### RAIN WAS NEEDED BUT NOT INSIDE AT SCHOOL BOARD MEET

Culver - Amidst falling plaster and the leaky roof the Culver Community School Board met in the high school auditorium Monday night at 8 p.m. following an executive session at 7 p.m.

They approved advertising for \$15,000 in additional appropriations from the cumulative building fund for emergency roof repair at the high school. A temporary roof failed to keep the auditorium dry during the heavy rains but Superintendent William Mills said that the roof company is responsible for any damage.

The executive session to discuss administrative salaries and contracts brought no overall solution but the board did decide to negotiate separately with each administrator.

The board approved unanimously trips for the Student Council and Choir members to Richmond and Adrian, Michigan, respectively. They also approved the adoption of books, the math program and the CAPPS committees for the 1980-81 school year. Teacher Don Adams will head that committee.

Advertising for funds to resurface the high school track and convert to the metric system met with a 3-3 vote. The stalemate resulted since Paul Snyder Jr., one of the seven men board was unable to attend the meeting.

Voting for the motion were Peggy Clark, Phil Mallory, and board President Howard Hildebrand. Those against the motion were Paul Davidson, John Keller, and Marvin Good.

Davidson asked Superintendent why and by what authorities the Aubbee School abstract had been continued. Mills stated that he had talked to Hildebrand, who is chairman of the building committee and they felt that they should find out what action can or should be taken concerning the closing of the school building. It was uncertain whether it could be turned over legally to the community for recreational purposes which was one possibility for its usage.

Davidson asked that the result from this search be made available at the next board meeting and Good requested that the cost of this procedure also be presented to the board.

Member Peggy Clark stated that following the last executive session some board members had adjourned to the Corner Tavern and discussed some school board business, she said that discussing board business outside of the corporation meeting was not legal and that several reversals of opinion resulted at that gathering.

Mrs. Clark also suggested that the board send its congratulations to the Culver Cavaliers for their great victory over the North Judson Blue Jays at the last football game.

The next school board meeting will be held at the Monterey School at 8 p.m. on Monday, October 15, following an executive session at 7 p.m.

## Ambulance Donated To CUTEMS By Bonine

Culver - James Bonine, owner of Bonine Funeral Home, Culver, presented the keys to his ambulance to town board member, Jean Williams, recently. Bonine has operated the ambulance service for the past 19 years and was the second individual in Marshall Co. to qualify as an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). The ambulance will serve as a back-up vehicle for the Culver-Union Twp., Emergency Medical Service (CUTEMS).

On Oct. 1, CUTEMS officially took over the service and will continue to serve the same areas as previously covered by Bonine Funeral Home Ambulance Service.

The back-up unit will be housed with the recently purchased new ambulance at the fire station until completion of the new garage adjacent to the Town Hall.

All emergency and transfer calls will be dispatched from the new ambulance service phone number, 842-2233, at the Town Hall during regular business hours. At other times of the day and night five volunteer women dispatchers will answer calls at their homes, all at the same emergency number.

Twenty-two volunteer EMT's are staffing the new service. Two of these and one driver are on call for each of

the two 12 hour shifts. Eight EMT's have had advanced training and are able to start IV's during a run.

Ron Gleason, Union Twp. Trustee stated that the charge for an ambulance run, is \$35 for transfer and \$45 for emergency plus \$1 per loaded mile. Bonine said that any run which was not pre-arranged was considered an emergency.

Susan Flora, Chairman for the service, and an EMT, said that the cooperation from the town since the organization of CUTEMS began in 1976 has been fantastic and that she still gets calls from people willing to help out.

the second half which was dominated by the Cavs. Dave Taiclet quarterback ran the ball in for a TD on a quarterback sneak ending a 66 yard drive by the Cavs. Culver gave the ball to Hart who ran the ball in for a 2 point conversion and with that was the end of the scoring until late in the 4th quarter when Culver scored again with only a minute of playing time remaining.

Brad Gast ran the ball 16 yards into the end zone with the score now 21 to 14 Culver went for the 2 point conversion but failed on the attempt. North Judson still hoping for a tie or winning, took the kickoff with 1:13 left on the clock, but in the first play Shawn Master and Brian Overmyer sacked the Blue Jay Quarterback for a 7 yard loss. On the next play Robert Lee Hart intercepted a pass and ended any chance the Blue Jays might have had.

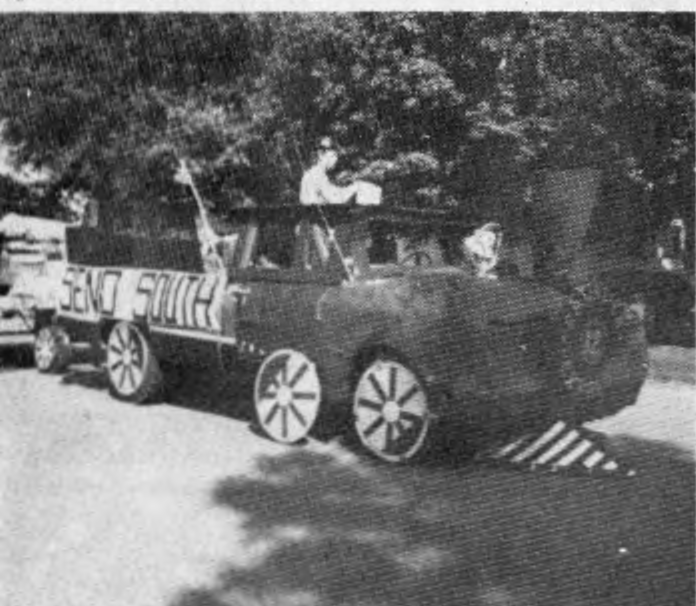

Recognizing that the approaching town board elections are very important to the future of the local community, your hometown newspaper will be presenting various comments in the hopes that local voters will vote wisely.

Candidate profile forms have been given to the candidates of both political parties. The information from these forms will be published a few weeks before the election so that each voter will have a better knowledge of each local candidate.

All voters are urged to take a minute and look over these candidate profiles and then cast your vote for the ones you feel will do the best job. In the smaller communities of America that are operated under the town

board system, the importance of political party affiliation is much less important than those cities using the mayor-council system.

Voting a straight party ticket happens a great deal less in local elections than it does in state or national elections. The reason for this change in voting habits is because the voter knows the local candidates. The state and national candidates are generally faces on a poster or the person shaking hands during a parade. The local candidate, on the other hand, are friends, neighbors or business associates.

Thus the hometown candidate usually receives his votes based on his popularity and ability rather than his political party affiliation.

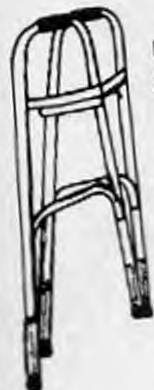

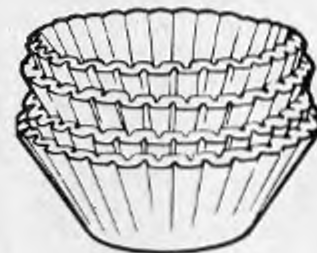

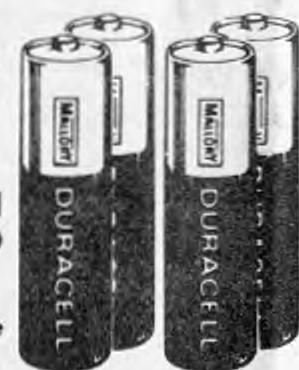
