"Little" Hobby - "Huge" Project

Culver - Pete and Harriett Gallette each took up artistic hobbies following Pete's retirement from Young Spring and Wire Corp., Detroit, in 1965.

With their three children raised, Pete decided to fashion custom made furniture and other wood items in his garage at their home on the West Shore of Lake Maxinkuckee.

Mrs. Gallette took up painting and her framed artistic efforts adorn the walls of their home. Some are still lifes and others, beautiful portraits.

Over a year ago, however, the Gallettes started a joint venture. A doll house with furnishings and decorations created by each of them became a time consuming, challenging endeavor. Mr. and Mrs. Jack Campbell of Culver Marina wanted the Gallettes to fashion an authentic replica of an early 1900 Town House, completely decorated and furnished so they could give it as a gift to their daughter, Susan.

More than 2,000 hours later and after traveling more than 1,000 miles for supplies, the Gallettes completed the project this month.

The house containing three stories has oak flooring. Each piece of three-eighth inch oak was laid in-

dividually, by hand. The house is completely wired and contains extra floor plugs throughout. A Tidewater Virginia fire place, circa mid-1700's, flickers so realistically that Pete says, "You almost feel you can warm your hands by it." Above the mantle is a framed picture of Susan Campbell.

Pete fashioned the antique furnishings and many pieces are workable. Drawers pull out and each piece is made to scale (1" to the foot) of walnut, cherry and oak. Staircases are all walnut.

A grandfather clock works by battery and the piano plays by music box. There's a circa 1723 Chippendale Broken Bonnet Highboy and an 1800 century English Country sideboard with burl inlays on walnut.

The third floor left hand bedroom features its bath, room divider and photos of Jack and Lila Campbell above the bed. The adjacent bedroom has a four poster canopied bed and all furnishings again are authentically reproduced. The beds contain two sheets, pillows and spreads, all color coordinated to the room decor.

There are tiffany lamps, candle lights and all light fixtures work. A bay window in the living room looks out

onto a garden scene with picket fence.

As if building the tiny replicas of furniture were not intricate enough, the decorating became a challenge to Harriett. All draperies, rugs, wall papering and entire interior were painstakingly color coordinated. The wall paper, which is even flocked in the living room area, matches drapes and furnishings. Tiny pillows are coordinated to the decor of divan and chairs.

Tables contain miniature china centerpieces. One even holds a small french horn, which is the instrument Susan plays.

Pete says, "If anything was wrong with one little item, Harriett insisted I go back to the old drawing board." She's a perfectionist.

The Gallette's both state that they've had more fun with the project because finding just the right items become a labor of love. They got caught up in the creation of the doll house and spent hours to see that each aspect and all items were authentic. The end result is dramatic - almost unbelievable. A gift that Susan, now a college student, will treasure forever. It's an original. No other young lady will have one just like it.

CULVER SCHOOL BOARD NEWS

Culver - Culver's school board voted to direct the administration to study the problems concerning various alternatives available in the use of the corporation buildings.

Three options mentioned at the last meeting were to move the 7th-8th grade students to the underused high school building, thus closing the junior high use the Monterey and Culver elementary buildings for elementary students or use the Aubree building for junior high students or whatever feasible combinations of the three buildings. The administration was directed to report to the building committee before Jan. 15.

The board heard an evaluation report of the 1979 football program by varsity coach Doc Heath and also extended Heath's contract for the 1980-81 season.

Heath noted in his report that the success of this year's program could be measured by the fact several of this year's players were selected all-conference or made honorable mention for their first year in the conference. They are all-conference Robert Lee Hart, Jeff Volz,

Jason Young (offensive and defensive) and Brad Gast. Those making honorable mention were Shawn Master, Doug Farmer and Jim Allyn.

The board adopted a resolution read by Supt. William F. Mills concerning the schools flags being flown at half mast until all remaining American hostages held in Iran are released. (The resolution appeared in last week's Citizen.)

Board member Paul Davidson expressed his concern about the abstract for the closed Aubree school building. He said, "I was in Rochester at Deamer & Deamer and was told the abstract had been picked up on Sept. 14 along with an invoice in the amount of \$200 by Mrs. Thomas Mulligan, wife of school board attorney." He stated that this bill had never gone through the board yet, more than two months later. The board directed Mills to contact attorney Mulligan concerning the abstract and present a report at the next meeting.

The next meeting will be held on Monday, Dec. 3, at 7:30 p.m. in the Administration Building.

HOLLY BOWMAN CITED FOR OUTSTANDING PERFORMANCE IN WRITING

Culver - Holly Bowman, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Donald Bowman, Culver, a senior of Culver Community High School, has been cited for outstanding performance in writing, according to Principal A. Judson Dillon. The National Council of Teachers of English has named her a winner of a 1979 Achievement Award in Writing. The NCTE writing contest is held annually

beginning in January. Over 7,000 students were nominated last February by their English teachers for NCTE Achievement in Writing. Each nominee submitted a sample of her best writing and impromptu essay. These compositions were evaluated by state judging teams of both high school and college English teachers. The approximately 850 finalists selected each year represent his schools in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and American schools abroad. The number of possible winners for each state is keyed to state population.

The Council recommends the award finalists, now seniors, for college scholarships in 1979, should they need such assistance. Names of the students are sent to admissions officers and English department chairs at United States two- and four-year colleges and universities.

The National Council of Teachers of English is a professional organization of individual and institutional members at all levels of instruction. Its goal is to increase the effectiveness of the teaching of English language and literature in the nation's schools and colleges. NCTE furnishes such teaching aids as books and recordings, and publishes several professional journals, among them College English and English Journal.

Board Votes 60% Sewer Rate Increase

Culver - At its regular meeting last week, with a large audience attending, the Culver Town Board heard the Volunteer Committee's report structuring a rise in sewer rates. Don Slyh, Chairman, described the needs mandating the increase.

Of three choices, the Board concluded that a 60 percent increase would best meet the emergency and see the sewer operation through the next four years, inflation considered. A 92 percent increase, through desirable for a stable operating balance, would impose too great a burden on the users of the system, while 33 percent was considered temporary only.

In the planned increase schedule, minimum users, of which there are 380 out of a total of 790 customers, will be paying \$11.75 per month in their total water and sewer bill instead of \$8.95, their present cost. The Academy is the Town's maximum cost

customer. Using sewer only, its rate will jump from \$2,717.00 per month to \$4,356.58 per month.

Fred Jones, Town Attorney, is writing the ordinance. After publication, there will be a public hearing December 18 at the regular meeting of the Town Board. Rate schedule may be seen at the Clerk's Office.

I would like to hear explanations from local attorneys, judges or authorities on why these young people are apprehended while well known personalities can state publicly that they smoke marijuana and are seemingly free to go on doing so.

In the words of the controversial Joe McCarthy in his famous hearings of the 40's, I'd appreciate an answer "before the sun goes down."

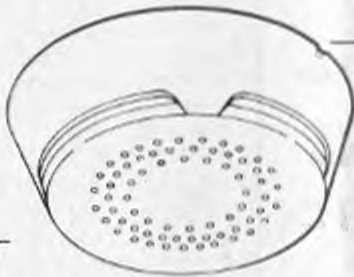

ARGOS SENIORS SEE MODEL BUILDINGS

Argos - Nether snow, rain or whatever, can keep our older folks at home when its Monday morning. Sharon greeted a room full of them on Monday, November 26. We were glad to have Grover Shafer with us again. He is still staying with his daughter in Mishawaka but she brought him to be with us.

Several of our ladies made calls for the Red Cross blood donors and all had success getting volunteers.

Sharon then introduced Roy Huff from Culver, who does model making of historical buildings. He brought two with him, a lovely model of the old home of the Studebakers now called Tippecanoe Place, and also one of the Marshall County Bank in Plymouth. Roy lived in Ohio and after his wife had a stroke he moved back to Culver, where he has his wife in their home caring for her. He needed something to keep his hands busy so he turned to making models. He doesn't sell them but has given several away and some are in the museum. He used thin plywood but prefers old checkerboards because they don't warp. Some of the court houses modeled are Wabash, Rochester, Plymouth and Knox. He made a model of Notre Dame's Golden Dome. He takes snap shots of these buildings and then makes them to scale. He works at the kitchen table putting hours on each one with only hand tools. He has also made old jails and likes to make models of buildings to be demolished so they can be remembered. Roy is 81 years old. He told of some old times that got folks reminiscing and we hear some pretty scary tales of log cabins and Indian tales told by grandmothers and grandfathers.

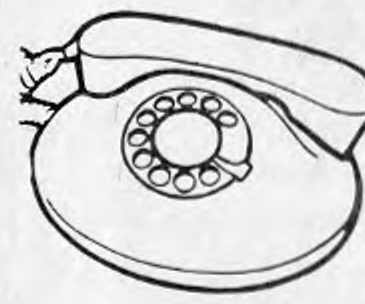
