RAIN WAS NEEDED BUT NOT INSIDE AT SCHOOL BOARD MEET

Culver - Amidst falling plaster and the leaky roof the Culver Community School Board met in the high school auditorium Monday night at 8 p.m. following an session at 7 p.m.

They approved advertising. for \$15,000 in additional appropriations from the cumulative building fund for emergency roof repair at the high school. A temporary roof failed to keep the auditorium dry during the heavy rains but Supterintendent William Mills said that the roof company is responsible for any

damage. The executive session to discuss administrative salaries and contracts brought no overall solution but the board did decide to negotiate seperately with each administrator.

The board approved unanimously trips for the Student Council and Choir members to Richmond and Adrian, Michigan, respectively. They also approved the adoption of books, the math program and the CAPPS committees for the 1980-81 school year. Teacher Don Adams will head that committee.

Advertising for funds to resurface the high school track and convert to the metric system met with a 3-3 vote. The stalemate resulted since Paul Snyder Jr., one of the seven men board was unable to attend the meeting.

Voting for the motion were Peggy Clark, Phil Mallory and board President Howard Hildebrand. Those against the motion were Paul Davidson, John Keller, and Marvin Good.

Davidson asked Supterintendent why and by what authorities the Aubbee School abstract had been continued. Mills stated that he had talked to Hildebrand, who is chairman of the building committee and they felt that they should find out what action can or should be taken concerning the closing of the school building. It was uncertain whether it could be turned over legally to the community for recreational purposed which was one possibility for its usage.

Davidson asked that the result from this search be made available at the next board meeting and Good requested that the cost of this procedure also be presented to the board. Member Peggy Clark

stated that following the last executive session some board members had adjourned to the Corner Tavern and discussed some school board business, she said that discussing board business outside of the corporation meeting was not legal and that several reversals of opinion resulted at that gathering.

Mrs. Clark also suggested that the board send its congratulations to the Culver Cavaliers for their great victory over the North Judson Blue Jays at the last football game.

The next school board meeting will be held at the Monterey School at 8 p.m. on Monday, October 15, following an executive session at 7 p.m.

Culver - The Culver Plan Commission reminds residents that a building permit must be purchased prior to beginning construction.

Applications for permits must be accompanied by a site plan drawn to scale, showing lot dimensions. existing structures and proposed construction, as well as existing and proposed setback lines.

The application should be made at least five days prior to the proposed date of beginning construction and should be made to the Culver Building Commissioner Thomas K. Walker 302 Lake Shore Drive, Culver at 842-3366 or 842-2035. Walker may be contacted during the hours of 8 a.m. till noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday.

All permit applications should include the name and

Mattison, Doug Smith, Mike Reinholt, Jason Young, Herb Brooks, Todd Kline, Dave Stevens, Bill Lentz, Scott address of the applicant and a site plan with all buildings shown and their location.

Applications from persons not on city water and sewer shoauld include a copy of the County Board of Health septic and water permit, and indicate which electric-gas

utility service is being used.

All permit applications for commercial buildings must include a copy of the State Administrative Building Council certificate of compliance; the State Fire Marshal's certificate if applicable; the State or County Board of Health septic and water permit if applicable; all other materials as needed under the above requirements.

Once the permit is pur-chased (\$5 or \$10 fee is determined by type of construction), it should be posted at the site of construction in plain view. The applicable zoning ordinance does provide for penalty in case of violation.
