The purpose of the FmHA program is to provide housing for "low-to-moderate" income families in rural areas.

> Tenants who would have to pay more than 25 percent their income for rent will be eligible for the federal rent subsidy program.

Locker said up to eight of the apartments can be occupied by tenants receiving rent subsidies.

But he said it will be permitted to have fewer than eight tenants receiving rent subsidies living in the apartment complex.

Locker and his partners proposed a similar apartdevelopment for Bourbon this summer.

But their rezoning request, needed to make way for the development, was denied by Bourbon Planning Commission due to substantial community opposition. Locker and his partners had a total of three acres in Culver rezoned for apartments.

They plan to build more apartments on this additional 11/2 acres which is adjacent to the site where the apartments will be built this fall. But so far, the FmHA has

agreed to finance only 20 apartment units in Culver. If the FmHA agrees to finance more than 20 units in Culver, then Locker and his partners will apply for financing to build more apartments

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

Rev. Sommer Celebrates 50th Anniversary

Culver - Roger L. Sommer was born in St. Louis on November 25, 1905 to the Rev. and Mrs. Martin S. Sommer. At that time his father was professor of Homiletics at Concordia Seminary.

After a secondary education at Holy Cross, a parochial school in St. Louis, Roger Sommer graduated in 1926 from Concordia College, Bronxville, N. Y. During the summers he also studied at Columbia and Johns Hopkins and was employed by two newspapers. However the call to the ministry was too strong to resist, and he entered Concordia Seminary, from which he graduated in June 1929.

After seminary graduation the Mission Board called Rev. Sommer to start a south-side Chicago narish St. John, the Divine.He served here for a total of 43 years as missionary, pastor, pastor emeritus. Under his leadership several other Chicago congregations were formed. Before coming to Culver Rev. Sommer had served 17 greater Chicago parishes, of which two were black, as fill-in pastor. In 1972 he came to Trinity, where he served, even several months after complete retirement, until

arrived this June. Rev. Sommer se Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod for 16 years as a member of the Committee on Scholarly Research, as well as 22 years as editor of the English District edition of the Lutheran Witness, Among Rev. Sommer's writings are his sermons, published by CPH, several books, Ethics for Lutheran Pastors, The Pastor at Work, as well as writing for the Portals of Prayer.

Vicar Rodencal and family

Although retired from Culver, Rev. Sommer continues to remain active, serving Trinity for Communion and driving to Medaryville to fill a vacancy

WATKINS MURDER TRIAL RESULTS IN DEADLOCKED JURY

Rochester - After more than 10 hours of deliberation, the six man, six woman jury informed Circuit Court Judge Douglas B. Morton that they were hopelessly deadlocked and cannot return a verdict in the felony murder trial of Joshua Watkins Jr.

Our population is only about 400 residents and new ones are always welcome. So feel free to visit Monterey the next chance you get.



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



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JULIAN WILLIAMS ADDS ANOTHER SATIRE MEDAL

The following was taken from Coin World, magazine, September 10, 1979.

One of the most controversial national topics of recent years," the energy crisis, has provided Longasport, Ind., numismatist R. W. Julian with the "fuel" for his latest high relief satirical medal, third in his ongoing series.

To be struck in 21/2 inch, diameter by Medallic Art Co., Danbury, Conn., the new medals are a combination of Julian's design ideas and the medallic sculpture of Culver, Ind., artist Warner Williams, whose Geodesic Dome Studios produced the earlier issues as well.

The new Julian-Williams effort features a craggy, strong head of President Abraham Lincoln surrounded by his affirmation of the good sense of the American people "Let the People know the Facts and the Country will be saved."

This statement was uttered at the darkest period of American history, the Civil War, Julian believes, however, that Lincoln's

statement fits the present situation, "the widely held view among Americans that they have not been given all the facts about the energy crisis...there is a distinct lack of confidence in official pronouncements of any kind

about energy. The reverse borrows an old symbol of indifference, the three brass monkeys of "See no evil, hear no evil, speak no evil" fame, symbolizing Julian's belief that neither the Carter Administration, the Congress nor the big oil companies have adequately addressed themselves to this American

dilemma. Below the monkeys appear gasoline pump nozzles in bonedry crossed position, symbolizing the effective death of easily available fuel in the 1970's. Designer's and sculptors signatures appear on the nozzles, dated 1979

"The government, the Congress and the oil companies at work on the energy crisis" the satirical inscription proclaims. The high relief of Williams model sets aside this type of fine art medal from the single struck, token like souvenirs often confused by the non

Repeated high-pressure striking on Medallis Art's modern medal presses is required to bring up the relief on the bronze medals. After the advance orders are filled, the dies are to be destoryed, Julian reports. November 30, 1979, has been set as the deadline for orders for the energy crisis issue, bronze medals are offered at \$9.95 each, which includes postage and handling.

Indiana residents must add 40 cents for state sales tax; Julian regrets that orders from outside the U.S. and its territories cannot be accepted. Deliveries should begin about Jan. 29, 1980, and are to be completed within 30 days; the buyers' cancelled check will serve as receipt.

Williams, a member of the National Sculpture Society, created the earler medals, which assailed what Julian believes has been bias in television news reporting, and the recent Panama Canal treatics. Both these issues portrayed past presidents and both sold out n a short time.
