold finishing. All types of China are fired at different temperatures and if painted before the firing, there is danger of the color running. This is sometimes desired, as in the flow blue.

Red Earthenware much like our clay firepots was a primitive type of china. Silk screening is used to transfer designs to resemble hand painting. The bisque finish requires no glaze. Patterns displayed were the popular Blue Willow, Dresden - which indicated the area produced. Delft, Royal Copenhagen, Haviland - in which its cobalt blue makes it costly, a specimen of the Jasperware, Wedgwood and the Rose Medallion and Canton, are examples from China.

Mrs. Teeter, in her demonstration, pointed out her method of mixing color, the care used in applying very thin to be translucent, and the care to be used in firing. Free-hand painting is preferred and she like the mook sable brushes. Her efforts crested a trivet in a delicate rose design.

PUBLISHER'S 'PINION

The State of Indiana through its 92 counties has been busy the last few years reassessing the property for tax purposes. It has been since 1968 (a full ten years) since the last reassessment. During that 10 year period the value of property skyrocketed while the assessed valuation remained the same. Consequently, we all have been getting a nice personal property tax break for many years.

During the last few weeks, all property owners have been receiving their new Notice of Assessment of Land and Improvements. A small segment of the populace has been pleased that their assessed valuation increased only a slight amount. However, the majority of the property owners of the state have been astounded at the increase.

Your hometown newspaper has received reports of tax assessment increases as high as 150 to 175%. In these times of high inflation of everything, this tax re-adjustment is going to create an extremely heavy burden on all property owners.

The State of Indiana recognizes this dilemma and is giving a straight 20% reduction of the assessed valuation and also a 10% reduction to home owners through a Homestead Property Tax Homestead Pm has been Credit. This formhomeowner mailed to each homeowner along with the new reassessment notice.

This Homestead Credit only applies to homeowners. Other property is excluded from the credit. The deadline for filing this credit is July 1st. You are urged to fill out the form and return it as soon as possible.

It is our understanding that the State of Indiana is in excellent shape financially. Thus, they will not need all of the money that reassessment

will bring. So, they are giving a 30% rebate. We also understand that the tax rate in most areas will be lowered in the coming year which will also ease the tax bite.

A big question arises. Why are we once again going into a rebate/credit program? If the government does not need the money - then lower everything to adjust. It appears to us that a rebate program is really a way of saying "We don't need the money now - but when we do - we have a way of getting it."

We feel this situation would be the same as if we charged \$1.00 for each copy of the newspaper, but gave everybody an 80% credit - collecting only 20¢. This method of operation seems backward to us.

Could it be the State of Indiana is once again creating a leverage. Do things our way or we will not give you credits!!!!!!

APPLICATIONS FOR STATE ENERGY ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE

Argos - Applications for the State Allowance for Energy (Project SAFE) will be accepted at all electric utilities in Indiana starting Monday, June 18.

"Electric utility spokesmen have asked me to make very clear that those eligible for assistance have through March of 1980 to make application," says Jean Merritt, executive director of the Indiana Office of Community Services Administration, the state agency which administers the program.

She continues, "People at the utilities would like to see applications made at a steady pace through the duration of Project SAFE. There is no reason, in this instance, to be first in line."

To be eligible, a person must be 65 years of age prior to February 29, 1980, and meet income guidelines. In a single person household, the yearly income cannot exceed \$3,140. In a two person household, the income cannot exceed \$4,160.

Also eligible are blind and disabled Hoosiers who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) under the Social Security Program. They are eligible regardless of age.

Maximum heating fuel and/or electric bill assistance is \$200 for the five month heating season. Successful applicants will receive deductions from their electric and/or fuel bills during this period.

Utilities and fuel bill suppliers will receive credits against sales tax they would otherwise pay the State of Indiana.

FATHER'S DAY MARKED 14 YEARS FOR ARGOS MINISTER

Argos - On April 25, 1965, Pastor Ray Oviatt preached at the First Baptist Church as a candidate and was extended a call. The Oviatt family arrived in Argos on June 15, 1965. His first message as pastor was given on Father's Day, June 20, 1965.

Organist at the time was Martha Garmon and pianist was Shiela Solomon Beers. Sunday School Attendance was 89 with Morning Worship of 79 and Evening service with 62. Wednesday Prayer Meeting was 59. The offering was only \$155.90.

As the parsonage was only half paid for at the time, the total net worth was about \$4,000. Today the church facilities total over a quarter of a million dollars with equity of over \$118,000. During these 14 years Pastor Oviatt has laid to rest 51

members and friends, married 21 couples, and preached approximately 2000 messages. Of the 72 family units now attending, only 13 were here when Pastor Oviatt began his ministry.

In February 1977, the parsonage was sold to the Stettler's and in November 1977, the Oviatts moved into their lovely new home on Linden Road.

Of their five children, Kandy is the only Hoosier-born. Kathy, Karyn, Kent and Kris were all born in Pennsylvania. Pastor and Mrs. Oviatt came from Pennsylvania where they served the First Baptist Church of Galeton for 9 years. On June 14, 1979, Pastor Oviatt will have been ordained for 23 years.

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UTS FILES FOR DIRECTORY ASSISTANCE CHARGES

Argos - United Telephone Co. of Indiana recently filed a request with the Public Service Commission of Indiana to charge for directory assistance services.

George L. White, president of the Warsaw-based firm, said that if the request is approved, United would begin the charge procedures no sooner than January 1,

1980. The program is similar to the one the Commission recently approved for Indiana Bell Telephone Co. United's plan includes the following provisions. Anyone needing further details should call their local United business office.

Customers would be allowed a number of free local directory assistance calls based on the number of line or type of telephone system they use. For

example, a residence with one main line would have a maximum of 5 free calls per month. A business firm with a PBX system with 3 main trunks would have a maximum allowance of 15 free local directory assistance calls per month. Any excess over the allowance would be billed at the rate of 20¢ per call.

Customers would be allowed one free call to DDD information (1-555-1212) for

each DDD call in their own area code that appears on their bill, up to a maximum of 5 free calls per month. Business customers would be allowed a number of free DDD directory assistance calls on a basis similar to that outlined above. Any excess over the allowance would be billed at the rate of 20¢ per call.

A maximum of 2 requested numbers would be handled on any one directory assist-

ance call. A charge of 40¢ per call would be billed for directory assistance calls placed when the customer requests credit card or third number billing of directory assistance charges. There would be no allowance for free calls in these categories.

ADVANCE LIFE SUPPORT PROVIDED BY AMBULANCE SERVICE

Culver - During the past few months, more than 60 E.M.T.'s (Emergency Medical Technicians) from various area ambulance providers have been taking training to start intravenous solutions (I.V.'s) in the field.

With Marshall County Parkview Hospital acting as a supervisory facility, E.M.T. representatives from Argos Community Ambulance Service, Bourbon Ambulance Service, Braman and Sons Ambulance Service in Knox, Culver Community Ambulance Service, North Liberty Ambulance Service, Plymouth Community Ambulance Service, Rannell's Ambulance Service in Hamlet and Koontz Lake, and Union - North Ambulance Service, have received the advance training.

The training has consisted of the first three modules of the Department of Transportation Program for Advanced Life Support. At the present time, the State Emergency Medical Services Commission has approved the Parkview Hospital program, the various ambulance providers and the Emergency Medical Technicians for parenteral injections of appropriate solutions.

This new training and certification permits the trained E.M.T. to start an appropriate I.V. prior to transport under the radio communication directions of the hospital's Emergency Room personnel. The E.M.T.'s will start the I.V.'s to help stabilize the patient prior to transport to an Emergency Room facility.

In order to qualify for certification, participants completed an intensive three hour class one night a week for twelve weeks, successfully completed a written examination, and demonstrated proficiency in starting I.V.'s in order to maintain amination, and demonstrated proficiency in starting I.V.'s.

In order to maintain certification each E.M.T. with Advance Life Support Training must achieve eighteen hours of Continuing Education each year, successfully complete a written examination every six months, and successfully start a specific number of I.V.'s each month.

The hospital's advisory committee for Advance Life Support will review and audit all aspects of the care provided by E.M.T.'s where an I.V. was started in the field, on a monthly basis.

Intravenous solutions and supplies are being provided to the ambulance services by Parkview Hospital. The hospital will bill the patients for supplies utilized.

This new service will be initiated later this month, after administrative details are completed.

Commencing at the southwest corner of the northwest quarter of Section 16, T. 32 N., R. 1E, Union Twp., Marshall Co., Indiana; then due east 2.17 feet to the west line of old Indiana S.R. 16, then due north a distance of 603.10 feet, then north 87 degrees 38'34" west parallel with the south line of Indiana S.R. 10, a distance of 419.65 ft. to the place of beginning, then south 1 degree 48'00" west, along the projection of the westerly line of Lot 9 in Maxinkuckee Highlands First Addition a distance of 462.81 ft. to the northwest corner of said Lot 9, then northwesterly along the east and north edge of the curve of Forest Place to a place approximately 300 ft. west of the east boundary line of this parcel, then northerly approximately 480 ft. to the south line of the parcel presently zoned commercial which south line is parallel to and 300 ft. south of S.R. 10, then easterly along this south line of the commercially zoned parcel for approximately 80.35 ft. to the place of beginning. This parcel of approximately 2.5 acres is subject to the results of an official survey.

Shall hereafter be within and part of that District in and by said Ordinance known and designated as R2 instead of within and part of the District known as Suburban.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, attestation and due publication.

ALAN M. BUNNER RECEIVES AWARD

Culver - Alan M. Bunner, chairman of the math department of Culver Military Academy - Culver Girls Academy, Culver, and holder of the school's prestigious Vlasic Endowed Chair of Teaching, has been named recipient of the 1979 Kaser Scholar Award, presented annually by the Culver Educational Foundation in recognition of a member of the faculty staff "whose scholarly interests, enthusiastic teaching, sympathetic understanding, and wise counsel combine to inspire students and kindle in them a zest for life and learning."

Bunner is the third recipient of the Kaser Award, which was established at Culver in 1977 by the parents, friends, and family of Mark B. Kaser, valedictorian of the CMA Class of 1975, who died tragically in an automobile accident in 1976. In the eyes of those who established the award, Mark Kaser personified those qualities which the award recognizes. A native of Fort Wayne, Indiana, the son of Mrs. Forest Bunner, who now also lives in Culver, Alan Bruner has been a member of the Culver mathematics department since his graduation from Purdue University in 1957. Prior to his college career, he served for three years with the U.S. Army in Germany.

He earned his master's degree also at Purdue -- on a General Electric Fellowship, with follow-up study later at Princeton and the University of Oklahoma on a National Science Foundation Fellowship.

During a sabbatical leave from Culver in 1965, he studied at Wesleyan University in Connecticut, also on a National Science Foundation grant.

Over the years, Brunner has been responsible for the introduction and implementation of two course syllabi within the Culver math curriculum: "Probability and Statistics" and "computer Mathematics."
