Culver - Culver Festival Days will begin with the 2nd Annual Maxinkuckee Lake Run at 9 a.m. Saturday, July 28. Runners of all ages will be competing in the 15 kilometer (9.3 miles) around beautiful Lake Maxinkuckee, second largest natural lake in Indiana. They will start and finish at the public park at the beach and run through the campus at Culver Military Academy. The run is sponsored by the Maxinkuckee IOOF and Addidas Shoe Co.

A kiddie parade will start at Bonines at 12:30 p.m. and march through town.

Miller's Merry Manor Breaks Ground In Culver

Culver - The official groundbreaking for Miller's Merry Manor, to be built across from the high school in Culver was held on Thursday, July 12.

V. Richard Miller in an interview prior to the ceremony stated that Culver, being a unique community, the nursing care facility should have a unique design. It will feature three pods, each containing 22 beds. The first wing should be ready for occupancy in January, Miller said. The entire \$800,000 facility should be completed by

May. The new nursing home will be for "intermediate care" officials stated. Although, it will not provide the intensive post-hospital care available at Miller's in Plymouth, it will have activities and all the other programs offered by the standard nursing home.

Miller added that some delay was caused for redesign. The original design would have cost over one million dollars and the cost of living there would have been more than most potential residents could

afford. In order to bring costs down, some of the structure was redesigned, but the original shape was kept intact.

Dr. Michael Deery provides care for the Plymouth Miller's Nursing Home and will provide medical attention to those in the new facility here.

The general contractor for the project is Berger Construction of Plymouth. Michiana Electric of Bourbon is the electrical contractor and many other local contractors are involved in the construction.
