



He state that when new businesses are being attracted to the area. the school board should be made aware of the fact as this would effect student

enrollment figures. The Culver Community School Board will meet in executive session at 7 p.m on Friday, Sept. 21 to discuss administrative salaries and contracts. They will also meet again in executive session for the same purpose one hour prior to the next regular meeting which will bve held on Monday, Oct. 1 at p.m. in the high school auditorium.


