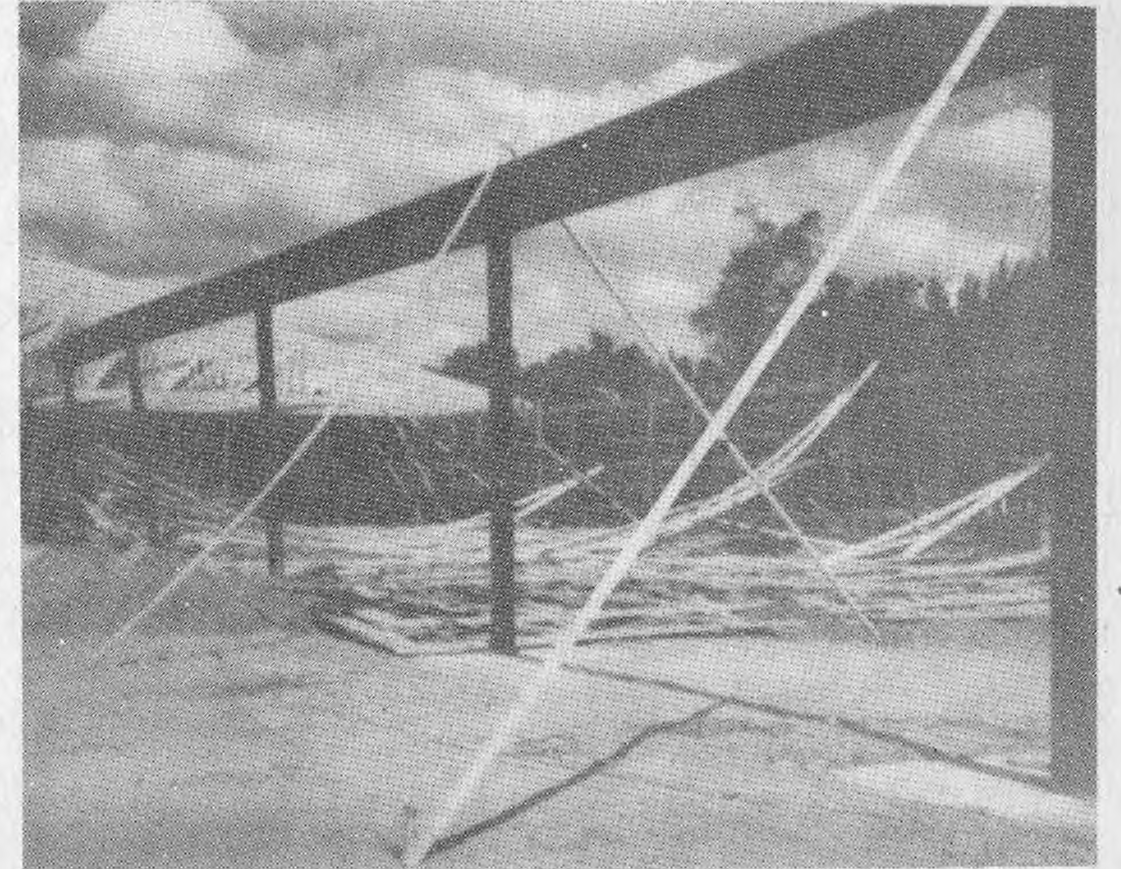

SCHOOL BOARD HOLDS MEETING

Culver - Culver's School Board met at the Horse Palace in Bass Lake on Monday evening. Although they met in executive session

just prior to the regular meeting to discuss action on contracts and salaries for administrators, nothing was resolved in this matter.

The board awarded the roofing contract at the high school to Easterday Construction as lowest bidder. They also approved a change order with Ingwald Johnson for additional roof work.

Approval was given for the senior trip as requested by High School Principal, Jud Dillon. Supt. William F. Mills, said, "Many schools have had to discontinue senior trips because of discipline problems." He stated that he thought it was a credit to our school system and community that we can still have successful senior trips. The 1980 class will travel to Detroit.

Mills also stated that he believes in private, religious and parochial schools, but added that he didn't think the corporation should be concerned about the one or two percent who may wish to attend these schools.

"Our concern," he said, "should be with the 90 percent and above that attend our public schools so we

can have an efficient and effective school system."

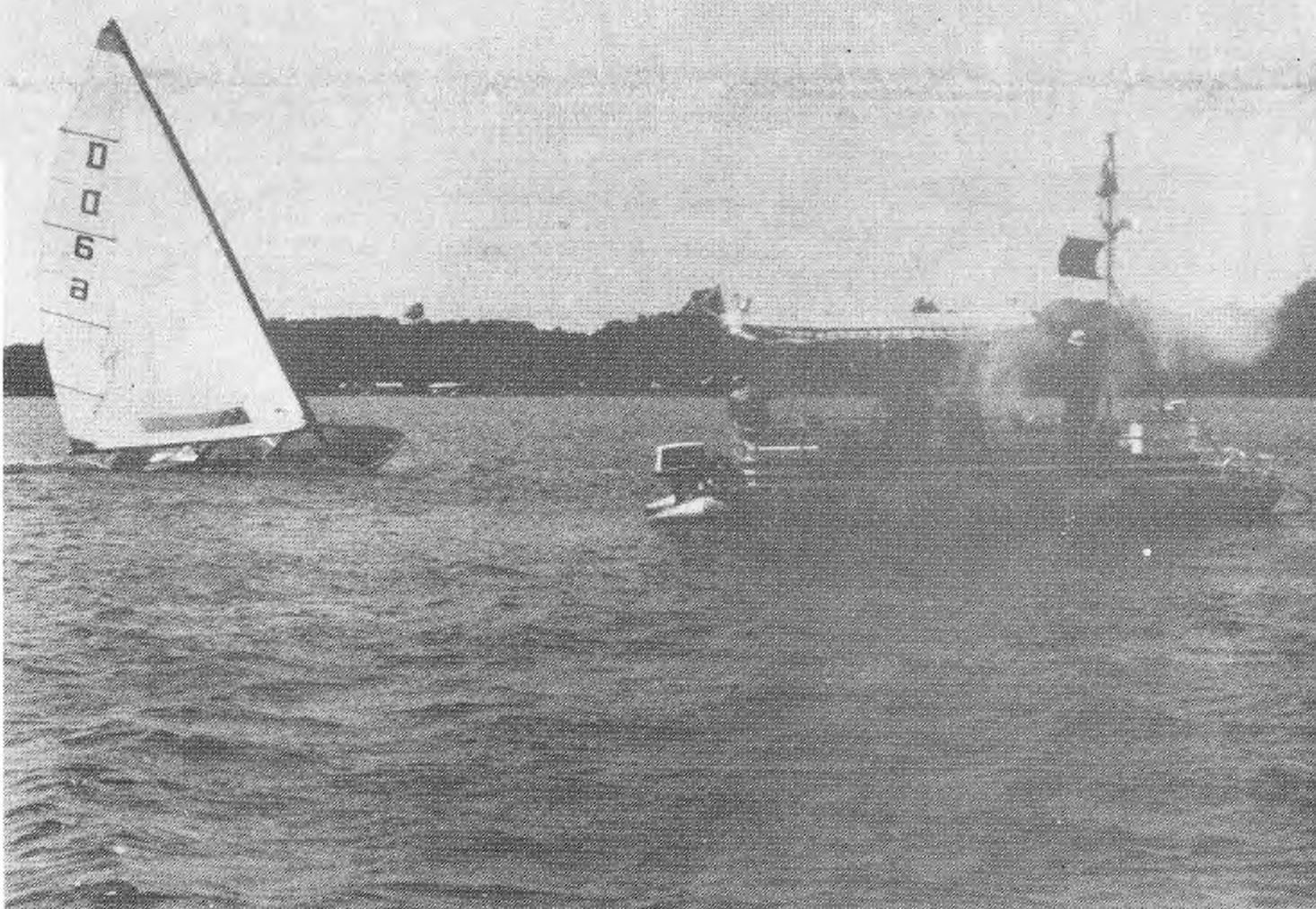
In other action the board: --approved a request from Mrs. Judi Currens, Band Booster President, to plan a trip for the band at no cost to the corporation.

--approved a request from Mrs. Barbara Winters for professional leave to attend GATB Training Session.

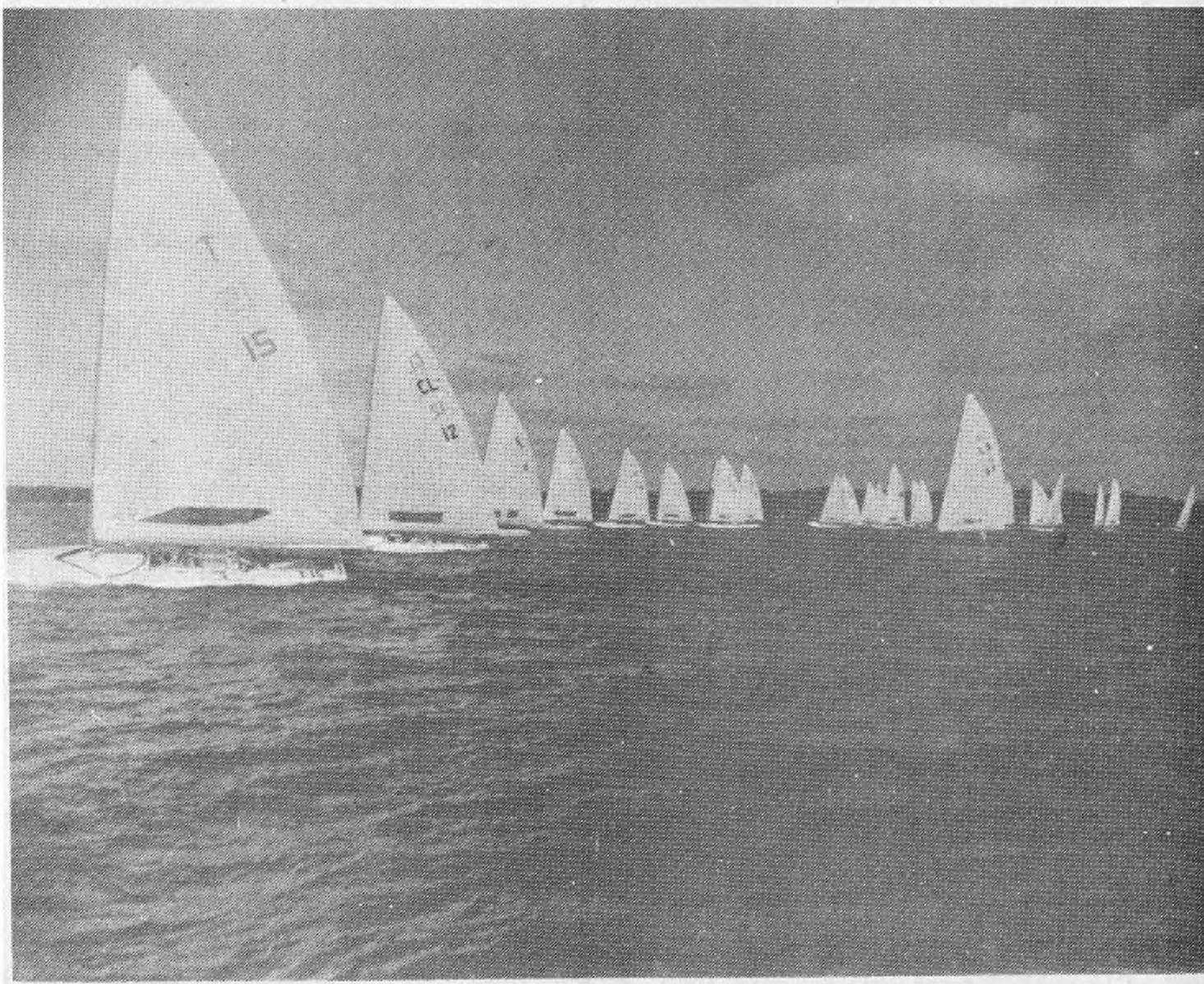
--approved a request by Russell Hodges, Monterey Elementary Principal to attend a professional conference.

Building Trades Program At CCHS

Culver - The 1979-80 school year is the first year for Culver Community School Corp. Building and Trades Program. The program is designed to develop skills in the field of building trades.
Mr. Robert Trigg, an experienced contractor and tradesman for many years was hired by the School Corp. to instruct the program. The students involved in the class are juniors and seniors who are interested in construction. The class is divided into two shifts, three hours in the

morning and three hours in the afternoon.
Twenty-one students are in the two sections. Six credits will be awarded to each student at the end of the year.
The house is a 28' x 48' frame building with three bedrooms, full basement and 20' x 28' attached garage.
The building trades class started work by digging footings in the base, next which was excavated by Mr. Donald Stubbs, a local contractor.
The footings were poured by the students who helped a private contractor Mr. Pat Hiatt set up forms for the

basement walls. The walls were poured after which the students helped remove the of the house began.
The floor is now completed and the walls are being built on the ground. The walls will be set into place in sections.
The house is located just north of the Millers Merry Manor project. The house is scheduled for completion by the end of the second semester. This project includes interior decorating and landscaping.
An open house program will be announced on completion at the house.

At such hearing, taxpayers objecting to such additional appropriations may be heard and interested taxpayers may inquire of the county Auditor what and where such hearing will be held.
