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TAKE A SECOND LOOK BEFORE MAILING LITTLE CARDS

Culver - What's socially acceptable today may not be well received in the future, It may be oh, so proper, but it is it mailable?

That's what consumers should determine before purchasing those tiny little invitations, RSVP, birth announcements, thank you notes and similar items which may not be mailable after July 15.

As of that date, the Postal Service will begin enforcing letter mail size standards, to reduce mail handling costs and eliminate one of the main causes of damaged or delayed mail.

the Under new regulation, letters and cards less than 31/2 by 5 inches will not be accepted for mailing. Extra large envelopes more than 61/8 by 111/2 inches will incur a 7 cent surcharge, if they weigh one ounce or less.

Those tiny envelopes create jams in mail processing machinery, damaging not only the small piece, but often other mail as well.

And the larger envelopes those subject to the surcharge -- cannot be processed by machine, but must be handled manually, at considerable higher cost For about three years the Postal Service has been working with envelope manufacturers and stationers to help them adapt to the new standards. Most of them long ago stopped production of the undersized items.

But, consumers should be wary of "bargain" prices offered by stores that might still have stocks of the nonmailable items.

Little cards and envelopes may be mailed after July 15 only if they are placed in larger, standard envelopes before mailing, the Postal Service says.

like to take this opportunity to show you what you'll need when you're released from the hospital, that is if you make it.'







know, if you are a resident of a nursing home, when your medication is changed. Talk to the nurse, ask that medication isn't duplicated. This is your right. Now your attitude. Still Smiling.....at 90 Argos - "She's still smil-ing" is the way Conrad Singpiel proudly described his wife, Koma, who will be celebrating her 90th birthday

on July 13. Mrs. Koma Singpiel, 201 E. Walnut St. in Argos, was born in Gilead, Indiana in 1889 to Amos and Sarah Sommer. She attended school in Gilead and at the age of 19 was stricken with polio, which left her paralyzed from the waist down. Despite this handicap, Koma went on to attend Rochester College which at that time was located in Rochester, Indiana. After leaving college, she went back to Gilead to teach. She also held the job of post mistress at the

Gilead Post Office and worked as a telephone operator in Akron, Indiana. The Post Office was located at the top of a steep flight of stairs, but this spirited lady seemed to thrive on challenges.

In 1925 Koma married Warren Stokes and took on the task of raising his seven children. In 1939 the Stokes family moved to Argos where she helped her husband run his sewing machine busi-ness. Some time after, this remarkable lady began writ-ing for the Argos Reflector, the South Bend Tribune, and later for the Plymouth Pilot. In later years, as her eye sight began to fail, she limited her writing to the South Bend Tribune.

Koma was left a widow in 1960 and in 1963 she married her present husband, Conrad Singpiel. Four years ago a fall which injured her back left her immobile. She still enjoys meeting new people, having the company of her many friends in Argos and Akron, the many step-children, grandchildren and greatgrandchildren who come to visit, and reading her Bible. She is a member of the Argos United Methodist Church. Her only sister, Jesse, died

several years ago. After 90 years of enthusiastic living Koma Singpiel has a philosophy of life which is both simple and beautiful, "If you treat people as decent human beings, they will, in turn, treat you the same.'

Argos - Secretary of Agri-culture Bob Berglund recently asked the public to comment by August 6 on pro-posals for the 1980 wheat program.

He also asked for comment on whether barley and oats should be included in the 1980 feed grain program and whether program decisions on barley and oats should be announced at the same time as for the wheat.

Berglund proposed to make the following determinations:

1. The amount of the national program acreages.

2. The reduction from the previous year's harvested acreage required to guarantee established (target) price protection on the total 1980 planted acreage.

3. Whether there should Vi be set-aside requirements and, if so, the extent of the set-aside.

4. If a set-aside or land diversion program is required, whether a limitation should be placed on planted

acreage. 5. Whether there should be a land diversion program and, if so, the extent of such diversion and the level of payment.

6. The loan and purchase levels for 1980 crops of wheat, barley, oats, and rye.

7. Whether the special wheat acreage grazing and hay problems should be implemented.

8. The established (target) prices for wheat, barley, and oats.

9. Other related provisions such as: Commodity Credit Corporation minimum resale price, commodity eligibility, storage requirements, premiums and discounts and other provisions as may be necessary to carry out the program.

Before reaching his decision, the secretary will consider any recommendations and views regarding these items.
