Bethel has completed their regular season with the best record in the school's history with an 8-5-1 record. The players also set a new school record in goals scored in one season with 58 (the old record was 56).

Also, a new record was set in least number of goals scored on a Bethel team with 25. The old record was 26 with an eight game schedule (this year's team played 14 regular season games).

Culver - Success was the name of the game at Culver Military and Culver Girls Academies last week as two teams advanced in state tournaments, and two others wound up successful seasons.

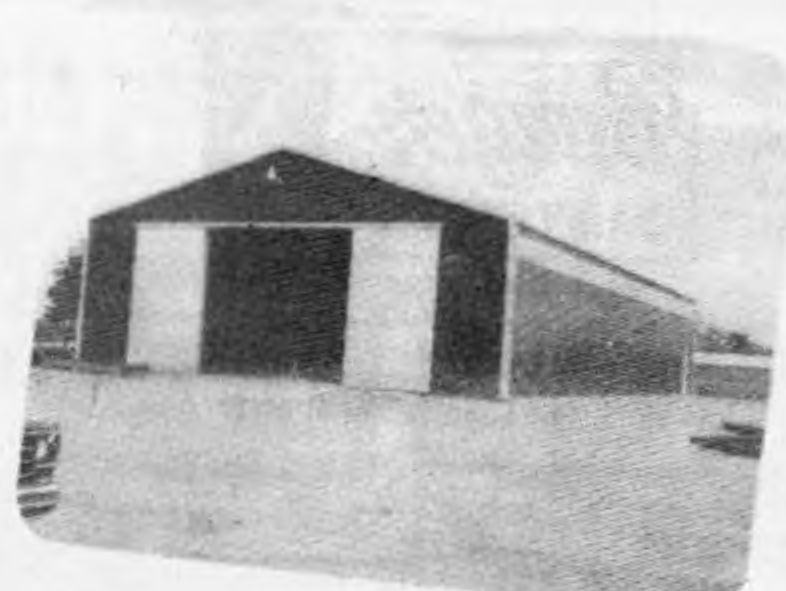

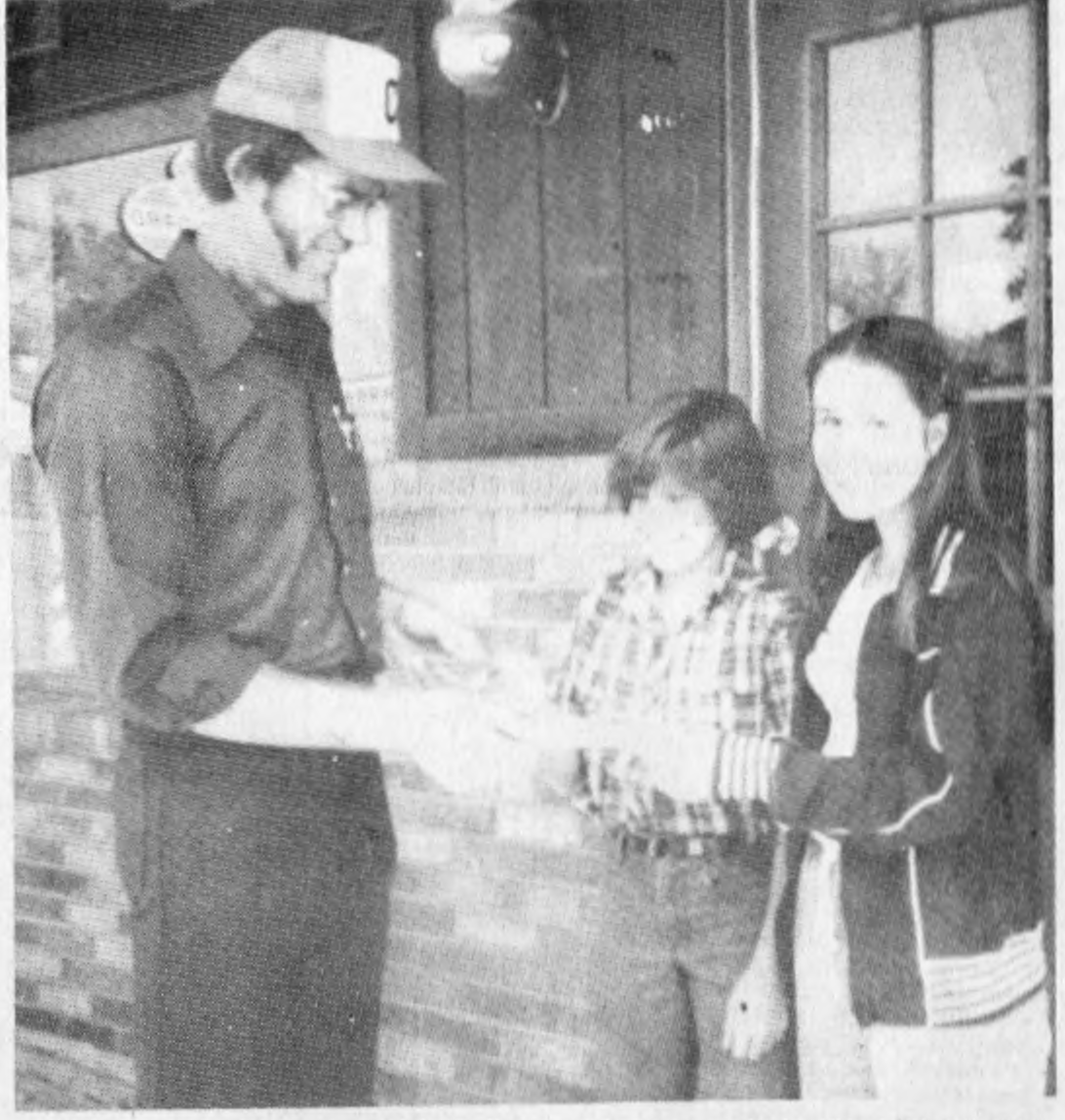

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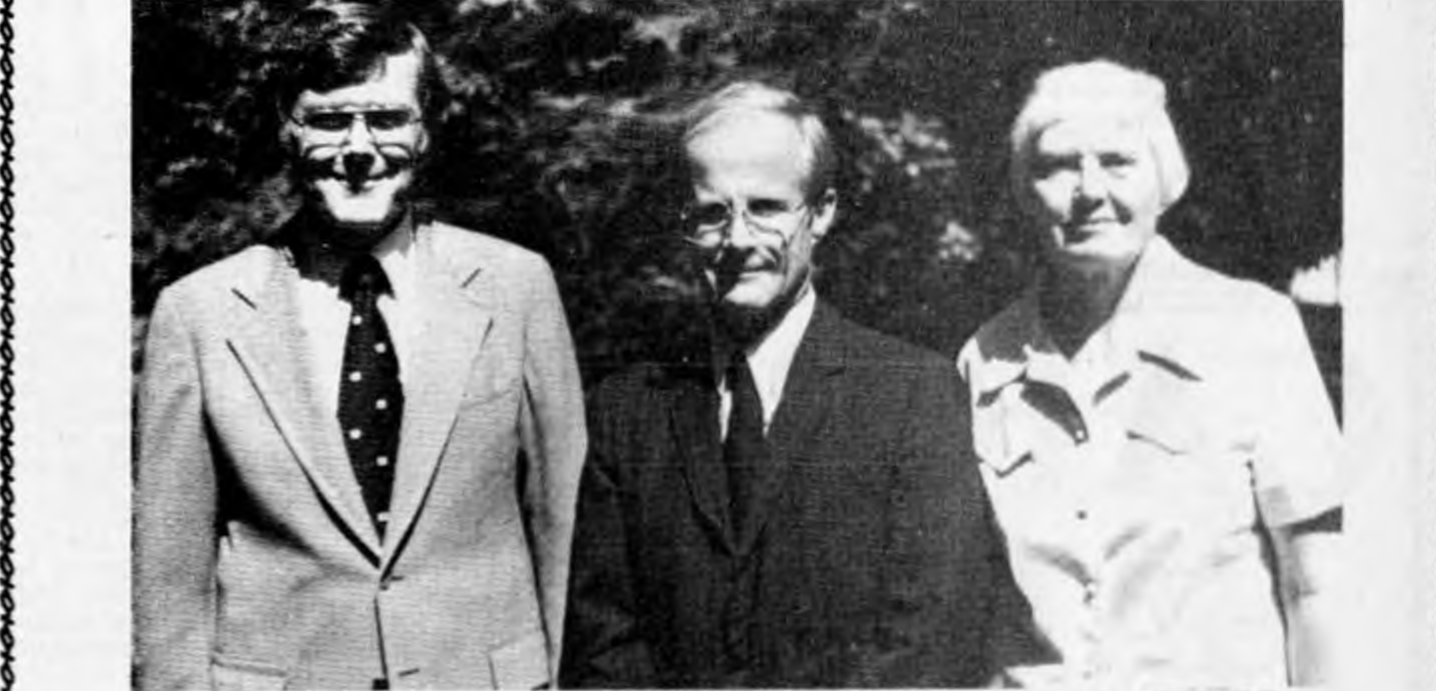
