INDIANA BELL IMPROVES SERVICE

CULVER CUSTOMERS TO ENJOY BELL'S NEW DIALING AIDS

The latest in long distance calling services is coming to Culver.

Rod Lubeznik, the Indiana Bell manager, said automatic number identification (ANI) will be the first of the new services available to the Culver telephone exchange starting today, November 8th.

He said ANI will enable Culver phone users to direct-dial long distance calls themselves from oneand two-party telephones without the necessity of giving their phone number to an operator.

Newly installed equipment in the Culver telephone building permits the automatic recording of the number from which the call is being placed, the called number, and the length of the call.

Technicians from the Western Electric Company, the manufacturing and supply unit of the Bell System, installed the new gear, which has been tested and readied for use by Bell Culver technicians Bill Martin and Mike Bennett. The installation project involves an investment of about \$80,000 in Culver.

Lubeznik said long distance calls still can be dialed from four-party lines, but an operator will continue to ask for the calling party's number before the call is completed.

Starting November 16th, Culver residents will be able to dial station-to-station long distance calls from coin phones as well as person-to-person, credit card, collect and other special billed calls from both coin and regular telephones.

"The new service will be provided by a system the phone company calls a Traffic Service Position System (TSPS) which contributes to a more efficient and economical method of handling the increasing volumes of long distance calls," Lubeznik said.

The new system is based on a computer-type operation. The new equipment is designed to diagnose its own trouble and in most cases a problem is found and corrected before it ever affects a customer.

Lubeznik said with the new system long distance calls will be handled about 40 per cent faster than by present methods. He said the system also will provide more accurate billing, since there will be

less chance of error. He also said the system should reduce time required for an three seconds in most cases.


Another feature is the capability for an operator to display on her console the telephone number from which a call is being placed. This can be especially useful in an emergency when a caller panics or for some reason might not be able to be understood.

Lubeznik said the system also automatically reports to Bell technicians any trouble it finds on a customer's line while attempting to complete a call. In the past, such reports have been made manually by the operators. The new system will provide the information hourly in computer printout form, and in some cases it will be possible for technicians to make needed repairs before the customer is aware of the trouble.

Airplane Makes Forced Landing

Editorials

A COMMUNITY LOSS

It is not something you can see by taking an autumn walk down Main Street, but the Indiana University campus in South Bend is an asset of this community. It is one of those sources of higher education that allows Culver area residents to pursue a first class education through the graduate level without the expense of relocating for many months of several years.

The value of this community asset is going to be substantially diminished in the near future if that campus loses its music department— and this is a real danger.

Despite the existence of a large and uniformly qualified faculty, over a hundred full-time music majors and a couple of dozen graduate students, a new recital half, grand pianos and practice rooms galore, and several high quality music performing organizations, the Indiana Commission for Higher Education may soon yell "Stop The Music."

Because of the surprising (to I.U. officials) growth of the I.U.S.B. music program under the able leadership of Robert W. Demaree and his growing staff of dedicated musician-teachers, this regional campus began graduating students in music before a music degree program was formally approved for the South Bend campus. These students took classes here but received Bloomington degrees.

Their education, however, was unique in many ways. They studied with professors, many with terminal degrees, instead of graduate students as on the Bloomington campus. They were also able to save thousands of dollars. Many claimed that their education was more complete. Further, the net result of this program on the community made I.U.S.B. the prime mover in the Fine Arts in the Michiana area.

This situation may halt in the near future, because the Commission for Higher Education has frozen the expansion of degree programs at the I.U. campuses, refusing to act upon the I.U.S.B. Music Department program request for almost two years.

From a policy standpoint, we feel that the loss of the music program at 1.U.S.B. would reflect the Commission's commitment to a degree program at regional campuses that would be far inferior in scope and depth to that of other universities.

From a public trust standpoint, we believe such a decision would put into question whether the original goal of the Commission, and the stated reason for the freeze of degree programs— the overall improvement of the state system of universities, is the present goal of the Commission.


From a political standpoint, we fear that pressure to cut back regional campus programs comes from Bloomington, where student registrations are far below projections, where dorms stand empty because of the high cost of a Bloomington education, and where a new multi-million dollar opera house will require bond payments well into the next century. This pressure from the "Southern Campus" may, unfortunately, weigh heavily upon the appointed members of the Commission.

So, we suggest to the Commissioners that we value the I.U.S.B. Music Department. We consider the leadership of the Department to be unexcelled, and the quality of the student product above expectation for a program so young in years. We do not want to lose this asset of our area, or see a popular, on-going, successful academic structure broken up after it has been allowed to grow and after students have come to rely on its presence in this area.

We will express our feelings to our legislators, and to the Commission. Citizen readers may also address their comments to: Indiana Commission for Higher Education, 143 West Market Street, Indianapolis, Indiana 46204.

We urge you to consider our opinion carefully, and support our stand if you agree with our position.

Major newspapers in several cities this past week issued editorial calls to the President to resign from his office. This newspaper is not yet ready to make such a request. However, we would encourage readers to express their opinions in this matter by writing a Letter To The Editor expressing their opinion.


Golf Cart Accidents

Hanson and his wife were heading for the clubhouse in a golf cart when she had a sudden urge to stand up. But as she did so, she lost her balance and fell against the tiller. The cart lurched crazily, throwing Hanson to the ground.

Painfully injured, he determined to seek damages from the management of the club.

"Considering how unstable their carts are," he argued in a court hearing, "they should have posted a warning against anyone standing up. This they failed to do."

However, the court turned down Hanson's claim.



"There are certain obvious dangers," said the court, "against which a warning is not necessary. The seller of a knife is not required to warn against cutting oneself, or that a hammer will hurt if a person is hit with it."

With the growing popularity of golf carts, more accident cases are finding their way into court. Generally speaking, claims for damages have not been too successful, often because the blame lies with the victim himself.

But if the mechanism is faulty, compensation may indeed be collected from either the club management or the cart manufacturer.

In another case, the golf cart was missing the rubber pad that normally covers the brake pedal. When the driver tried to use the brake, his spiked shoe slid off the pedal and hit the accelerator, causing the cart to run into another golfer.

This time, the victim collected from the club management. Grounds: negligent maintenance of equipment.

One club tried to block any and all claims by including a "we are not responsible" clause in its rental form. But the clause was so well hidden in printed verbiage that a court later found it to be null and void.

The court said enforcing such a clause against an injured golfer, unaware of its existence, "would truly be unconscionable."

TRINITY CHURCH CELEBRATES **DOUBLE ANNIVERSARY**

A double anniversary celebration takes place this Sunday, November 11th, at 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. at Trinity Lutheran Church, 330 Academy Road. During a morning service, the congregation observes the 125th anniversary of the Synod the parish joined. The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod is 125 years old, has grown to be the second largest Lutheran group in the United States, and is raising a \$27 million fund for expansion of ministries and missions.

During a 3:00 p.m. service, Trinity Church keeps a fifteenth anniversary of organization and church life. Speaker at the vespers is Rev. Elwood Zimmermann, President of the Indiana District Church-Missouri Synod. His topic is: "Praise God for His Continuous Grace." Psalm 106. The topic of Rev. R. L. Sommer's sermon during the morning jubilee service is "What A Word Is This!" St. Luke 4, 16. Linda Snapp and Robert Kamrow will assist in the music of the services.

Trinity is the smallest and voungest of the churches in Culver. The congregation dedicated a church and parish hall in 1971, with an estimated value, including the site, of \$60,000. Returning to serve as liturgist is Rev. Vernon Knight, pastor of St. John Lutheran Church, Rochester. He served during a dual pastorate arrangement between St. John and Trinity from 1971-72. Other pastors who served Trinity are: Rev. Delmar Krueger, now of Danville, Illinois, 1958-60; Rev. R. J. Mueller, who served in the sixties, now living at Pearsall, Texas; Rev. Edmund Broders, retired, served the parish from South Bend until Rev. Knight came in 1971. Over the 15-year history, the congregation used the Culver Public Library, the Legion Hall, and rented an abandoned church in Burr Oak, until their church was dedicated.

Sunday, November 11th, about 25 charter members will be honored. Martin Uebel is chairman of the congregation, Robert Cultice is chairman of the Anniversary committee. Following the 3:00 p.m. service, the Women's Guild, led by Mrs. James Kalinke, will serve refreshments. The public is invited.

POOL TO BE DEDICATED AT CMA

James R. Lowenstine will be on the campus of Culver Military Academy and the Culver Academy for Girls today for the dedication of the new James R. Lowenstine Pool complex, for which he was the major donor. The Culver Educational Foundation's board of directors will also attend the ceremony as part of their regular fall meeting.

Lt. Gen. John W. Carpenter III, Usaf (ret.), Culver's superintendent, will welcome the guests and introduce Lowenstine, who will present the pool to the school. foundation board chairman B. B. Culver, Jr., will make the acceptance speech and will unveil a plaque bearing Lowenstine's name.

Culver swimming team cocaptains Doug Herge and Henry LaViers will present Lowenstine with a varsity letter and a certificate recognizing him as an honorary member of the swimming team. Following the presentation. Herge and LaViers will pour a jug of "sacred" water from the old pool, built in 1917, into the new pool and diving tank. The Kyroscope timing device will be demonstrated during an intramural swimming tournament following the ceremony.

The new eight-lane pool is 60 by 75 feet, with a depth of four feet. The separate diving tank-40 feet square and 13 feet deep—features one 3-meter and two 1-meter Duraflex springboards. A filter room provides electronically controlled heating, chlorination and filtration of pool water.

The Lowenstine Pool will be used for classes in survival swimming. Red Cross Lifesaving and general swimming instruction in addition to its use by varsity and intramural teams.

CATARACT

NE of the earliest signs of cataract is dimming of eyesight. Lights may appear double or re-

duplicated many times. The patient may feel as if he is looking at things through a spotty windowpane. Excessive dazzling in sunlight is another frequent complaint.

As the cataract extends and blocks off the pupil of the eye, sight becomes more and more reduced. General medical treatment is always advisable.

When vision is markedly impaired, the surgeon may remove the cloudy lens. A cataract operation is usually performed under local anesthesia and requires only a short stay in the hospital-usually with excellent results. Eyeglasses are later prescribed to act as a substitute lens.

A cataract is not a growth. tumor or cancer. Cataract merely means that a cloudy lens is blocking vision.

COPAD SCHEDULES MEETING

The Executive Committee of COPAD will meet with members of the Natural Resources Committee at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, November 13th, in the VFW Social Room.

COPAD will review its remaining recommendations in Natural Resources and the suggestions of Congressman Elwood H. Hillis, who has sent preliminary reports of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) for the Committee's consideration.

The EPA's preliminary findings contradict results of a recent study commissioned by the Lake Maxinkuckee Association, which indicated there was little reason for concern about the quality of water in the lake.

The EPA findings, based upon three or four extensive surveys this year, suggest a major problem in the oxygen levels of the lake water.
