

Citizen readers may be surprised this week to read in the School Board minutes on Page Nine that the Superintendent was unanimously granted a new three year contract at the last Board meeting.

If you are not surprised, let us say that we are — not that the contract was granted, but that the School Board nandled the matter in the secretive way they did.

It is unfortunate that the discussion of this most critical subject was deferred until a rescheduled meeting on the night the Citizen is mailed, when no staff member could attend. It is unfortunate that no notice was given to the public that such a subject was on the meeting agenda. It is unfortunate that Board members requested a "closed meeting" when the subject came up last week, and waited until guests left to discuss the near - \$20,000 a year contract.

We wonder whether this procedure is the best way to find out whether the parents, taxpayers and general public were satisfied with our Superintendent. We wonder whether this desire for secrecy is actual or just circumstance.

We wonder about the terms of the contract.

We wonder about the legality of a decision made in closed session.

We wonder about the whole deal...


Deathbed Drama

It was a scene fit for the movies. Old Mr. Watkins lay dying. His will was rushed to his hospital room, ready for signing. But as he was in the act of inscribing his name, his strength failed him.

"Help me finish," he whispered.

A friend stepped to the bedside, held the dying man's hand, and helped him complete the signature.

Was the will valid? A court ruled that it was indeed, even though Watkins had not been able to finish the name himself. The court said there could be no doubt, under the circumstances, that the signature was his own voluntary affirmation of the will.



Sooner or later, death overtakes us all. Yet, people persist in waiting until their final moments to make a will.

Ohviously, this heightens the chance of a slip-up. Consider another deathbed case:

An elderly widow also felt her strength ebbing white she was part way through her signature. But instead of asking for assistance, she merely lay hack and said;

"I just can't sign it now." She never did finish. In due

course, her heirs tried to establish the validity of the will on the hasis of the partial signature. But this time, their efforts were in vain. The court said the widow's own words indicated that she did not consider the document complete.

In a third case, a man had already lapsed into unconsciousness by the time the will was brought to his bedside. Here too a friend held his hand and guided his signature.

Afterward, everyone agreed that the will had been drawn up in accordance with his instructions. Nevertheless, a court found the man's will null and void. The signature didn't become his, said the court, merely because his hand was in physical contact with the pen while his name was being written.

"There was no magic in his touch," said the court. "Both its power and the intelligence necessary to direct it were in a state of suspension."




CULVER COMMUNITY HIGH SCHOOL Honor Roll, 1973-74

Academic Honor Roll: To be eligible for the Academic Honor Roll, a student can have no grade lower than "C". For every "C" grade there must be a corresponding "A" grade. There are seven catagories: 6A, 5A, 4A, 3A, 2A, 1A, Honorable Mention (Straight "B" Average)

Achievement Honor Roll: To be eligible for the Achievement Honor Roll, a student must raise his total grade achievement a total of eight points the first time and a total of six points for each additional grading period. One point can be counted for each fraction of a letter that the grade is raised (Example, "C" to "C + " is one point; "C" to "B" is three points, etc.).

Students sign for Honor Roll during period six on the day report cards are distributed. Announcements are made informing students when to come to the front lower hall. Students must present their cards to the assigned person at the time they sign. Students who fail to report at the assigned time will not be listed on the school's official honor roll.



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

SCHOOL SPIRIT POLL

With the basketball season drawing near and a lot of emphasis being focused on the players and school spirit, a subject for debate arises as to whether Culver has good school spirit or not. To shed some light on the subject, members of our staff conducted a student poll to see just how much the student body is behind the basketball team.

Out of the 168 students questioned (about 1/3 of the student body), 109 people said they were going to attend the first game of the season. This is about 65% The second question dealt with community interest in the team, 56% of the students said that their parents never attend the basketball games, while 31% attend occasionally. Only 13% of the parents were reported to attend regularly. The third question revealed that about 62% of the kids could name at least 5 Culver basketball players while 38% could not. 62% said that they do care if Culver has a good season and the remaining 38% could care less. The final question had to do with student confidence in the team. 63% feel that Culver will win the first game.

The results of this poll seems to indicate that over half the students of CCHS are behind the basketball players and the team. This can be interpreted as either good or bad, depending on how you feel. The real test of school spirit will be Saturday night.

NEW HONOR ROLL SYSTEM

Our usual honor roll system was replaced this year by a new, hopefully more efficient system. To be eligible for the Academic Honor roll you can have no grade lower than a "C", and for every "C" there must be a corresponding "A". There are seven categories -6A, 5A, 4A, 3A, 2A, 1A, and Honorable Mention. Honorable Mention is a straight "B" average. These students not only obtain the pride of being on the honor roll, but get a reward anywhere from a complimentary ticket to the theatre to a free ice cream bar in the school cafeteria to a hearty hand shake from the principal.

At the end of our next nine week period an Achievement Honor Roll will be brought into the school. To be eligible, a student must raise his grades at least 8 points. A point given for each fraction of a grade he raises his previous nine week grade (Ex: a "C" raised to a "C+ is one point, a "B" raised to an "A" is three points). The eight point level must only be reached for the first honor roll. For each of the following Achievement Honor Rolls, a student needs only a 6 point raise in his grades to be eligible.


OUTDOOR LABORATORY

Monterey

Vandalism has not stopped yet in the area despite the passing of the holloween week. Monterey was subjected to more damage last week, on Thursday and Friday nights, as package tape was used to close the Monterey Bridge. Packing tape also littered several road sides in the area.

Jim Zehner, Town Marshal in Monterey, said that investigation of these incidents, plus damage to the Sunoco Oil Company's Bulk Plant and the theft of the Indiana state flag from the V.F.W. Memorial in Monterey, was being hampered by the hodge-podge of law enforcement jurisdictions that affect Monterey and its surrounds.

For instance - the bridge damage and hazards to drivers must be corrected by the Pulaski County Road Department, Starke County and Pulaski County will both have road work to clean the litter, The State Police from both the Dunes Post in Chesterton for Pulaski County, and the South Bend Post for investigation involving Culver, where it is believed the vandals reside. Zehner, in addition to the problem of coordinating the jumble of assistance from other agencies, has his hands full as head of the street and sewer departments in Monterey. RESUME OF MEETING November 7, 1973

The Culver Community Schools Corporation Board of School Trustees met in regular session in the Central Office on November 7, 1973.

The Board continued its consideration of requests from parents who reside in the town of Culver to have their children transported by school bus to and from school. The Board unanimously determined that there would be no changes made in the bus transportation route setup for the balance of this school year. The Board will give further consideration to this re-

quest before next year's budget is prepared.

The Superintendent shared with the Board a letter which he had received from the director of railroad department of the Public Service Commission of Indiana, regarding the closing of certain crossings of the Erie Lackawanna Railroad, located in our school district. The Superintendent was directed to consult with the school attorney and follow the school attorney's advice on the course of action to be taken.

The Board gave consideration to the contract for superintendent Allen. After due consideration they agreed to extend a new three year contract to begin July 1, 1974.

Considerable attention to the responsibility of Public Law 217 was given by the Board.





JUNIOR SUNSHINE GIRLS LET THE SUN SHINE IN!


The Junior Sunshine Girls of Culver Community High School toured the community this past week, cleaning store windows that had been soaped by vandals during the recent holiday.

The girls did this as a goodwill gesture to the community without request or pay.




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CULVER PUPPETS
