

tion? In recent years, the value of the dollar has declined in comparison with the currency of many other industrialized nations. One reason is that we have been importing more than we have been exporting, especially

costly foreign crude oil. Since our "cheaper" dollars buy less overseas, many of the goods we import cost more, adding to our inflation rate. At the same time, U.S. manufacturers of similar goods - cars for example - can raise their prices and still remain competitive with higher priced foreign products.
