CMA Student Is Competition Winner

Culver - James A. Martin, senior at Culver Military Academy, Culver, is the winner in the local phase of Leadership Scholarship competition at the Academies, Mr. L. Kingsley Moore announced recently.

Martin is the son of the Rev. Mr. and Mrs. William R. Martin, Culver. The Rev. Mr. Martin is Culver Academies' chaplain.

Runners-up in the competition are CMA senior Andrew D. Gray, son of Mrs.

Calif., and Culver Girls Academy senior Rosemre Y. Crossfield, daughter of Mrs. Daphne Newell, Oyster Bay,

Mr. Moore, Culver history department chairman, is director of the Century III program at the school. Nationally, it is ad-ministered by the National Association of Secondary School Principals and funded by the Shell Oil Company. Martin is now eligible to

compete with other high

school seniors throughout Indiana for two \$1,500 scholarships, two \$500 scholarships, and also for a \$10,000 national scholarship that will be awarded in a conference of state winners in Colonial Williamsburg.

The Century III Leadership Program is a scholarship competition which emphasizes the future concerns of America. Students are judged on the basis of their leadership abilities, community involvement, and

scores on a current-events examination.

To compete at the state level, Martin must write a brief projection outlining what he thinks is one of America's future challenges and how it should be met.

The two Indiana winners will receive an all expensepaid trip to the fourth annual Century III National Leadership Seminar in Williamsburg, March 7-10, 1980, to participte in seminars on current issues. Past speakers at these seminars were such notables as Howard K. Smith, Buckminster Fuller and Rene Dubos.
