Baccalaureate & Commencement This Sunday

Culver Community High School will hold graduation exercises for 105 students at 3:00 p.m. Sunday, May 27, in the high school gymnasium.

Dr. Joe Wick, a graduate of the Christian Theological Seminary, who has been minister for the First Christian Church, Lafayette, since 1958, will deliver the main address.

Dr. Wick was graduated from Texas Christian University and has studied in Scotland, Germany, and London. He is a speaker of world renown having appeared before audiences in the Philippines, Jerusalem, Dhahran, Saudi Arabia, and Glasgow, Scotland.

The speaker will be introduced by Superintendent A. F. Allen and the class will be presented by Principal John R. Hayes. Awards will be presented by A. Judson Dillon, Director of Guidance.

The high school band and chorus will provide special music. Rev. Roger L. Sommer, Trinity Lutheran Church will give the invocation and Rev. Danell Maddock, Burr Oak Church of God, will deliver the benediction.

Plan Memorial Day Services For Monday

Memorial Day observance in Culver will be held at 10:00 a.m. on Monday, May 28, at the Memorial Rock on the Culver Public Library lawn. CSM Allen B. Chesser, commander of the American Legion Post 301 announces that plans have been completed in cooperation with the VFW Post 6919, Culver.

Col. E. Kemp Moore will be the speaker for the services. The program will open with remarks by the commander of the Legion, with prayer by the Legion chaplain, Col. John W. Henderson. The commander will introduce Col. Moore and his speech will be followed by the placing of wreaths at the Rock.

Participating in the ceremonies with the Legion and VFW will be the Ladies Auxiliary of the Legion and of the VFW; War Mothers, Boy Scouts and Brownies. Army trucks from CMA will be provided. Following the benediction by the chaplain the parade will proceed to the cemetery.

IMPROVE MAILBOX WEEK

The condition and position of mailboxes, both rural and in towns, will be noted during the week of May 21-26, the period set for Mailbox Improvement Week, according to Postmaster E. W. Mattox.

The Postal Service designates a week during May each year when customers on rural city delivery routes are encouraged to examine and improve, where necessary, the appearance of their mailboxes.

The purpose of Mailbox Improvement Week is to call attention to the need for providing mail receptacles which are designed to protect mail from the weather, and are neat in appearance,

conveniently located and safe to use. Neat attractive mailboxes make a significant contribution to the appearance of the countryside and the streets of a suburban area.

The height of the box depends upon the type vehicle used by the carrier. The box should be adjusted so that as the lid opens, it falls even with the lowered window of the vehicle. This not only is for the convenience of the carrier, it increases efficiency by enabling the carrier to see clearly into the open box when letters are to be picked up and helps him to expedite delivery by saving a few seconds at each box.

In addition to the famed "500" there will be three additional races in Indianapolis on May 26 and 27. The events, to be held at the Indiana State Fairgrounds, will feature AMA motorcycles Saturday afternoon, USAC sprint cars Saturday night and USAC midgets Sunday night.

Indiana business leaders from throughout the state will gather in Indianapolis on June 12, for a nationwide teleconference on consumerism. The Hoosier businessmen and industrialists will be among 2,500 executives expected to view the program when it is presented simultaneously in 16 cities by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. The theme for the closed-circuit show will be "Selling in This Age of

Consumerism: How to Meet the Challenge and Profit From It."

More than one million dollars in federal funds is expected to go into a five-year demonstrative project in the Indiana portion of the Maumee River Basin in order to protect it and develop it for recreational purposes. The river is in one of 20 waterways of the nation being studied for eventual special development under the Wild and Scenic River Act of 1970.

Purdue University Theatre will present four theatrical productions this summer beginning with "The Moon Is Down," by Nobel and Pulitzer prize winner, John Steinbeck. The second production will be the premier production of an original script by Ms. Shelia Hofstetter, a graduate student at Purdue. The play is entitled "Born Dyin'." Third will be "Sticks and Bones," by David Rabe, and the final play of the season will be "Room Service" by John Murray and Allen Boretz. The season opens June 20 and lasts until August 11 with each play running for two weeks. Details and ticket information can

be obtained from the Loeb Theatre box office after June 4.

The Johnny Horizon '76 "Let's Clean Up American For Our 200th Birthday" program has received recognition as an official National Bicentennial Program activity by the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission (ARBC). Johnny Horizon's own cleanup month will be September 15 to October 15, and the goal of the month will be to "clean up a measurable amount of America." In addition, Johnny Horizon '76 will be featured in the United States Pavilion at Expo '74 to be held in Spokane, Washington.

The need for strengthened insurance regulations regarding the replacement of a policyholder's existing life insurance with a new policy was subject of top priority discussion on the 86th anniversary meeting of the 3,000-member Indiana State Association of Life Underwriters in Indianapolis May 15-16. Attending from the Culver area was Mr. Carl Raffel.

Indiana State University will become home for over 950 high school seniors from throughout the state beginning Saturday, June 9, as they begin their eight-day stay as delegates to the 1973 Hoosier Boys' State. This is the fifth year Indiana State has been the site of the program. The

event is designed to instill in Hoosier youths a sense of individual responsibility to the community, state and nation. Attending from Culver will be James Andrew Ervin, Martin B. McCombs and Mark Allen Kepler.

The new Metamora Mill Museum and other new facilities at the old grist mill at Whitewater Canal State Memorial will be dedicated June 14 by Governor Otis R. Bowen. Visitors to the museum may see numerous artifacts of the Whitewater Canal era and also will be able to watch the grinding operations. Metamora is 68 miles southeast of Indianapolis and 45 miles northwest of Cincinnati.

Senator Vance Hartke, chairman of the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs, announced that the Veterans' Administration will provide financial assistance in the construction of a 100-bed nursing home facility at the Indiana State Soldiers' Home in Lafayette. The grant will cover \$1.5 million of the estimated \$3.7 million project cost.

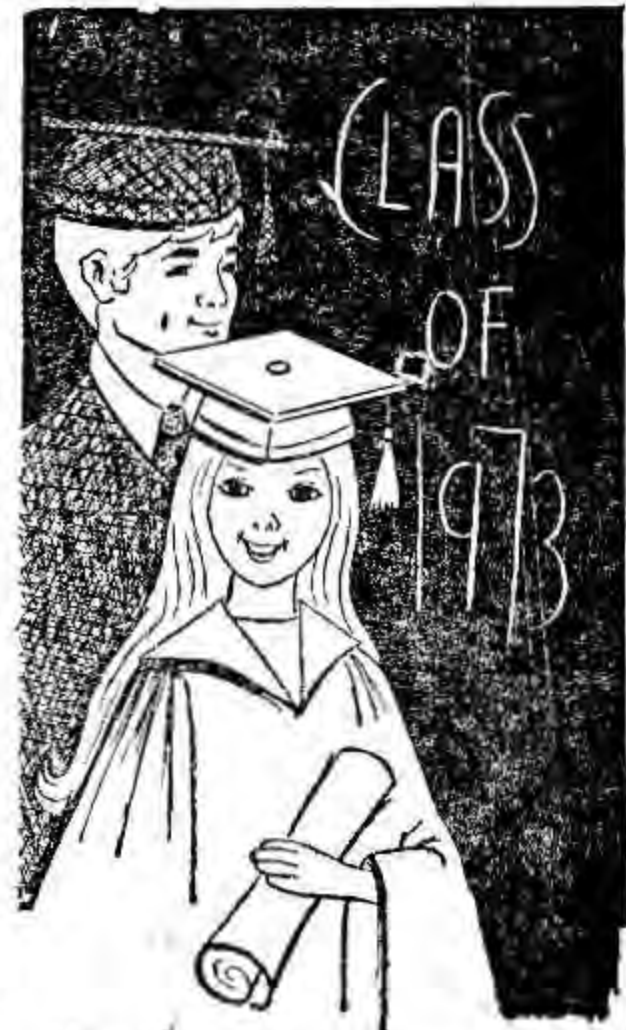

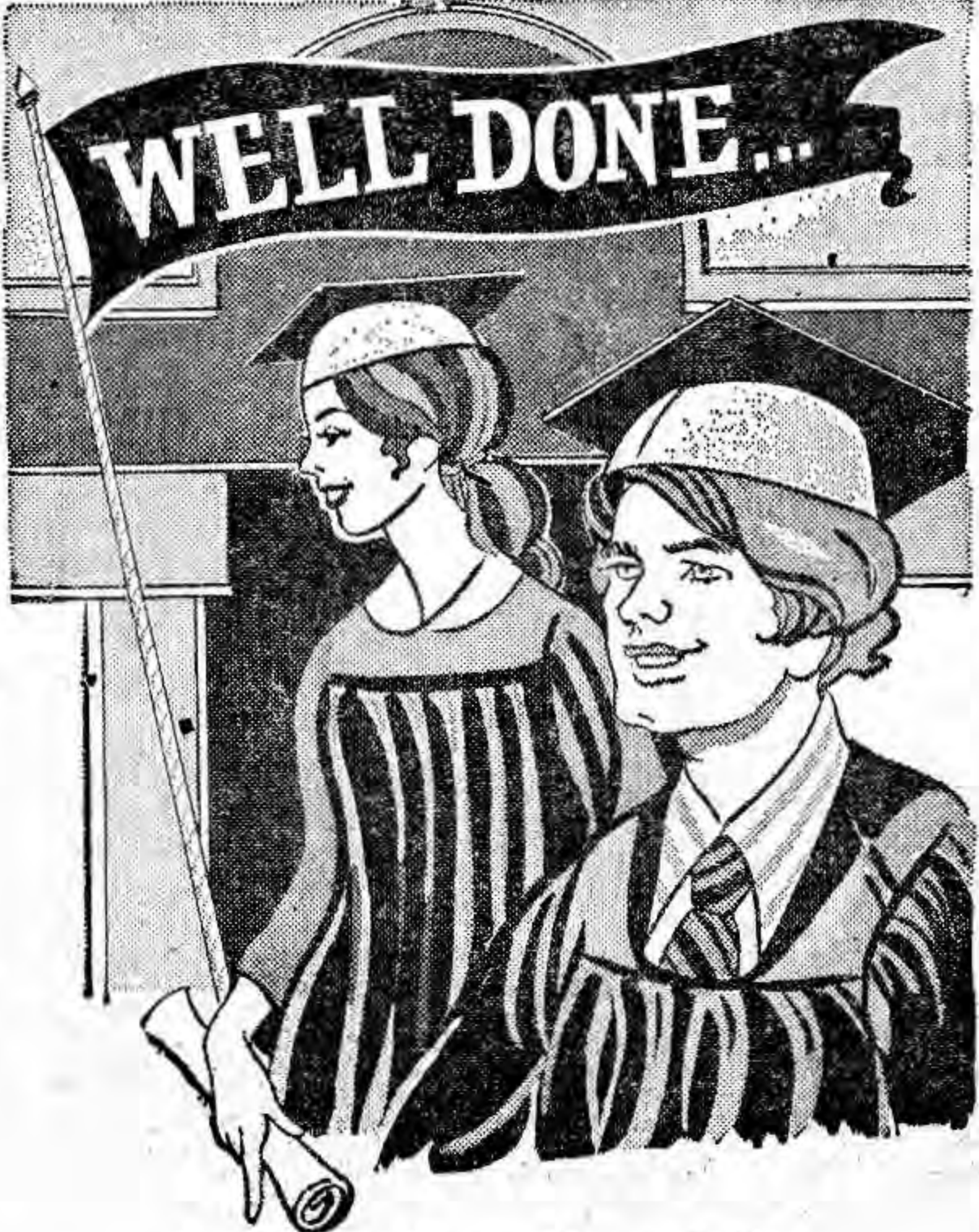
