Leiters Ford State Bank Robbed Last Friday

Leiters Ford - The Leiters Ford State Bank was the scene of a robbery by a lone gunman shortly before 9 a.m. on Friday, Sept. 21. The FBI conducted a manhunt and Fulton County officers, Culver police and other area law enforcers set up road blocks in an effort to apprehend the bandit. According to the FBI a man

wearing a green ski hat and mask and green coveralls entered the bank, brandishing a gun and announced the holdup. No shots were fired and no one was injured. After taking an undetermined amount of cash, the bandit fled in a 1972 Pontiac GTO which was later found abandoned in the

Leiters Ford area. Bank officials and the teller reported that the man was nearly completely covered by clothing and was believed to be a white male in his late 20's or early 30's. He was about 5'7" tall with a husky build. According to an official at the Kewanna branch of the

Leiters Ford State Bank reports in other publications stating the amount taken were false as was the report that the bandit entered the vault. He was only at the teller stations and the source stated that he believed that at this date (Monday, Sept. 24) two suspects are now being held in custody.

View The Moon At Culver Park

Culver - Warner Williams, noted sculptor and designer has graciously accepted an invitation to bring his telescope to the Culver Town Park.

It's magnifying power ranges from 80 to a theoretical 1,000 but as with all telescopes, usage is generally in the lower powers since atmospheric disturbances blur objects in the higher powers. The instrument is hand made, including the parabolic mirror made of Pyrex glass, ground and polished to an accuracy of one-millionth of an inch. Mr. Williams has also made telescopes of 6", 8", 10"

and 12" diameter. The 10" is built with an automatic drive so that it will follow any star and counteract the revolution of the earth. Scientific American magazine has published several articles about this instrument. The observation of the moon will take place in front

of the Beach Lodge on one night only, October 1 will be the date for the viewing with October 2 and October 3 as back-up dates. Viewing will depend on the clearness of the sky and will begin at dusk ending at 10:00 P.M. If you have any questions on those nights, please call 842-35109 after 5 p.m.

New Apartments To Be Constructed In Culver

proved financing for the apartments. Last July, the Culver Town Planning Commission and Town Board approved a rezoning from single family to multi-family housing to make way for the project. The apartments will be built on a 1 1/2 acre site north of Academy Drive and west of Lake Shore Drive.

The site is north of Mr. T's Drugs, at 806 Academy, and west of Alford's IGA, at 1105 Lake Shore Drive, Culver Clerk-Treasurer Marizetta Kenney said. The developers will pave Forrest Place north to the

apartment site so it will provide access to the apartments, Tom Sell said. The driveway leading west from Alford's IGA can also provide access for emergency vehicles, Mrs. Kenney said. The 20 apartments will be housed in two buildings. There will also be a "community building" on the site, Locker said. The community building will include a laundry, a meeting room and the manager's office. Tenants parking will be on the apartment complex site, Locker said.

There will be 16 one bedroom apartments renting from about \$158 per month and four two bedroom units renting for about \$185 per month, Locker said. Utilities should cost an additional \$28 to \$31 per month, Locker said. Persons of all ages can rent the apartments planned for Culver Locker said. The purpose of the FmHA program is to provide housing for "low-to-moderate" income families in rural areas. Tenants who would have to pay more than 25 percent of their income for rent will be eligible for the federal rent subsidy program.

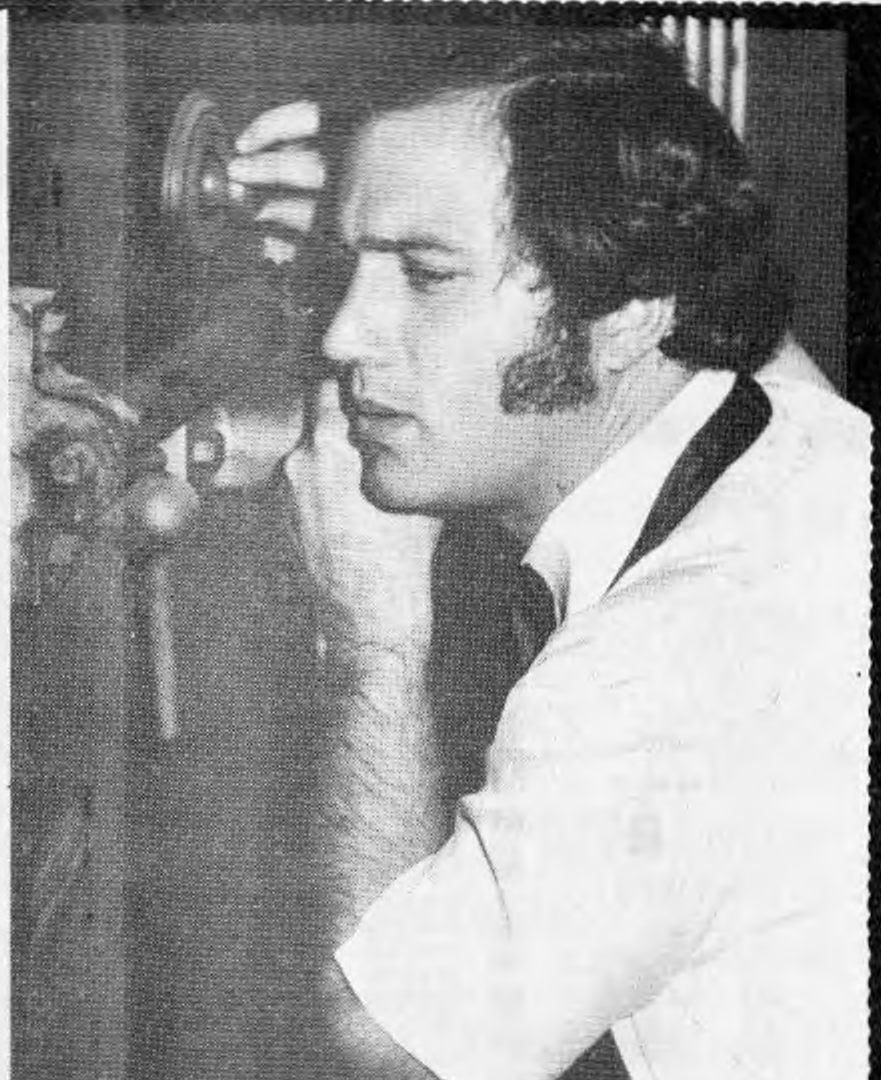

WATKINS MURDER TRIAL RESULTS IN DEADLOCKED JURY

Rochester - After more than 10 hours of deliberation, the six man, six woman jury informed Circuit Court Judge Douglas B. Morton that they were hopelessly deadlocked and cannot return a verdict in the felony murder trial of Joshua Watkins Jr.

Watkins, 19 of Kings Lake, was charged with felony murder in the house fire death of his stepmother, Mrs. Evernee Watkins. Fire occurred last Feb. 16, at the home of Joshua Watkins Sr., on Kings Lake.

The seven and one half day trial went to the jury at 2:03 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 12, At 12:30 Thursday, John Pugh, jury foreman, informed the court, Fulton County Prosecutor Alan Burke and the defense attorney, James Montgomery of Chicago that the jury was hopelessly deadlocked.

RULES FOR INSTALLATION AND OPERATION OF WOODBURNERS

Information provided by Tom's Construction of Argos.

1. Check your local codes. The installation of a wood-burning heater must comply with their rulings.

2. Do not install a heater in a mobile home or trailer. Always connect heater to a chimney and vent to the outside. Never vent to another room or inside a building. Make sure the chimney is high enough to give a good draft.

3. Do not connect a wood-burning heater to an aluminum type B gas vent. This is not safe and is prohibited by the National Fire Protection Association Code. Heaters require a Listed Residential masonry or All Fuel prefabricated chimney.

4. The chimney convactor and chimney must be checked at least once each heating season. Any accumulation of soot or creosote must be removed before the heater is used. Failure to keep soot and creosote removed will cause smoking and chimney fires.

5. Provide air for combustion from the outside into the room where the heater is located. If the intake is not in the same room, the air must have free access to the room.

6. Keep the ashpit section free of excess ashes.

7. Cast iron parts must be seasoned to avoid cracking. Build only small fires during early use.

8. To prevent injury, do not allow anyone who is unfamiliar with the operation of the heater.

9. For further information on using hour heater safely, obtain a copy of the National Fire Protection Association publication "Using Coal and Wood Stoves Safely" NFPA No. HS-8-1974. The address of the NFPA is 470 Atlantic Avenue, Boston, MA 02210.

10. Ashes should be placed in a metal container with a tight fitting lid. The closed container of ashes should be placed on a noncombustible floor or on the ground, well away from all combustible materials, pending final disposal. If the ashes are disposed of by burial in soil or otherwise locally dispersed, they should be retained in the closed container until all cinders have thoroughly cooled.

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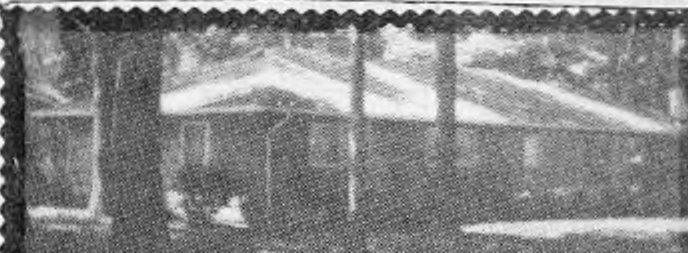
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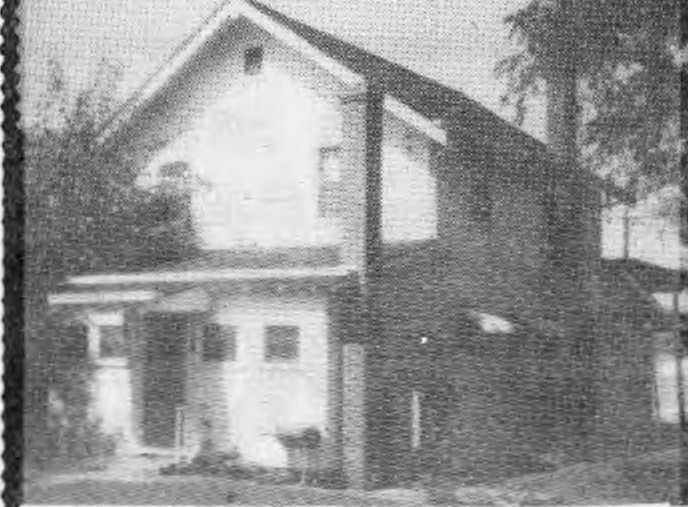

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**JULIAN WILLIAMS
ADDS ANOTHER
SATIRE MEDAL**

The following was taken from Coin World, magazine, September 10, 1979.

"One of the most controversial national topics of recent years," the energy crisis, has provided Longasport, Ind., numismatist R. W. Julian with the "fuel" for his latest high relief satirical medal, third in his ongoing series.

To be struck in 2 1/2 inch diameter by Medallic Art Co., Danbury, Conn., the new medals are a combination of Julian's design ideas and the medallic sculpture of Culver, Ind., artist Warner Williams, whose Geodesic Dome Studios produced the earlier issues as well.

The new Julian-Williams effort features a craggy, strong head of President Abraham Lincoln surrounded by his affirmation of the good sense of the American people "Let the People know the Facts and the Country will be saved."

This statement was uttered at the darkest period of American history, the Civil War, Julian believes, however, that Lincoln's

statement fits the present situation, "the widely held view among Americans that they have not been given all the facts about the energy crisis...there is a distinct lack of confidence in official pronouncements of any kind about energy."

The reverse borrows an old symbol of indifference, the three brass monkeys of "See no evil, hear no evil, speak no evil" fame, symbolizing Julian's belief that neither the Carter Administration, the Congress nor the big oil companies have adequately addressed themselves to this American dilemma.

Below the monkeys appear gasoline pump nozzles in boneyard crossed position, symbolizing the effective death of easily available fuel in the 1970's. Designer's and sculptors signatures appear on the nozzles, dated 1979 below.

"The government, the Congress and the oil companies at work on the energy crisis" the satirical inscription proclaims. The high relief of Williams model sets aside this type of fine art medal from the single struck, token like souvenirs often confused by the non

numismatic public for real medals, Julian emphasizes.

Repeated high-pressure striking on Medallic Art's modern medal presses is required to bring up the relief on the bronze medals. After the advance orders are filled, the dies are to be destroyed, Julian reports. November 30, 1979, has been set as the deadline for orders for the energy crisis issue, bronze medals are offered at \$9.95 each, which includes postage and handling.

Indiana residents must add 40 cents for state sales tax; Julian regrets that orders from outside the U. S. and its territories cannot be accepted. Deliveries should begin about Jan. 29, 1980, and are to be completed within 30 days; the buyers' cancelled check will serve as receipt.

Williams, a member of the National Sculpture Society, created the earlier medals, which assailed what Julian believes has been bias in television news reporting, and the recent Panama Canal treaties. Both these issues portrayed past presidents and both sold out in a short time.
