Editorials

The Culver CITIZEN, in the absence of an Editorial this week, wishes to present for the consideration of Culver area residents the following information about possible fine arts programs available to our community.

The Indiana State Arts Commission has been increasingly aware of the cultural needs of smaller communities. The special program described in the following announcement is designed for Culver, and the management of The CITIZEN has dealt with the Commission before, and has found it most helpful.

Interested groups or individuals are encouraged to discuss this program with their membership, and to communicate any interest to the CITIZEN office, now located at 307 North Main Street, Culver.

PREVIEW PERFORMANCES PROGRAM

Indiana communities in less metropolitan areas that wish to expand their cultural offerings by co-sponsoring performances of vocal and instrumental music, full plays, musicals, staged readings, poetry readings, ballet, or modern dance should contact the Indiana Arts Commission.

The Indiana Arts Commission (I.A.C.) is initiating a program which will bring young pre-professional performers in the dramatic and musical arts to interested Indiana communities. The Preview Performances Program is made possible by a grant from the Lilly Endowment, Incorporated.

There is a quickening of interest in the arts in Indiana, as across the nation. Today Americans are spending more money to attend professional performing arts events than to attend professional sports events.

The Community Arts Council movement is growing very rapidly here, as elsewhere. Two years ago, there were seven community arts councils in Indiana; now, there are nearly two dozen.

However, many less metropolitan areas have limited opportunities to be exposed to and involved in arts experiences of high wquality.

The Commission realizes that Indiana has a significant number of talented young performers in the areas of dance, drama, and music. They feel there is a need to provide a forum for these performers in their own areas and, at the same time, serve Indiana communities.

The Preview Performances Program is ther proposal to help answer these needs and to develop potential audiences outside our more metropolitan areas.

The program was conceived and formulated by former I.A.C. Chairman, Dr. William B. Christ, Associated Dean of the Indiana University School of Music. On July 1, 1973, Dr. Christ was succeeded as chairman by Dr. Thomas P. Bergin, Dean of the Center for Continuing Education, University of Notre Dame.

The Commission is now soliciting letters of application from communities situated in counteis with a maximum population of 50,000 to be considered by a special committee in the near future. Such letters should express an interest in the possibility of acting as co-sponsor for a series of from two to six varied performances.

Main responsibilities of co-sponsors will be to:

- 1. Provide an auditorium (or other suitable performing area)
 - 2. Supply volunteers for ticket taking, ushering, etc.

3. Handle all other local arrangements.

Any non-profit civic, cultural, or service organization that has a commitment to community improvement, such as a Chamber of Commerce, a sorority, or a Homemakers club, is eligible to act as a co-sponsor.



The Backyard Horseman

PART II: PROPER USE OF THE SPUR AND CROP

The two most common artificial aids are the spur and crop. Unfortunately, the spur is often mistaken for a common aid. It is a "reinforcing" tool and should be used either to punish or support the leg. The same is true of the crop. Much damage can be done physically both and psychologically to the horse if they are used improperly. The key to proper usage is to make sure the horse disobeyed, not that you caused the horse to commit the disobedience.

Use of the Spur

The spurs especially are used to reinforce the legs. There is a "two-second" theory to follow when using the spurs. The legs should be applied (squeezing); if the horse doesn't obey, then the legs should be applied again and immediately followed up with the spurs. This is repeated until the horse becomes obedient to the leg.

Spurs can also be used to correct for any disobedience. Again, the 'two-second' theory must be applied. If the disobedience occurs, then punishment must follow immediately. It is well to remember that reward

eserves the "two-second" theory also.

Use of Crops:

For general purposes we shall break "crops" down into three categories: crops, bats, and whips. For our purpose we shall consider them all together.

Use of the crop follows the same principles as using the spur. But, it should be a last resort. After the leg and the spur have failed, then the crop should be used. The crop can be used to reinforce the leg and correct disobediences. It should never be used as a substitute for the leg. When schooling horse to the legs then the same procedure is used as with the spur. Finally, a most important point is that the crop should never be used anywhere but behind the saddle.

Days Gone By...

Memories From Past CITIZENS

September 5, 1968

Betty Jean Maull, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Maull, of CMA, sailed from New York harbor aboard the M.S. AURELIA for a year of studies at the University of Madrid in Spain. She is a student at Indiana University, and the program was sponsored by the University of Purdue.

"a little bit like the old generalstore"
