CULVER APPROVES SEWER RATE HIKE

Culver - The Culver Town Board approved the first reading of a proposed sewerage rate increase ordinance in a 2-1 vote with David Baker dissenting. A public hearing on the ordinance is scheduled for December 18th at 7 p.m. at the Town Hall.

The Town Board will have a special meeting at 7:30 this evening in the Town Hall for input on the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development community development block grant, also for the first reading of an industrial bond ordinance for Shirt Shed. The board will meet again in regular session on December 18th. A hearing on the industrial bond ordinance will begin at 9 a.m. on Dec. 24.

During the meeting last Tuesday evening the board approved a proposed salary

ordinance amendment to pay a new temporary street department employee. A radio maintenance contract was signed with the fire department and street department. The board also authorized purchase of bulk gasoline from Standard Oil; two tanks will be buried for storage.

Persons appointed to the town's Plan Commission for four year terms starting January 1 were Richard Balkema, newly elected Town Board member; Jean Williams, re-elected Town Board member and Marietta Kenney, clerk treasurer. Alvin Myers was appointed to the Park and Recreation Board for 4 years starting Jan. 1.

The monthly fire department report included mention of two car fires, one assist to the Monterey department and a call to an apartment fire on South Main Street.

Puppets For Adults

Culver - The Culver Academies hosted a touring puppet troupe on Tuesday, December 4, and the production proved that puppets are not just for kids. The Hutsah Puppet Theatre from Evanston, Ill., presented an original production of "The Hobbit" by J. R. R. Tolkien. The production was designed by Rusty Steiger.

In the saga of Mr. Baggins, who is a Hobbit, we follow the saga of an adventure involving dwarfs, magicians, trolls, elves and even some goblins. Of course, this is fantasy, but the story is one that mirrors the types of people we find in our lives today and the challenges of modern society.

The script was well designed to move the show along through many scenes. While it could have been presented by human actors, the story involves so many

unreal characters that the puppet medium is well suited to the subject.

Mark Larson, who directed managed to keep the action moving through use of creative lighting and a stage arrangement that had three different acting areas. The sets were well painted, with interesting renditions of the various odd places in which our characters found themselves.

The stage had a six foot high wall of cloth that masked the puppeteers. The puppets, nearly life size, walked above this curtain horizon. They were all moving mouth puppets and the manipulative skill was high throughout. The characters were very expressive and projected personalities of their own.

The show was in three acts, with two intermissions. The story was very much reduced in detail from Tolkien's book, but that is to

be expected and what remained made for a very pleasant experience.

One member of the group, Jane Raabe, is a Culver resident and tours with the group throughout the Midwest. The troupe plays mostly college dates, often of on tour.

The taped sound track for the production included several original musical selections. The audio quality was very good and filled the Eugene C. Eppley Auditorium without problem.

Mr. Harvey Firari, director of the Culver Academies theatre and drama department, is to be congratulated on bringing such a group to the Culver area. This was a legitimate theatrical experience that portrayed an interesting story in a form far more effective than live actors could have managed.

Adams Safe Following Earthquake

Culver - Good news came last week when they received word that their son, John and his wife, Luz Arina, were not injured in a recent earthquake which did extensive damage in their city of Manizales, Colombia, South America. Fred contacted Congressman Hillis and Major General Robert B. Tanguy after learning of the earthquake. Both men, former residents of Culver, contacted sources that learned the news of John and his wife's family's safety.

Congressman Hillis, representative of this district in Indiana, contacted his staff in Washington D. C. who immediately checked with a Pentagon source who relayed the message that there had been no word of injuries to United States citizens in Colombian earthquake.

Hillis office gave Fred contacts to reach Major General Tanguy Deputy Commander in Chief of the U. S. Southern Air Command, which includes Central and South America

and other southern territory, was in Panama when Fred talked to him.

A task force in the Manizales area was contacted and in a telephone inquiry, Gen. Tanguy spoke to John Adams who was helping the officer contacted in the clean-up around the University of Caldes area where John teaches. John assured General Tanguy that he and his family were fine and Tanguy assured John that the Adams family in Culver would be called.

Is Justice Deaf As Well as Blind?

handed justice, when will our legislators create equitable laws dealing with marijuana?

Don't worry, Willie Nelson, nobody is going to arrest you for smoking pot. After all, you are the newly-crowned "Country Music Entertainer of the Year," so it's all right for you to admit that you smoke marijuana without any fear of arrest and imprisonment.

In this column, two weeks ago, I challenged local attorneys, judges, or other authorities to explain why many young people are prosecuted for smoking pot, while celebrities can state publicly that they use it and remain free to go on doing so.

To use a cliché, the silence has been deafening. Is there no one in Marshall County who can tell me why the protection of Willie Nelson should not be extended to the other 16 million Americans currently using marijuana?

In these so-called United States, the protection may depend on the state you're living in. Eleven states have decided the marijuana laws are asinine and have decriminalized marijuana. But the young people in those states have to be careful. If they step over the border into one of the other 39 states with an ounce of pot, they can be arrested, convicted of a felony, and sentenced to prison.

In the name of even-

laws that protect them in other ways?

Do we convict and incarcerate cigarette smokers and alcoholics?

There are 57 million people over 18 who smoke cigarettes in this country. Do we protect those 57 million smokers by throwing them in jail? No. But we warn them on the package that it's dangerous to their health, and we have nationwide campaigns to try to get those addicted to nicotine to kick the nasty habit.

There are 10 million alcoholics in this country. Alcohol is a drug that weakens the users' resistance until they suffer from a chemical dependency. Unless they're caught driving under the influence of this potent drug, these 10 million drug addicts remain free. No one would ever think of mistreating these 10 million sick people by arresting them and throwing them in the slammer, especially since many of them are doctors and lawyers.

"I used to think that marijuana created only a psychological dependence, without physical addition," writes Walter Lehmann, MD. "But now I am persuaded otherwise. I have seen too many youngsters suffer the terrible anxiety, the sleeplessness, the sweating, the lack of appetite, the nausea and the general malaise of withdrawal."

The user of marijuana is ill and needs our help. I pray during the Season of Our Lord that His compassion will enter the hearts of our lawmakers and judges the lawyers and help them to find more humane ways to protect our precious young people.

INTERNATIONAL HOLIDAY TREATS

Armenia - Sugar Cakes

Very good served with a hot cup of coffee.
2 pkg. active dry yeast
1/2 c. lukewarm water
2 large potatoes, cooked & mashed
3/4 c. milk
1/2 c. soft butter or margarine
4 c. sifted flour
1/2 t. salt
2 eggs
1/2 c. sugar
1/4 c. brown sugar


Dissolve yeast in water. Add potatoes, milk, and 1/4 cup butter or margarine. Blend until there are no lumps. Stir in flour and salt. Beat eggs and sugar together and add to the dough mixture. Mix well. Cover with cloth wrung out in warm water, and place in 110 to 120 degree oven for 30 minutes. Place dough in a greased 6-cup ring mold orange cake pan. Punch 12 (1/2 inch deep) holes into the dough with your fingers. Fill the holes with the remaining butter (1/4 cup), and sprinkle with brown sugar. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. Yield: about 12 servings.

Culver - The Culver Military Academy hockey team will take its outstanding 9-1 record to Massachusetts this weekend as the Eagles participate in the Groton Invitational tournament. The tournament, sponsored by the Groton School, will feature Tabor Academy of Marion, Mass., state champion; Tabor Academy, South Andover, Mass.; and the state school. The team will be riding a winning streak into the tournament. The Eagles are to play Mishawaka, one of the weakest teams in the Michigan high school Hockey League, at the John W. Henderson Ice Arena Wednesday. CMA defeated the Michiganians last week.

The pair of league victories came December 5 and 6 at the Henderson Ice Arena. CMA defeated Elkhart December 5 and St. Joseph's December 6. Elkhart's Snider cancelled its season 7 game.

The Elkhart game was easier than expected, as CMA did not play up to its usual standard. "We did not play well and were fortunate to win," Coach Allen Clark said. "There were numerous defensive breakdowns, but the Sparrow (CMA) line made some great plays." The final score was 3-0.

Sparrow had a shutout in the third period. CMA's first goal came late in the first period. Ched Meyer scored from the slot and one in from Tom Smith and one in from Tom Smith. In the second period, John Henderson scored at 4:46 in the third period, and Kelley Asek scored at 2:05 from the slot. Meyer and Bucky Miller.

Public hearing on the following Ordinance will be Tuesday, Dec. 18, 1979 at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall, 200 E. Washington, Culver.

ORDINANCE NO. 79-019
An Ordinance fixing the schedule of rates and charges to be collected by the Town of Culver, Indiana, from the owners of Property served by the sewage works of said Town, and other matters connected therewith.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver has heretofore authorized the construction, maintenance and operation of works for the collection, treatment and disposal of sewage and has heretofore constructed, maintained and operated such works; and

WHEREAS, the operation of such works for the collection, treatment and disposal of sewage is authorized by the provisions of Chapter 284 of the Acts of the Indiana General Assembly of the State of Indiana for the year 1967 and acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, which acts require that the rates and charges to be collected for the use of and the service rendered by such sewage works be fixed by ordinance finally adopted after due notice and public hearing; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver, Indiana, now finds that the existing rates and charges for the use of and service rendered by said sewage works of said Town are too low and are insufficient to enable the Town of Culver to operate and maintain its sewage works, provide for debt service requirement and finance extensions and additions to the works and that the existing rates and charges should be increased; Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CULVER, INDIANA:

Section 1. For the use of and the services rendered by the sewage works, rates and charges shall be collected from the owners of each and every lot, parcel of real estate or building that is connected with the Town's sanitary sewage system or otherwise discharges sanitary waste, water, or other liquids, either directly or indirectly, into the sanitary sewage system of the Town of Culver, which rates and charges shall be payable as hereinafter provided and shall be in an amount determined as follows:

A. Except as herein otherwise provided, sewage rates and charges shall be based upon the quantity of water used on or in the property or premises subject to said rates and charges as the same is measured by the water meter there in use.

B. The water usage Schedule on which the amount of said sewage rates and charges shall be determined, shall be as follows:

Quantity of Water Used Per Month	Rate Per 1,000 Gallons
First 2,000 gallons	3.95
Next 4,000 gallons	3.55
Next 27,000 gallons	3.05
Next 67,000 gallons	2.55
Next 100,000 gallons	2.05
Over 200,000 gallons	1.57

The minimum charge for any user where the user is a metered customer shall be based upon meter sizes as follows:

Size of Meter	Per Month
1/4 - 3/4 inch meter	\$7.90
1 inch meter	13.00
1 1/4 inch meter	18.00
1 1/2 inch meter	26.00
2 inch meter	43.00
3 inch meter	88.00
4 inch meter	160.00
6 inch meter	320.00

The charge for sewage service for a single family dwelling unit, if such user is not a metered municipal water customer or is metered municipal water customer and in addition uses unmetered water from other sources, shall be \$18.55 per month. Provided, however, that such single family dwelling user with an unmetered supply of water may, at the customer's expense, install and maintain meters acceptable to the Town of Culver for the purpose of metering water supply used on or in the premises. In such case, the metered water usage shall be used as a basis for charge as set forth in Section 1, Sub-paragraph B.

Section 2.

A. The quantity of water obtained from sources other than the municipal waterworks of the Town of Culver and discharged into the public sanitary sewage system may be determined by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver in such manner as the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver shall elect, and the sewage treatment service may be billed at the above appropriate rates.

B. In the event a lot, parcel of real estate or building discharging sanitary sewage, industrial waste, water or other liquids into the Town's sanitary sewage system, either directly or indirectly, is not a user of the water supplied by the Town's

waterworks and is not a single family dwelling unit and the water used thereon or therein is not measured by a meter or is measured by a meter not acceptable to the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver, then the owner or other interested party, at his expense, shall install and maintain meters, wiers, volumetric measuring devices or any adequate and approved method of measurement acceptable to the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver for the determination of sewage discharge.

C. In the event a lot, parcel of real estate or building discharging sanitary sewage, industrial waste, water or other liquids into the Town's sanitary sewage system, either directly or indirectly, is a user of water supplied by the Town's waterworks and in addition uses water from another source which is not measured by a water meter not acceptable to the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver, and such user is not a single family dwelling unit, then the amount of water used shall be otherwise measured or determined by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver, the owner or other interested party, at his expense, shall install and maintain meters, wiers, volumetric measuring devices or any adequate and approved method of measurement acceptable to the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver for the determination of sewage discharge.

D. In the event of lot, parcel of real estate or building discharges sanitary sewage, industrial waste, water or other liquids into the Town's sanitary sewage system, either directly or indirectly, and uses water in excess of 50,000 gallons per quarter, and it can be shown to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver that a portion of water as measured by the water meter or meters does not and cannot enter the sanitary sewage system, then the owner or other interested party shall install and maintain meters, wiers, volumetric measuring devices or any adequate and approved method of measurement acceptable to the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver for the determination of sewage discharge in order to ascertain the rates and charges.

E. In the event two or more residential lots, parcels of real estate or buildings discharging - sanitary waste, water or other liquids into the Town's sanitary sewage system, either directly or indirectly, are users of water and the quantity of water is measured by a single water meter, then in such case, for building purposes, the quantity of water used shall be averaged for each user and the minimum charge and the sewage rates and charges shall apply to each of the number of residential lots, parcels of real estate or buildings served through the single water meter.

F. In the event two or more dwelling units such as trailers, apartments or house-keeping rooms discharging sanitary sewage, water or other liquids into the Town's sanitary sewage system, either directly or indirectly, are users of water and the quantity of water is measured by a single water meter, then in such case, billing shall be for a single service in the manner set out elsewhere herein, except that such charge shall not be less than the multiple of the dwelling units times the minimum quarterly charge for a 1/4 - 3/4 inch meter. In the case of trailer parks, the number of dwelling units shall be computed and interpreted as the total number of trailers located and installed in said part plus any other dwelling units served through the meter. A dwelling unit shall be interpreted as a room or rooms or any other place or spaces in which cooking facilities are provided, an having individual sink and toilet facilities.

G. In order that the domestic and residential users of sewage service shall not be penalized for sprinkling lawns during the months of June, July and August, the billing for sewage service for residences and/or domestic users for said months of June, July, and August, shall be based upon the water usage for the previous months of January, February and March. In the event the water usage for said previous months of January, February and March is greater than the water usage for said months of June, July and August, then the billing for sewage services shall be computed on the actual water used in the month for which the sewage service bill is being rendered. Domestic and/or residential sewage service as applicable to the sprinkling rate shall apply to each lot, parcel or building which is occupied and used as a residence. Said sprinkling rate shall not apply to any premises which are partially or wholly used for commercial or industrial purposes. In the event a portion of such premises shall be used for commercial or industrial purposes, the owner shall have the privilege of separating the water service so that the residential portion of the premises is served through a separate meter and in such case the water usage as registered by the water meter serving such portion of the premises used for residential purposes would qualify under the sprinkling rate.

H. For the service rendered to the Town of Culver, the Town shall be subject to the same rates and charges hereinabove provided or to rates and charges established in harmony herewith.

I. No lot, parcel of real estate or building located outside the corporate limits of the Town of Culver shall discharge sanitary sewage, industrial waste, water or other liquids into the Town's sanitary sewage system, either directly or indirectly, without the prior consent of the Board of Trustees of said Town. In the event such permission is granted, the rates and charges applying to said lot, parcel of real estate or building located outside the corporate limits shall be the rates and charges provided for herein.

J. A sub-divider, developer, or other owner or user shall be required to extend and pay for local and lateral sewers which shall be constructed to the specifications of the Town of Culver on such streets, rights-of-way or other easements as may be available and to dedicate such local and lateral sewers and appurtenances thereto to the Town of Culver. The Town shall thereafter own, operate and maintain such local and lateral sewers.

K. A charge shall be made to the owner or other users for expense of the Town in tapping a sewer line and extending such tap to the property line. Such charge shall include all material and labor in connection with such tap, including but not limited to, excavation, tapping the sewer, materials required to extend the tap to the property line, back-filling the trench and replacing the pavement. In no event shall such tap charge be less than \$150.00 per connection.

Section 3. In order that the rates and charges may be justly and equitably adjusted to the service rendered, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver shall have the right to base its charges not only on volume but also on the strength and character of the sewage and wastes which it is required to treat and dispose of. The Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver shall have the right to measure and determine the strength and content of all sewage and wastes discharged, either directly or indirectly, into the City's sanitary sewage system, in such manner and by such method as it may deem practicable in the light of the conditions and attending circumstances of the case, in order to determine the proper charge.

Extra charges based on the strength of the sewage and liquid wastes shall be made on the following basis:

Rate Surcharge Based Upon Suspended Solids:
PPM -- Part per Million;
Basic Rate -- 17¢ per pound.

For each pound of Suspended Solids in excess of 250 PPM of flow the charge shall be 17¢ per pound.

Rate Surcharge Based Upon BOD: PPM -- Parts per Million; BOD -- Biochemical Oxygen Demand; Basic Rate -- 13¢ per pound.

For each pound of Biochemical Oxygen Demand in excess of 200 PPM of flow the charge shall be 13¢ per pound.

To determine the strength of the sewage and wastes, samplings and analyses may be made from time to time whenever it is deemed desirable by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver. After charges have been established, based upon the strength of sewage and wastes, the owner may request re-consideration of these charges by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver by submitting analyses of composite samples of the sewage and wastes subject to such charges, certified by a Registered Engineer or a qualified graduate chemist. The Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver may then adjust the charges to the Ordinance rates required by such analysis or may recheck the findings by additional sampling and analysis. Requests for rate adjustments by the owner may be submitted no more than once every twelve (12) months.

The determination of Suspended Solids and Five-day Biological Oxygen Demand contained in the waste shall be in accordance with the latest copy of "Standard Methods for the Examination of Water, Sewage and Industrial Wastes", as written by the American Public Health Association, the American Water Works Association, and the Federation of Sew-

age and Industrial Wastes Association.

Section 4. The terms "sanitary sewage" and "industrial wastes" shall be defined as follows:

A. "Sanitary sewage" is defined as waste from water closets, urinals, lavatories, sinks, bathtubs, showers, household laundries, basements drains, garage floor drains, bars, soda fountains, cuspidors, refrigerator drips, drinking fountains, stable floor drains, and all other water-carried wastes except industrial wastes.

B. "Industrial wastes" are defined as being the liquid waste or liquid-borne waste resulting from any commercial manufacturing or industrial operation or process.

Section 5. The rates and charges shall be prepared and billed by the Town of Culver based upon monthly or, at the option of the Town, quarterly meter readings. If quarterly meter readings are used, estimated bills shall be rendered in each of the first two months of each calendar quarter. A final adjusted bill based upon meter readings and giving credit for prior payments shall be rendered for the final month of each quarter. Said rates and charges will be billed to the tenant or tenants occupying the property served unless otherwise requested in writing by the owners, but such billing shall in no wise relieve the owner from liability in the event payment is not made as herein required. The owners of the property served, which are occupied by tenants, shall have the right to examine the collection records of the Town of Culver for the purpose of determining whether such rates and charges have been paid by such tenants, provided that such examination shall be made in the office in which said records are kept and during the hours that such office is open for business.

Section 6. The Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver shall make and enforce such by-laws and regulations as may be deemed necessary for the safe, economic and efficient management of the Town's sewer system and for the construction and use of house sewers and connections to the sewer system, and for the regulations, collection, rebating and refunding of rates and charges.

Section 7. - The Board of Trustees of the Town of Culver is hereby authorized to prohibit dumping of waste into the Town's sewer system which, in its discretion, is deemed harmful to the operation of the sewage works, or to require methods effecting pretreatment of said wastes to reduce the harmful characteristics of the waste satisfactory to the Town.

Section 8. All ordinances or parts of ordinance in conflict herewith are hereby repealed, including Ordinance No. 76-0001. The invalidity of any section, clause or sentence or provisions of this ordinance shall not effect the validity of any other part of this ordinance which can be given effect without such invalid part or parts.

Section 9. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

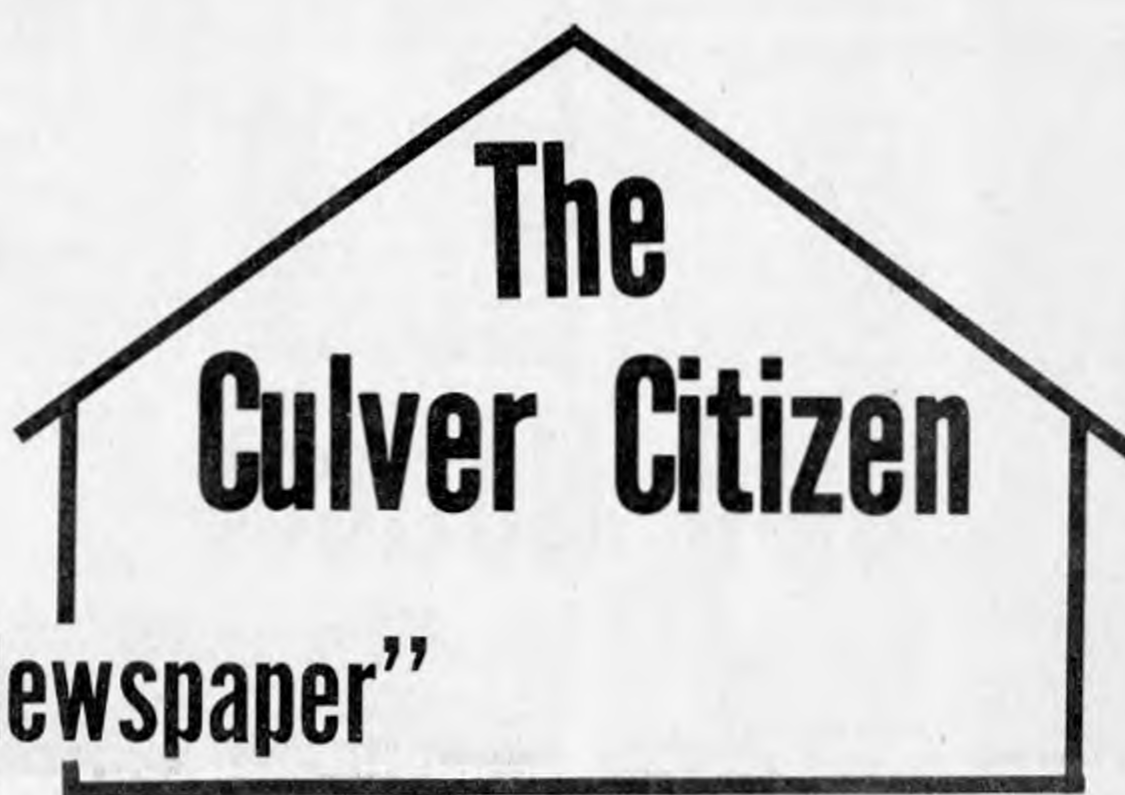

WATCHNIGHT FILM TO BE SHOWN IN ARGOS

Argos - A new film, *The Presence of Mine Enemies*, the compelling story of ex-prisoner of war, Captain Howard E. Rutledge, will be shown at the Watchnight Service on Dec. 30, 1979 at the Congregational Christian Church. The Watchnight Service is from 9:00 to 12:00 p.m.

Captain Rutledge, who became a prisoner of the North Vietnamese on November 27, 1965, when his fighter plane was downed by heavy anti-aircraft fire, a "drop-out" Christian layman, rediscovered the necessity of faith in Christ while suffering torture and deprivation in the "Hanoi Hilton." He describes the terrible years of loneliness, of waiting, of hoping, and the miracle - by - miracle workings of God in the notorious prison camp.

PARENTS ARE WARNED TO BEWARE OF EYE-THREATENING TOYS

Argos - If gifts for children are on your holiday shopping list, the Indiana Society to Prevent Blindness cautions you to select them with safety in mind.

Toys were responsible for 6,409 eye injuries last year, the Society reports, and more than three-quarters of these accidents occurred in children under the age of 15. Another 1,913 youngsters in this age group suffered eye injuries from BB guns, darts and bows and arrows.

"Ninety percent of these injuries could be avoided," stressed Sue Hetherington, Executive Director of the Indiana affiliate of the National Society to Prevent Blindness. "Parents can help prevent eye damage-and even the loss of an eye by selecting toys and games with care and by keeping an eye on their children while they play."

"The best gifts are those which can help children have fun as they learn, without endangering themselves," Mrs. Hetherington asserted. Playthings with projectiles or sharp edges have a built-in threat to eyes and should be avoided. These kinds of "toys" can and do cause accidents.

Figures based on a survey of hospital emergency rooms by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission indicate that in 1978 children under 15 experienced:

- over 90 per cent of the 116 eye injuries related to toy guns and other toy weapons with projectiles.

- 77 per cent of the 1,335 eye injuries associated with gas, air or spring-operated guns.

- all of the 137 estimated eye injuries from slingshots and other sling-propelled toys.

Toys and games with less obvious eye hazards can also cause damage. Even skateboards, toy cars and trucks were responsible for eye injuries last year and almost all were suffered by children under 15. Sometimes it's just that the child is too young to handle the toy safely. Often, too, play becomes rough and youngsters accidentally hurt themselves or playmates.

"Three-quarters of eye accidents occur while children are not supervised," Mrs. Hetherington noted. "It's vital that parents know what their youngsters do at play. Do they take a 'safe' toy and make it unsafe-for example, by pulling rubber tips off darts? When safety risk and dangers are explained, does the child understand and avoid them? Do older children keep their more complex toys and games out of reach of younger family members? Be sure to show your youngster how to use their gifts properly."

"Keep these tips in mind and your children will play in greater safety-during this holiday season and year 'round," the ISPB director concluded.

Culver Police Report For November

Culver - A total of 3,289 miles were patrolled during the month of November. There were two vehicle accidents, nine traffic arrests and seven parking tickets issued. One adult was arrested on a criminal violation.

Five requests were made through our department for home security checks. One bicycle was registered. There were 77 complaints received and documented with the appropriate action taken.

In continuing education and training our officers had a combined total of thirty hours of specialized training on Accident Investigation and Crime Scene Photography. Two additional hours were also spent in court.

On November 13, 1979, Marshal Caudill and Officer Leahy presented a program to the Culver Chamber of Commerce concerning "Shoplifting." Preventative security for the merchants was emphasized. They also discussed with them action that could be taken in apprehending suspects and the procedures to follow in notifying the police.

A group of Girl Scouts visited our department on November 19, 1979 talking with Officer Leahy regarding bicycle safety. There were approximately 15 girl scouts in attendance with their leaders. Bicycle safety and traffic laws were discussed with them.

ARGOS MAIL CARRIERS NEED COOPERATION

Argos - Rural mail carriers expect to deal with more than their share of snow and sleet and freezing rain, but Postmaster Francis Coplen recently reminded customers in the Argos area that his carriers will need some assistance during winter months, carriers will make every reasonable effort to serve as many customers as possible during severe winter weather, but Coplen said carriers are not expected to leave their vehicles and provide service on foot when roads, entire blocks, or other large portions of their routes are impassable.

"Rural carriers are expected to leave their vehicles to serve temporarily blocked individual boxes where there is no risk of personal injury or unusual physical exertion," Coplen said, "but now when access to several mailboxes along a continuous segment of a route is blocked."

Coplen said his office keeps in close contact with traffic and weather advisories to determine if delivery should be suspended on a particular day, and with highway department officials to make sure public roads are passable and in good repair.

"We need everyone's cooperation in keeping approaches to boxes clear of snow and any other obstructions," Coplen said, "so we can avoid cutting anyone's mail delivery even temporarily."

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Tom's Construction Offers Fireplace Tips

Argos - Tom's Construction of Argos has this advice to offer Argos residents who are thinking of installing a fireplace. A new fireplace can add warmth and style to any room in the home. For the average handyman it is not a difficult task, but like all do-it-yourself projects it should be carefully planned.

First, choose a place in the room where you won't run into complications. Make sure ceiling rafters or wall studs will not interfere at the point you plan to run your chimney. The required distance of placement of a fireplace from combustible materials varies by type. Check the fireplace installation instructions before positioning unit.

Wherever your chimney passes through walls, ceiling or roofs, it should be a UL listed, insulated steel chimney that meets local building code approval. Do not use a "gas vent" flue with a woodburning fireplace, even if you plan to install a gas log burner.

The selected chimney diameter size should be the same size or larger than the fireplace smoke outlet, regardless of the fuel used. Even if you plan to use a "gas log" burner, the chimney must be the same size as the fireplace outlet, to avoid invisible smoke pollution.
