OBITUARY

JESSE WARMBROD

Jesse George Warmbrod, 80, died at 11:15 a.m. Saturday at his home on Route 2 (West 19B Road), Culver, after being in failing health since 1957. A retired farmer, he was born December 27, 1893 in Pulaski County to Gottlieb and Lovina Warner Warmbrod.

He had lived in the Culver area since July of 1972, coming from Argos, where he resided 11 years after having lived in Kewanee and Winamac. Mr. Warmbrod was married November 12, 1919, in Pulaski County to Bertha Lollaugh, who survives. He was a member of the Argos Congregational Christian Church and the Marshall County Farm Bureau and the Gleaners. He was also a former officer of the Fulton County R.E.M.C.

Surviving with his wife are three sisters, Mrs. Mary Rock, Rochester, Mrs. Martha Rentschler, Buckeye, Arizona, and Mrs. Cora Peters, Winamac; and one brother, John, of Rochester. He was preceded in death by one daughter and four sisters.

Services were conducted at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Argos Congregational Christian Church, with Rev. Frank Valeriano, pastor, and Rev. L.C. Hall of Winamac officiating. Burial was in Reed cemetery, east of Winamac.

YOUR TELEVISION SET CAN SAVE YOUR LIFE

Next time you are advised that a tornado is approaching your area, turn on your television set. It may give you the fastest, most reliable warning you can get anywhere.

Not from announcers, though—from your screen. The United States Department of Agriculture advises that persons in an area where tornadoes are threatening transform their TV sets into a "tornado detection device" in the following manner:

FIRST: Warm up your TV set and tune in Channel 13. Darken the screen to almost black (use the brightness control).

SECOND: Turn to Channel 2 and leave the volume control down, unless an announcer is on the air who may be broadcasting information regarding an approaching storm.

Your tornado detector is now in operation. As a storm approaches, lightning will produce momentary white bands of varying widths across the screen (color sets produce a color band). A tornado within 15 to 20 miles will produce a totally white screen and remain white (color on color sets). Should this occur, turn off your TV set, take your portable radio with you and go to a place of shelter immediately.

This system was discovered by Newton Weller of West Des Moines, Iowa, after twelve years of study. It works because every TV set has Channel 2 set at 55 megacycles. Lightning and tornadoes generate a signal near this frequency which overrides the brightness control. Channel 13 is at the "high" end of the frequency band and is not affected. This is why the darkness must be set on that channel.

Keep a portable radio handy for emergency instructions and in case of power failure. Lightning will cause intermittent static on a radio

tuned to 550 kilocycles. A tornado will cause steady, continuous static.

Culver residents are reminded that a new tornado alert system is in effect. For details about the new system, please read the report of the recent Town Board Meeting on Page 6.







ROTC INSPECTION NEXT WEEK AT ACADEMY

Culver Military Academy, designated an honor military school since 1916, will undergo its annual government inspection by the 2nd ROTC Region on April 22-23. For the last three years Culver has been named an honor school "with distinction," a rating that designates the top 20 percent of the schools with Junior ROTC programs.

"The purpose of these inspections," explained Maj. Thomas J. Clark III, Culver's senior Army instructor, "is to insure that the cadets are receiving the required ROTC instruction and that this instruction is presented in accordance with prescribed standards."

The board will evaluate the Junior ROTC military science program at Culver, meet with cadet officers and the Academy's superintendent, inspect cadets in their rooms and in ranks and view exhibitions by the Infantry's Honor Guard, the Drill Team, the Lancer Platoon of the Black Horse Troop and the Artillery's Four-Gun Drill.

Through their inspection of classrooms, offices, facilities and cadet performance and appearance, the inspecting team will determine if Culver should be awarded the honor military school rating for the 58th straight year. As a result of its honor rating, Culver is allowed to nominate three students to each of the three service academies each year.

Town Board

FIRE CHIEF REPORTS NEW WARNING SYSTEM

At the regular meeting of the Culver Town Board Monday evening, Fire Chief Donovan Overmyer reported that a new warning system is in effect for approaching tornadoes. The signal will be a continuous three-minute blast on the town fire horn. The all-clear signal will consist of a thirty-second blast on the horn. Any person who sights a funnel cloud or tornado is asked to call the Culver Police Department to report it.

In other business before the Board, the painting of a center line down Lake Shore Drive and Main Street from S.R. 10 to the Cemetery south of town was approved by the Board. The Board also okayed the cleaning of town sewer lines for about 1 1/2 miles. It was noted that it has been years since they were cleaned. Cost of the project will be about \$1,500.

The Culver City Club and Maxinkuckee Junior Women's Club have donated several items of recreation equipment to the Town Park. The Culver City Club donated eight grills, and the Junior Women donated a set of toddler swings and a teeter-totter.

Ron Gleason, Union Township Trustee, presented a draft of a contract for cooperation between the Township and the Town of Culver for fire protection. Under the agreement, the Township shares half the operating costs of the Culver-Union Township Volunteer Fire Department, except for payments on the building housing

the department. The draft was submitted to the City Attorney for review.

It was reported that the cost of having all mercury-vapor type lamps in town with maintenance by NIPSCO would be \$2,335.20. The Board is continuing to discuss this situation, and no action has yet been taken.

SCHOOL BOARD HEARS NORTH SIDE PARENTS

Dr. Darrell Beach, representing the parents of children on the north side of Culver, presented the group's objections to a recent decision by the Culver Community School Board to end busing in that area of town at the Board's regular meeting Tuesday night.

Dr. Beach stressed the lack of sidewalks along the route children have to use to walk to school and the extreme danger of several intersections children would have to cross in objecting to the Board's action. He noted that the corner of Academy Road and Lake Shore Drive is extremely hazardous, with motorists often violating the four-way stop signs now posted there. Also cited by Dr. Beach was the curve on Lake Shore Drive at the A&W Root Beer Stand as being especially dangerous to all pedestrians.

Dr. Beach also mentioned that residents on the north end of town have a particularly heavy tax burden as a result of incorporation, and hoped that the Board would look beyond mere financial and conservation factors where the safety of children in that area of town were concerned. He noted that, while the Board was under no legal obligation to bus the children to school, he felt that the board had a moral obligation to protect the children of the area from the hazards brought about by heavy traffic and insufficient pedestrian facilities.

Dr. Beach suggested that a compromise might be reached in the form of a single collection point for the children affected along the route. The Board voted to take the matter under further consideration.

It was reported that music students do not pay extra fees for sheet music in the school music program. The junior high book rental fee and the senior band \$10 instrument fee covers all such expenses, unless the student wishes to purchase sheet music for personal use. Entry fees paid at solo and ensemble contests go toward defraying of the cost of judging, medals, and so on.

Superintendent Allen reported that a chemical suspected of corroding pipes in the cooling system at the High School power plant is no longer being used. Repairs of \$3,000 were necessary on the unit last fall when corrosion made the chilling system inoperable. There is a dispute over

the Corporation's responsibility for the cost of these repairs, since it is reported that the chemical involved at the time was experimental with the supplying company, and that the Corporation used the chemical in reliance on recommendations made by representatives of the supplying company.

The bus drivers who have been participating in a pool effort to reduce the use of buses as transportation to and from the drivers' homes asked the Board for a release from the pool for the balance of the school year. The extra time spent waiting for the pool is time needed by the farmers who participate in it for planting. The board agreed to release the drivers for the balance of the school year, but noted that if the pool shows to be a significant gas saver, that provisions for continuing it will become a part of next year's contract negotiations.

The Culver Bible Church requested permission to use the High School Auditorium June 7th, 8th, and 9th for a Youth Rally. The Rally will be held from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. each evening. The Board okayed the rally site with the provision that a custodian be on duty.

As a result of a meeting Tuesday afternoon between the principals of the junior high and high schools and Mr. Byfield and Mr. Moon of the Music Department with Mr. Allen, it was announced that Mr. Byfield will be located at the two Culver buildings on a full time basis next year, a vocal music instructor will be hired who will be located at the two Culver buildings, and Mr. Moon will be assigned to the Aubbeenaubee and Monterey Schools on a full-time basis. The junior bands of Aubbeenaubee and Monterey will continue to come to Culver two days a week for practice.

Ralph Osborn, chairman of the holding corporation, reported that that corporation would give financial assistance to the school corporation for completing the athletic field.

Mr. Allen distributed to the Board copies of a breakdown on bus repairs. Mr. Allen reported in response to a question from the floor that the lines for the new tennis courts were to be painted Tuesday or Wednesday of this week, and that the Corporation has been waiting six months for word on the posts to which the nets will be anchored. Mr. Allen promised that, if the posts did not arrive this weekend, efforts will be made to secure them elsewhere. He hoped to have the courts in operation before the end of the school year. It was reported that a group in Leiters Ford looked into the possibility of obtaining Revenue Sharing funds to build a community tennis court in that town, with the school

grounds as a possible location for the courts. No word has been received on that project to date.

The Board then adjourned to private session to discuss teacher contract negotiations with Mr. Miller. The public was excluded from this meeting. The next regular meeting of the School Board will be held May 7th in the Superintendent's Office. The Board will begin its summer schedule with that meeting, which will begin at 8:00 p.m.

MENTAL HEALTH CLINIC TO MEET TONIGHT

The Fourteenth Annual Dinner Meeting of the Five County Mental Health Clinic will be held at the American Legion Hall, Old Road 30 West, Columbia City, tonight, April 18th, at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Martin Meyer, Director of the Division on Planning and Evaluation, Indiana Department of Mental Health, will be the guest speaker and will discuss plans for the construction of a comprehensive mental health center in Warsaw.

The Five County Mental Health Clinic, located in Warsaw, serves the citizens of Huntington, Kosciusko, Marshall, Wabash and Whitley Counties. The Clinic has provided psychological and psychiatric services since it began operation on March 1, 1961. The Clinic is operated and the policies are determined by a Board of Directors consisting of five interested citizens from each participating county. Members from Marshall County are Mr. John C. White, Mr. Welcome Norris, Mrs. Mildred Hartford, Judge Tom Huff, and Mrs. W.H. Conger, all of Plymouth.

All interested persons are invited to attend this meeting. Reservations for the dinner can be made by calling a board member or by calling the Five County Mental Health Clinic in Warsaw. The telephone number is 267-7169. The cost of the dinner is \$3.50 per person.


