

## Council discusses former business properties

Culver's town council last week breezed through a brief meeting during which few votes took place.

Discussion, however, included two former business properties including the car wash at the corner of Ohio Street and Lake Shore Drive, about which council member Ed Pinder inquired. Town manager Jonathan Leist noted the business is in bankruptcy.

"They owe the town several hundred dollars for water service," he said, adding the owner of the building has been contacted and informed the town that the building is going through bankruptcy proceedings. Leist noted there had been a tax sale date posted on the door of the business, but the sale was canceled.

"It should have gone through by now," he added. Council member Jean Rakich suggested the property at the northwest corner of State Road 17 South and West Jefferson Street -- formerly the home of Boetsma Home Furnishings -- is "very, very unsightly" and is home to "twenty vehicles of all shapes and models."

Rakich noted the area is "one of our entries into town." Council president Ginny Munroe said building inspector Russ Mason will look into the situation.

It was noted, during Leist's town manager's report, that Marshall County is engaged in passing minimum standards for housing county-wide, something town attorney Jim Clevenger said would go to the county commissioners after May 21, with nothing likely passed until the last part of June.

Leist also explained he recently visited the town of Syracuse, Indiana, where he learned a separate non-profit organization had been formed to help raise funds for walking and biking trails there, something listed as a prominent goal for Culver in its recently-ratified comprehensive plan.

The council tabled a request from the Lake Max-

The marquee on Culver's movie theater (presently an unnamed entity, but located at 612 E. Lake Shore Drive) added to the many a tongue already wagging around town after a "sold" sign appeared on the building a few weeks prior, and led to much speculation as to the new owner(s) and especially as to the

future of the business, which dates back nearly 100 years in Culver.

One side of the marquee reads, "We will meet again," and the other, "Coming soon," cryptic messages which

## Kayak, SUP rentals, youth sailing lessons to kick off in the park

Culver's town park will see an array of new offerings launching in the coming weeks, with paddle board and kayak rentals (alongside various related activities) kicking off over the town beach's Memorial Day weekend opening, and kids' sailing lessons in the park beginning June 20.

This according to Ed Furry of Sail22, the Culver-based business behind the annual Lake Max Challenge national paddleboard race, which takes place this year over the June 26 weekend. Sail22 is handling the rental business, which will be located in the east end of the park. Sailing lessons are sponsored by the Maxinkuckee Yacht Club, though Furry (and wife Becky) has been instrumental in bringing them to fruition this year.

### Kayak, paddleboard rentals start this wk

Regarding rentals, Furry says that, as a company, Sail22 "felt the lake needed to be more accessible to more people, and (this will) bring more people into our town. We have such a great waterfront."

Furry says park superintendent Marc Hayden asked him last year about bringing kayak rentals to the park, in response to numerous requests from park patrons. The park board voted unanimously to allow Sail22 to launch a rental program, with the company providing a storage trailer for safe keeping of kayaks, paddleboards, and related

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## CRC awards facade grants to Culver businesses

The Culver Redevelopment Commission has accepted the application of several businesses to participate in its Facade Grant Program.

The CRC had previously allocated \$30,000 in matching funds with a maximum of \$10,000 per business. The intent of the grant was to encourage and aid business owners in enhancing and repairing their buildings.

The Lakehouse Grille (replace fax-brick front on old section), Brockey Insurance (replace front window panels), Cafe Max (change front entrance and entire front facade), Elizabeth's Garden (replace window panels), and Flea Market Chic (replace signage for entire building).

One other project is under consideration and CRC is in discussion with the building owner at this time, according to Kathy Clark of the CRC.

Upon completion of the project the CRC will review the improvements and award the grant money.

This is the first year of the Facade Grant program. The CRC intends to offer this matching grant on an annual basis, says Clark. Applications for the 2016 Facade Grant will be accepted in the spring of next year.

nonetheless surely inspire hope that Culver has not seen the end of its longtime cinema.

The present ownership of the theater, as of last month, became "Bob's Country Bunker LLC" (readers of some longevity of memory may recall the name is a reference to a fictional Kokomo, Ind. business in the 1980 movie, "The Blues Brothers"), and the local face of the venture is Joel Samuelson, who was a familiar presence at the theater during its latter years of functionality (more recently, Samuelson ran for Culver's town council last year, and has been visibly active as a leading force in the service-oriented Culver Beard Club).

Samuelson will be cleaning up space and short-listing needed repairs and renovations, including the broken

glass in the teaser poster area on the exterior of the building, it's noted.

That said, Samuelson emphasizes the endeavor is a work in progress, and while some movie-related use of the space is planned for the future, there's still a long road ahead before anyone might be munching popcorn in front of the big screen at the building.

"We are set on making sure everything is fixed and working before we open the doors so that we won't have to inconvenience anyone in the near future to shut down again to make more repairs," he says. "We hope to get it all done in one long, thorough rebuild and updating."

Samuelson calls the efforts in the works now just "step one on the road back."

However, he adds, "We are excited to be coming back and will try and keep the town posted on our progress. Mostly via social media and the Citizen."

The theater is hoped to provide programming to keep the town entertained (and hopefully edified) with a variety of entertainment and past-times, it's noted.

The theater saw its last regular film screenings in 2012, the same year then-owner Dan Bickel closed the nearby Edgewater Grille, which he also put up for sale. Bickel had taken over the theater in 2007, dubbing it the Uptown Cinema. the latest in a long line of names including Lakeside Cinema and, for perhaps the longest period of its existence, the El Rancho.

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## Richard Ford bust unveiled in Wabash

In a private ceremony on April 30, the Wabash High School Class of 1956 and some additional friends presented a public, permanent tribute to Richard Edwin Ford to provide the community with a tangible reminder of Ford's philanthropy, his generous support of the arts and his many friendships here and abroad.

Ford, who passed away in 2014, devoted much of his life to volunteerism and philanthropic endeavors throughout the world. While he lived in -- and devoted many of his philanthropic efforts to the Wabash community -- Ford had been a lifelong summer resident on Lake Maxinkuckee and supported a number of endeavors related to the lake, the town of Culver, and Culver Academeis.

A bronze bust of Richard Ford, executed by sculptor Will Clark of Fort Wayne, and commissioned by the members of the Wabash High School Class of 1956 and additional friends, has been placed on permanent display in the lobby



State Park in southern Indiana.

Ford supported a number of civic causes involving the arts, historic preservation and the humanities. His growing interest in historic preservation took him to various towns and cities in the United States and Europe where he

of Charley Creek Inn on West Market Street in Wabash. Clark, a former businessman, has won statewide recognition for his sculpting, including a prize-winning bust of Abraham Lincoln for the Lincoln

saw preservation efforts at work. He became involved in projects to save the city of Venice, Italy, from flooding and he was on the board of directors of the American Museum in Britain. In America, he served as president of the Council of the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

In Wabash, he took a keen interest in projects of the Honeywell Foundation including the restoration of the Olivette and Tower Rooms and maintaining the Honeywell House to the late Eugenia Honeywell's strict standards. He also was instrumental in the creation of the Wabash County Historical Museum and developed the Dr. James Ford Historic Home, a house museum dedicated to his great-grandfather.

The renovation of Charley Creek Inn was the last major, and possibly the most significant gift Ford made to his hometown. The Inn has sparked an influx of overnight visitors to Wabash, especially those attending events at the Ford Theater. The availability of first-class lodging and dining at the Inn has fostered fresh interest in the town and has spurred redevelopment of downtown businesses. A recent report in the Wall Street Journal featured the Inn and its contribution to Wabash's economic and cultural renaissance.

### 50 years ago: May 20, 1965

Double funeral services were held at the Easterday-Bonine Funeral Home in Culver for Samuel H. Schrimsher, 72, and his wife Mary, 58, who died May 12. Their death was a result of asphyxiation in their house trailer at Cook Lake near Plymouth where a faulty vent on a propane gas refrigerator caused the burner to use up all the oxygen in the trailer. A World War I veteran, Mr. Schrimsher served with the ROTC at Culver Military Academy for 28 years and was a charter member of the William A. Fleet Post of the American Legion in Culver.

The Culver Jaycees elected officers during their Thursday meeting at the State Exchange Bank lounge, including Roy Nocodemus, new president; Ron McKee, outgoing president; Bill Snyder, second vice-president; Lance Overmyer, director; Ron Tusing, treasurer; Latham Lawson, secretary; Bob Kline, first vice-president.

Karen DeWitt reports the Home Economics Dept. of Culver High School presented its annual style show May 11 at 8 p.m. in the gymnasium under the supervision of Mrs. Barbara Winters, Home Ec. teacher, and Mrs. Alice Wamsley, a student teacher from Manchester College.

Gifts contributed to the Academy in memory of Meg Marshall, senior co-ed who died March 10 (of leukemia), will be utilized for the Meg Marshall Memorial Book Fund. Money in the Meg Marshall Memorial Book Fund will be an endowment and the income each year will be used to purchase books.

David Gaskill of Bloomington, Ind., is the new advisor for the Culver Academy Vedette and Roll Call (yearbook) for next year. He will also edit the Messenger, the employee-faculty newspaper.

### 60 years ago: May 18, 1955

Thomas K. Walker has been elected new commander of the Culver American Legion Post.

Charles H. Faulkner, CHS senior, has been awarded an Indiana University scholarship.

The 50th annual CHS commencement will be held Fri-

day in the Culver Community Building, at which time William O. Osborn, president of the State Exchange Bank, will speak to 39 graduates, their families, and friends.

### 80 years ago: May 15, 1935

Thirty-two seniors will leave Monday morning for their much-anticipated six-day trip to Washington, DC, and other points of historical interest.

There will be 44 members of the CHS senior class to receive diplomas at commencement exercises.

Harold Robinson and Gordon Caltice have leased the Linco Service Station, effective May 7.

George Babcock has been awarded the sterling silver medal by the basketball team of 1914 for the player making the best free-throw average during the season.

### 90 years ago: May 18, 1925

Fire totally destroyed the Mt. Hope school house Sunday at 10 p.m.

All hopes were given up yesterday morning for the life of Tom Dorrah, 37, who yesterday went to the bottom of Lake Maxinkuckee after the overturning of the canoe in which he and his partner, Clarence Fields, were riding.

Culver will have village delivery of mail on and after Sept. 1, 1925.

### 100 years ago: May 20, 1915

Mrs. J. H. Scheuerman killed a blue racer (snake), 53 inches long, in her back yard last week and O.A. Gandy killed a two-foot rattler in O'Connor's woods.

Will Hayes is erecting an open air pavilion in the rear of teh building which he will occupy as a soft drink resort.

The Culver Military Academy *Vedette* newspaper was full of news of "Camp Woodrow Wilson," a training camp established with approval of the State of Indiana and Marshall County, to help train high school boys across the region in preparedness given the state of war in which the world found itself at the time. Hundreds of high school boys turned out for training by faculty, staff, and cadets

of CMA.

### 110 years ago: May 18, 1905

A splendid program for the Maxinkuckee Assembly is almost complete in every detail, according to new general manager Mr. H.G. Hill. Among national attractions this season will be Prof. Reno B. Welbourn, Wizard of Electricity; Prof. Frank Regan will give three chalk talk lectures; Samuel Sellers with his moving pictures will be on the grounds (editor's note: the Maxinkuckee Assembly chautauqua camp occupied the space south of Davis Street and east of Main Street on the south side of Culver, starting in 1899. The 1905 season turned out to be its last).

In a fast and snappy game, the Culver Greens lost to the Bremen Blue Sox 5-2. The next game is with Haschel's Colts at Monterey. A little stronger stick would make our team much better.

"Until July 1st, 1905, only, I will offer five desirable lots in my addition to Long Point, at \$6.00 per front foot. These lots have fifty-foot fronts on Lake Maxinkuckee and vary from 125 to 200 feet in depth. All lots have fine, clean beach, with gravely bottom. For particulars, call or address S.S. Chadwick, Culver, Indiana."


## Culver grad, 1897 style

LEFT: With graduation exercises for Culver Community Schools and Culver Academies on the horizon next weekend, we journey back to April 2, 1897, for the closing exercises of the Culver City Schools, whose program front cover is seen AT LEFT.

The event took place at the Colonnade hotel, across today's Lake Shore Drive from the then-train station in Vandalia Park. Teachers that year had been Harriett Miller, William Matthew, Edith Scheuerman, and Minnie Cox.

Note the much earlier date of school closing than in the years since, based as it was largely on the agricultural scheduling needs of area farmers.

While a complete roster of graduates wasn't included, it's likely the slate of performers (whose performances ranged from songs to recitals to a scene from Shakespeare!) on the program included many members of the class. They were Maud Gandy, Chauncy Garn, Ernest Zechiel, Maud Koontz, Sadie Korp, Mabel Duddleson, Edna Hayes, Daisy Voreis, and Homer Nearpass -- which reflects the small class sizes common at the time. Not all, however, were graduating seniors, as some names appear in the 1899 Commencement program, which by that year included all 11 township districts in addition to Culver City's School (that event was held in the Maxinkuckee Village's Christian Church on May 11, 1899).



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
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## Park board votes to promote reduced student beach passes, sets lifeguard hours

The Culver parks and recreation board will offer heavily discounted beach passes to Culver Community Schools students at the school itself through May, according to a vote taken during the park board's meeting last week. The board voted 6-0 to facilitate beach passes for students at the reduced rate of \$10 per pass, with board member Tom Kearns slated to go before the school board this week to help facilitate offering the passes at the Culver Community High School in order to encourage more youth use at the beach this summer, according to park superintendent Marc Hayden.

The board also approved summer beach hours for lifeguards as Sunday through Thursday from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m., with a 10 minute break to be observed every hour. Also during the meeting, park board president John Helphrey updated the public regarding the progress of the park's boat rental slip pier installation, reporting that there have been various delays with the process, though work continues. B and C piers have been completed and A pier

has yet to be completed, noted Helphrey. The situation is being monitored with safety being the priority along with opening the beach in a timely manner, he said. The board passed, with a 5-0 vote and one abstention, to spend up to \$5,500 to have 10 trees removed and 10 tress trimmed per the Culver tree commission's recommendation. A plan to replace trees will be addressed in the fall. Passed by a 4-2 vote was the decision to no longer allow any type of signage to be placed on the park fencing along Lake Shore Drive. The current group which had previously made arrangements will be allowed to post their sign for an upcoming event. It was noted that the band Sandbar Bums will perform for free to the public on August 7 from 7-10 p.m. in the park, in cooperation with the Lake Max Triathlon, which launches from Lake Maxinkuckee. Other board votes included the transfer of the 2006 Skag mower asset to the Culver's Street Department; allowing Hayden to purchase various mats for future exercise class-

es to be held at the park (not to exceed \$500); committing to being part of the town's and park's five-year Master Action Plan for various community improvements. During the meeting it was also noted that NIPSCO refunded \$825 to the park through a grant process in response to its upgrade of HVAC systems throughout the beach lodge building. The \$25,100 for the sale of the floating pier inventory has been received and will be used in the 2016 Park Department budget, it was noted. Necessary concrete repairs on various park sidewalks will be addressed as soon as a contractor can be hired. The board planned to meet in Executive Session on Sunday, May 17 to discuss a legal matter, and set a June 1 work session at 6 p.m., as well as the next regular park board meeting to be held Monday, June 8, at the beach lodge.

## Academies' Rank & Promotion System supports teachers in becoming their personal best

At the very heart of the Culver Academies' student's experience you will find the student-teacher relationship. Teachers are engaging their students in the classrooms, on the fields, in the dorms and barracks, and in the dining hall among many other locations. Over the past few years, Culver has been engaging its administrators and faculty chairs in a well-organized and labor-intensive effort to craft an evaluation and promotion system that provides opportunities for each teacher to become their personal

best. Culver administrators first looked at what other independent schools were doing in the area of teacher evaluation. "We didn't see independent schools who had anything like what we were looking for," said Dean of Faculty Kathy Lintner. So, administrators had to start from scratch. During the 2009-2010 school year, they gathered all the academic department chairs. "We all felt like writers of the Declaration of Independence," Lintner remembered. "It needed to be very clear."

What they created was a Faculty Rank & Promotion (R&P) System that would serve many purposes, not the least of which aids in recruiting new faculty. R&P was initiated for use in the promotion process for the 2011-2012 school year. "Observations are an important piece of the process," said Dr. John Yeager, director of Culver's Center for Character Excellence. Teachers are observed and given feedback by their supervisors, col-

many can enjoy even if their youthful peak may be past with regards to other athletic activities. The MYC's Junior Fleet program is nothing new, and Furry notes the club has been "lucky the Campbell family let us use their property to run (it), but it's a private residence at the south end of the lake, and there's no exposure. I thought a long time ago we should see if we could work with the park." Furry says two boats more "friendly" to inexperienced and/or youth use were purchased ("When they're tipped over, water doesn't stay in them, and they're a lot stronger and lightweight," he notes) as demo models to show their capability. Meanwhile, the MYC made the decision formally to pursue shifting its youth program to the town park, with superintendent Hayden proving "really easy to work with (and seeking) more activities at the park," according to Furry. The club voted to allocate money to buy more boats -- ten in all, to date -- with plans to engage in some fundraising to continue the program as needed. The park board voted to allow the program at the park, with this year's lessons launching a five-year contract between the not-for-profit MYC and the town park. If any child's parents are MYC members, lessons are free for the summer. If not, the entire six-week course is \$20, explains Furry.

Lessons will begin Saturday morning, June 20, and will be 90 minutes per session. "The idea is to have it open and welcoming to anybody," Furry says. "The ideal situation would be that you come to every single week, but we're not going to turn anybody away." The Maxinkuckee Yacht Club hopes to involve any and all kids in the area, and is committed to sponsoring two kids to start with, and Furry says multiple club members have offered to sponsor as many as are necessary. The Furrys themselves will donate their personal boat for use if numbers demand it, and the MYC has a handful of older models to employ if need be. "The big reason why we wanted to do this is the love of the water, but also to get more kids into the water (via the sailing lessons) and enjoying working during the summer (in the case of paddleboard and kayak rentals). The MYC's first cocktail party of the season is slated for June 13, says Furry, and a couple of demo boats prepared for the junior fleet lessons will be rugged onshore, with kids demonstrating them as a precursor to the start of the program. inkuckee Environmental Council that the town help pay the \$4,000 annual fee the State of Indiana's Dept. of Natural Resources will be dropping as of Oct. 1, which funds a water level gauge on Lake Maxinkuckee. The gauge, he said, has been on the lake as far back as the 1880s and has been used extensively concerning drought and other data. The council approved a request by Ruth Allman of the Culver EMS for \$2,550.28 to repair its first-out ambulance. Allman also noted May 17 through 23 is National EMS Week. Allman also said Brandon Cooper will lead an emergency vehicles operations course June 26 and 27 for all employees of Culver's ambulance service, followed by a course open to members of outside departments. Also council approved was a request by fire chief Terry

Wakefield for \$1,086.83 towards parts for one fire trucks pump. Approved was town clerk Karen Heim's request for forgiveness of a sewer bill for a Culver property at which a water leak garnered a \$720.75 bill. Attorney Clevenger said a special meeting in mid-June may be necessary to meet requirements for a new timetable for the town's water plant replacement project, needed due to revised dates for opening bids for the project. The State Revolving Fund's fiscal year ends June 30, said Clevenger, so there's no guarantee of loan funds for the project after that date if it's not closed. Audience member Bill Clevenger said he and Culver-based Marshall County commissioner Bill Githens recently attended a meeting of the Organization of Indiana

Counties at which discussion took place to the effect that Culver would be a natural benefactor of a tax on food and beverages now allowed by the State of Indiana. "It's going to hit the guy that goes to Subway for a donut," said Clevenger of the tax, should it be assigned, "but it's also going to hit the guy that buys the \$23 lamb chop (in Culver)." A special session of the council was scheduled for 4 p.m. on Thursday, May 21 at the town hall to open bids for the water treatment plant project. The meeting was rescheduled from April 30. A council session was also scheduled for 10 a.m., Wednesday, May 20, to gather information on the feasibility of tax credit rental properties in Culver.



#### Neer places at UCLA event

Los Angeles, Cal. -- The Oregon Duck's Women's Track and Field team won their seventh consecutive PAC 12 title in dramatic fashion at UCLA on Sunday night. Before the meet began, forecasters predicted a tight contest between Oregon and USC. However, Oregon's top sprinter Jenna Prandini, who is also the nations top sprinter and long jumper, was sidelined with an injury.

On Saturday night, team captain Waverly Neer, a Culver Girls Academy graduate placed second in the 10,000 meters in her debut at that distance, with a time of 34:03.6 (5:29 per mile pace for 6.2 miles) Teammates Molly Grabil and Maggie Schmaedick placed fourth and sixth. USC battled back in the sprint events to actually take the lead late into the meet. To offset Jenna Prandini's injury, Waverly, Molly and Maggie were called on to race again in the 5000 meters on Sunday night in order to garnish precious points for the Ducks. They finished fifth, sixth and seventh to score nine points and surge ahead of USC by six points heading in the final event, the 4x400 meter relay. USC won the relay and Oregon placed second to give the Ducks the team title 185-182.

leagues in their departments, and also teachers from other departments.

Assistant Dean of Faculty Josh Pretzer said the system “centers on the idea of being colleagues. We have asked people to teach each other – to observe and be observed.

“The teacher is really in the driver’s seat of the process overall. They set goals, write reflections, and take feedback from observations,” he said.

Yeager added, “It frees people up to share the best of who they are. Their portfolio is (available for others to read). (It is) totally different than how others have done it in the past.” He shared this quote:

Professional feedback is ongoing, with a comprehensive evaluation taking place annually. Annual performance reviews include conversations with and observations from a cohort of colleagues. This is necessary in order to discuss a teacher’s performance in four areas of focus: modeling Culver’s mission, teaching and learning, cultivation of character, and professional growth.

“It calls for a lot of self-awareness,” Yeager said. “It allows for people to tell the truth on themselves. They need to reflect and stop. It allows them to become aware of any blind spots they might have . . . They have to be willing to re-consider. We want teachers to be life-long learners and critical thinkers.”

The term growth mindset is utilized throughout the R&P. It was coined by the research of Carol Dweck of Stanford University. Lintner said, “(With a) growth mindset, you see that there are many possibilities in a given circumstance. (With a) fixed mindset, (you) interpret circumstances in a limited way. . . . With a growth mindset, you need to be able to ask for advice.”

It can be challenging for experienced teachers to adapt to the new system, Yeager said, referring to a passage from a book he co-authored:

Teachers have been given new guidelines regarding how to grow as teachers at Culver. The department chairs also changed the terms used to describe the teaching career stages. As the teacher’s understanding of teaching deepens, they can progress through the levels of instructor, senior instructor, master instructor, and mentor instructor.

“For the first four or five years, the academic piece gets worked out for that teacher – learning the Culver culture and how to really master (the) classroom. After that, we look at a broader commitment outside the school,” Lintner said.

Each level that a teacher reaches is tied to a fixed raise

in salary. This is a unique part of the rank and promotion system and would not be possible without the generosity of the late Frank Batten ’45. Lintner said endowed funds raised during the By Example Campaign “allowed us to actually provide funding for the rank and promotion system the way we intended it. Frank Batten matched dollar for dollar for that campaign.”

Lintner added that one of Head of Schools John Buxton’s goals when he came in 1999 was that teachers could work here for their entire career, receive pay comparable to other professions, and retire with a six-figure salary.

“(Teachers at Culver can know that they) can have a steady career and end up making as much money as an administrator,” Pretzer said. “I hope that young teachers will be encouraged to see that they can grow and stay teachers. (They) can do what they love – teaching – and end up making a six-figure salary, and that is unique to us I think.”

Lintner said the R&P is a blueprint for the teacher’s professional career. “It has changed our hiring, too.”

of great teacher.”  
“The end goal for R&P is not solely on an individual teacher’s career path but also about creating a teaching and learning culture in which collegiality is both a cause and a consequence of individual growth mindsets,” said Academic Dean Kevin MacNeil.

Administrative faculty also have been sharing Culver’s teacher professional evaluation process with other independent school entities. Pretzer said that he is getting a lot of questions from other independent schools regarding Culver’s process.

As with any new system applied in an educational setting, this one needs to be able to be evaluated and altered as needed. “The group of chairs designed it, and they are responsible for revisiting it, (the) tuning work to make it better,” Pretzer said.

“(The R&P) is an incredible amount of work and is continually morphing,” Yeager added.

Clearly, the students benefit from their teachers’ professional growth.

“Students benefit because you have an engaged teacher,” Yeager said. “When class starts every day, (the

teacher is) ready to facilitate, grow with, and learn with the students. They are not there to teach from the pulpit.

“You have to have a variety of activities. Teachers need to be mindful and in the present moment with students and in their own classroom. A teacher is challenged in each classroom to find a strategy that will work. They can reach out to others with questions. Sometimes, they ask the students, ‘How are we going to make this work?’” he said.

How are we going to make this work for Culver? This is the question that the department chairs must have asked themselves in order to get the new R&P system up and running. It is the question that they must continue to ask themselves as they fine-tune and implement this system over time. It is the question that teachers can reflect upon more and more in the classrooms, on the fields, and in all of their interactions with students, knowing that growth is what comes from asking the question.

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
