president Walter Von Ehr to Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Overmyer, Mrs. Louise Von Ehr and Mr. Kenneth Shei.


The soloist of the evening was Miss Elizabeth Pinder, who presented some of her own works as well as others.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT DISCUSSED AT RECENT CHAMBER MEETING

The Culver Chamber of Commerce held its regular monthly meeting at noon on Tuesday, November, 13th at the Culver Inn.

After the invocation given by Rev. Earl W. Sharp, pastor of Culver Wesley United Methodist Church, Chamber president Robert Rust opened the meeting by introducing several guests in attendance. Reports were then made by the secretary and treasurer, and President Rust shared with Chamber members several communications he recently received regarding requests from the Indiana Department of Commerce concerning the availability of buildings in Culver for Industrial Plants and related matters.

After several committee reports were given, President Rust introduced the guest speaker for the afternoon, Mr. Phil Grebe, Assistant Director of the Industrial Division, Indiana Department of Commerce. Mr. Grebe's talk centered on the qualities a community such as Culver must have or cultivate in order to attract industry to the area. Several thoughtprovoking suggestions were made on how communities decide whether they want industrial expansion, what type of expansion would be most beneficial to the town, and how to make industry interested in locating in a particular community. Also explained by Mr. Grebe were several programs available to small communities through the Indiana Department of Commerce for the purpose of financing industrial expansion.

After a brief question-andanswer session, the meeting was adjourned. The next regular meeting of the Chamber of Commerce will be held December 11th, at which time election of 1974 Officers will take place.

Is there a need for a unit of the Indiana Association for Retarded Children for Marshall and Starke Counties? This question will be discussed November 26th at 8:00 p.m. EST at the Culver Eagles Lodge.

Dr. Jack Gruenenfelder, president of the IARC Board of Directors, and Mr. Frank Bell, Executive Director of the IARC, will be present to discuss the functions and formation of the ARC on national, state, and local levels. The meeting is open to all parents, friends and professionals working with or concerned for the mentally retarded.

The ARC promotes the welfare of the retarded through development of programs in their behalf; monitors existing serving systems to insure they meet the highest

standards of excellence; counsels and aids parents of the retarded; helps to develop better understanding of the problems of mental retardation in the community; encourages training and research on their behalf.

A local unit would directly unite the efforts in behalf of the children now attending public school special education classes, those served by the Marshall-Starke Development Center, and clients served by Marshall-Starke Adult Services.

SPORTS IN PUBLIC EDUCATION

The opening game of the Culver Community High School basketball team in Argos last weekend brought home a point which merits consideration today.

Despite a larger, heavier team on the other side, the Culver players, under their new head coach Ken Hass, carried themselves as gentlemen despite a heavy loss.

It is easy for a team to carry itself well in victory—it takes character to act like gentlemen, and to play good clean basketball in defeat.

Coach Hass and his men are to be congratulated this week for their ability to act like sportsmen despite the victory of the other team.

Inter-school sports are intended to build character and to constitute a part of an educational process. The actions of the team this past weekend prove our program meets this purpose. Perhaps now is the time to consider expansion of the public school athletic program so more students can participate and benefit from this experience.

OUR ERROR

Last week's editorial entitled "A Time Of Wonder" contained an error that should be corrected.

November 21, 1973

November 20, 1973

The Culver Jaycees will offer prizes for the best Christmas decorations this Christmas season, as a Jaycee community project. There will be two divisions: the business division and the home division.

Culver residents are again reminded that the Regional Blood Bank will visit Culver on Friday, December 6th at the Culver Community Building.

November 18, 1953

A group of nearly two dozen cadets returned to duty on the Culver Military Academy campus Sunday night at the close of the first Catholic weekend "retreat" at the Maryite Club on the South Shore of Lake Maxinkuckee.

November 24, 1943

The annual union Thanksgiving service will be held tonight in the Culver Methodist Church beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The Culver Indians beat Bremen there Friday night with a score of 38 to 23. In Saturday night's action, the Indians won a thriller from South Bend Riley with a tight score of 34 to 33.

November 22, 1933 The school bus driven by Robert Crump caught fire Thursday afternoon as he was returning the children to their homes, but the blaze was extinguished before the load was threatened.

Thirteen boys have joined the Culver Cub Pack in the past few weeks, according to E.R.Corwin, Cubmaster.

On Saturday, the first day of its opening sale, a large throng of people visited the new Ben Franklin 5c and 10c Store, of which Ben Oberlin is the proprietor.

November 21, 1923

Culver Grade Schools led all Marshall County Schools in attendance for the month of October with a percentage of 99.2.

A re-arrangement of the seating facilities at the High School Gymnasium is in progress this week which will accommodate about 700 people with seats and will provide a much larger space for standing room.

November 27, 1913

Don Cromley of Burr Oak has signed with the Middlesboro, Kentucky, baseball team to play the coming season.


Coach Anderson's Eighth Grade Varsity Team thrilled the large Culver rooting section by powering by Akron, 50-36. Fifteen of the


