

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



are a producer in our economy. Productivity is a way of measuring the output of working people or producers. It is a combination of how well you work at whatever job you do - how skillful you are and how much effort you make - and how efficient the tools or machines are that you use.

Our productivity increased an average of almost three percent per year in the sixties. So far, in the seventies. increases have averaged only 1.6% a year. Among Western nations, we rank 8th in the rate of productivity growth.

When inflation is severe, industries may lack the confidence and ability to invest in modernization. Productivity growth sags. Our output of foods and services can fall short of growing demands. If wages increases are not







Dear Santa,


