CRC announces new façade grant opportunities

The Culver Redevelopment Commission is ready for the 2016 façade grant application process. The first round of applications (which can be found at town hall) are due in to Tom Yuhas, CRC, Town Hall, 200 East Washington St., Culver, IN 46511 no later than March 1. Grants will be awarded on April 1. If the full \$30,000 is not awarded during this time, a second grant round will be held with those applications being due by August 1 and awards given by September 1. All grant projects that are awarded in 2016 must be started within 90 days of award date. All grant projects must be completed and submitted for reimbursement within

Culver council votes in sweeping **CRC** changes

Culver's town council last week made its way through a number of items of business, though arguably its most impactful actions related to appointing new members of local boards and commissions.

Perhaps the most significant change was in the makeup of the Culver Redevelopment Commission, which for the past few years has operated with Kathy Clark taking a leading role. During that period, one of intense activity, CRC activities have ranged from streetscapes and street lighting to storm water replacement on Lake Shore Drive; assisting the town in funding costs related to its municipal water projects to granting funds to local business for facade improvement, to creating commercials promoting Culver as a tourist destination.

The CRC is allowed by law to utilize TIF (Tax Increment Financing) dollars for local projects deemed beneficial to local businesses within the TIFF district.

At the Jan. 26 council meeting, Ginny Munroe -- reelected president earlier in the meeting during the council's reorganization, with Sally Ricciardi re-elected as vice president -- read a long list of individuals who submitted letters to fill the seats made open at the beginning of the year. These included Clark herself, fellow 2015 CRC members Rich West, Tom Yuhas, and Brandon Cooper; William Cleavenger, Bill Githens, Brandy Pohl, and council members Dave Beggs, Sally Ricciardi and Tammy Shaffer.

Munroe explained three CRC appointees are the decision of the council president with two more under the jurisdiction of the council as a whole, and a non-voting member is appointed by the Culver Com-See Council page 3 munity School board. Munroe,

Culver Lions honor Stevens, Blessings leaders By Jeff Kenney grown children and severage efforts to assist studen

A decades-old tradition continued last week with the honoring of the Citizen of the Year (this year's being Culver Elementary School social worker Deb Stevens) and Organization of the Year (Culver's Blessings in a Backpack) by the Culver Lions Club at a gala dinner and awards ceremony at the club's train station - depot on Lake Shore

Drive Jan. 27. The awards portion of the event began with Lion Jim Harper introduced Stevens, with whom he said he began to collaborate in 2007. Stevens' service, however, goes back more than three decades, said Harper, who described Stevens' reputation as being "kind, very considerate, (willing to) work hard to accomplish a task that has been set before (her)," and engaging in those tasks with love.

Harper, who also noted Stevens is married with eral grandchildren, said the Culver Home Makers began collecting backpacks and other school supplies for children in need starting in 2001, with Stevens handling distribution of donated items to the children. In 2007, the Lions Club was asked to take over the col-

lecting effort. With the birth of the "Gift of Warmth" (which donates winter wear and heating bill funds collected at the Lake Film Fest) in 2008, more work was added to Stevens' plate, with the social worker "exceeding expectations" in the endeavor.

Stevens, added Harper, is "loved by the students, in the school, the teachers (she works) with, the parents (she) councils, and all members of the public that try to give aid through the school system.'

In thanking the club for the award, Stevens said, "You're giving this to the wrong person," explaining

a collaboration between the teachers, staff, and administration in addition to Stevens herself, and likening the work to a group of chefs creating a soup together.

"Whether it's family or a bar crowd I want everyone to walk in and feel like a regular, even if it's their first time."

Anderson implemented daily food specials including Wings Wednesdays with 70-cent bone- in wings and 60 cent boneless wings. The business is ramping up its "Pub Mondays," which see the restaurant and pub open from 5 p.m. through midnight, aimed at offering the community more Monday evening dining options.

As food allergies because more prevent, Culver Wings and Pizza continues to provide a gluten-free pizza option. Anderson is looking into offering gluten free wraps and sandwich bread.

Delivery to a customer's door is available during all hours of operation. The restaurant continues to grow its catering business as well.

We will deliver any quality of food. We want to market for larger parties. With two other restaurants shutting down, we need to excel in that area consistently," explained Anderson.



The restaurant is also expanding its community involvement, continuing to be an active member of the Culver Chamber of Commerce and sponsoring local events. Culver Wings and Pizza partners with Culver Community Schools basketball team to do pizza half-time shows where audience members can shoot baskets for gift certificates for pizza. The business has also donated food to children's activities at the Culver Union-Township Public Library as well as the polar plunge event sponsored by the Culver Beard Club.

There are about ten employees at Culver Wings and Pizza overseen by Anderson, the majority being high school students attending Culver Community High School.

"The younger staff that work here are great," said Anderson. " I could not ask for a better staff they are loyal and good hard working. We have a great senior staff also; they have all worked for John (Zehner) for six to eleven years. That helps to fill in for the experience gap.'

Coming soon to Culver Wings and Pizza is also an

Culver Wings and Pizza is open Mondays from 5 to midnight, Tuesdat through Thursday from 4 to 9 p.m., and Friday through Sunday from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m.



who said she was "well aware of the accomplishments of the 2015 (CRC) board," added she had been considering the matter of new appointments throughout the day and whether to have council representation on its board.

Munroe reappointed Yuhas, with new appointments for Shaffer and Beggs.

"I hope there will be a lot of communication with the council," she said.

Beggs himself moved to reappoint Cooper to one council-appointed CRC post (with the council approving), and Githens to another. Shaffer commented that Githens' experience on the Marshall County council could be an asset in his CRC post (Samuelson and Munroe both abstained in the vote regarding Githens).

The council also discussed the challenges of filling spots on politically balanced boards within the community, particularly given the lack of Democrats residing within Culver. Munroe noted that Shaffer, a Democrat, left a vacant seat on the Culver park board when she was elected to the council, but that so far no registered Democrats had submitted letters of interest to fill the post.

Instead, Republican Dana Neer and independent Jeffrey Payne submitted letters, and town attorney Jim Clevenger suggested Payne's nomination as the best means of attaining political balance (as opposed to appointing another Republican to a board with several already serving). Park board member Rhonda Reinhold and some council

members expressed a desire to appoint Neer, who they said is active at the park and in the community, and has worked alongside the board in the past, though in the end the council followed Clevenger's recommendation. Munroe noted the Union Township board had also reap-

pointed park board member Bob Osborn and the school board reappointed Tom Kearns to the same board. The council's Republican appointment, John Helphrey, is still

To the Culver plan commission were reappointed Margaret Dehne (by Munroe as president) and Pete Peterson (by the council as a whole). Munroe also reappointed Dan Adams to the Culver Board of Zoning Appeals, noting Barbara Winters did not wish to be reappointed to her position on the BZA.

Other actions, discussion

In other council actions, the new Culver building permit fee schedule saw its final approval, with an effective date of May 4.

Invoices relating to ongoing municipal water projects were approved for payment, including \$322,526.10 to Michiana Contracting, \$35,574 to Phoenix Fabricators, \$3,400 to Midwest Engineers, and \$20,718.30 for a resident project representative at the site.

A representative of Midwest Engineers reported the storm water project on Lake Shore Drive, which had been delayed in the wake of inclement weather and holidays, is back in progress. Temperatures will need to rise before masonry work can be completed at the new water plant on Ohio Street, it was noted.

Discussed was renewal of the town's contract for curbside, town-wide trash and recycling pickup with Republic Services, represented at the meeting by Bob Stone. Town manager Jonathan Leist explained the new contract will be in effect for three years and will continue service at the same price.

Several positive comments regarding the service came from audience members, including Tony Zurbrugg's comment that town-wide service had solved the longstanding problem of weekend visitors to Culver dumping trash in business-owned trash receptacles, and Margaret Dehne's appreciation that Republic employees replace her trash tote to its original location when significant snowfall makes it difficult for her to do so.

Approved was a resolution between the town and the owners of the Forest Place senior apartments in which an easement will be granted to the town to run a 320-foot storm water drain pipe to the former site of Culver's Dairy Queen on State Road 10, in exchange for cleaning and jetting of the site's private lines, which would also be hooked into the town's system.

Leist updated the council that quotes for professional

snow removal in Culver's commercial district had been solicit, but recent information revealed the CRC could not fund such an endeavor as had been previously assumed. The matter will be discussed in a council work session Feb.. 9.

The council approved renewal of the town's sewer forgiveness policy, which allows a one-time forgiveness (if requested) of a property owner's sewer fees in cases when a leak or other anomaly caused a significant amount of town water not to drain into the town's system.

Also approved was \$3,166.20 for a renewed service contract between Culver's EMS and Physio Controls for maintenance on the town's cardiac monitors, as requested by EMS director Kathy Hart. Requested by town clerk Karen Heim, and approved

by council were \$6,358 for an audit last year relating to Culver's utilities; \$1,416 for a concrete pad poured at the street department property's debris pit (which should improve the odor there); and \$907 for the annual maintenance contract for the town's photocopier.

Heim noted residents' utility bills will have a different look next month, and that email billing will be available (those interested should call the town hall).

Attorney Clevenger reported Trent Bennett of Culver has filed a petition for judicial review in court after the Culver BZA turned down his appeal regarding construction of a burning pit on an adjacent lot to his property.

In response to a query from Zurbrugg in the audience, Leist and Munroe said a planned sidewalk program for Academy Road and College Avenue in Culver, hopefully funded via Safe Routes to School money, is probably a year or two away. The town was informed it was possible its 20 percent matching funds requirement could be waived if the town waited an extra year to move forward with the project.

It was also noted sidewalks would be created on the south side only of Academy Road, but on alternating sides of College Ave., depending upon specifics of each block.

the community, from which grew the Blessings endeavor, a local offshoot of a national program which places bags of nutritious food in the hands of local school children to ensure they're healthily fed over the weekend when school breakfasts and lunches are unavailable. More than 80 Culver Elementary students are served by the program, with Stevens overseeing the choice of recipients.

Johnson noted the logistics of serving students in four counties are a challenge, but described the evolution of the national Blessings program -- which serves over 89 millions children -- from incorporation in 2003 to nonprofit status eight years later.

Johnson also credited Stevens, principal Erin, and former Culver Comm. Schools superintendent Dr. Vicki Mc-Guire for supporting the introduction of the program into the school. She also emphasized volunteers do not know who the receiving children are, but have been told of the specific neediness of some of those children.

Hall added that organizers add small notes of encouragement for the children, some of whom receive little such positive affirmation outside their teachers and Blessings packers.

Hall and Johnson said assistance in packing is always welcome, with packing scheduled monthly on Mondays at 4 p.m. at the Culver Bible Church on Main Street.

Johnson explained the organization locally made about 6,000 on the Fall fun run (the brainchild of Fox as well as student service organizers Nancy and Brenda Sheldon), but hopes to become a regular fixture in the giving schedules of local organizations.

Fox, said Hall, designs a nutrition-conscious menu for the packs which includes milk, trail mix, soup, spaghetti rings, tuna, raisins, peanut butter crackers, cups of fruit, and other items.

Past packing volunteers have included Culver Comm. High School cheerleaders, the Culver Girls Academy hockey team, and employees from manufacturing in Culver, among others. Culver Elementary teacher Mike Elliott picks up the packed bags to deliver to the school each Thursday night, said Johnson. The cost is between \$2.20 and \$2.60 per child per weekend.

Homemade housekeeping

Note to readers: I wrote a version of this column back in 2009 when I first started using homemade cleaning products. I've been using them ever since — the same reci-

pes I've included here. I get a lot of requests for these recipes, so here they are again, just in time for Groundhog Day.

Marketing messages for today's household cleaning products suggest that the only good

germ is a dead germ, but the average American home does not need to be as sterilized as the Centers For Disease Control. In fact, those popular antibacterial cleaners not only cost more, but they tend to kill all the bacteria they touch, even the beneficial bacteria that help prevent dis-

When you clean house, go back to the basics. Homemade cleaners are cheap and work just as well as the store brands, using tried and true ingredients such as vinegar, baking soda, borax, rubbing alcohol and olive oil. An added bonus: you can use them without donning a Haz-Mat suit.

Most homemade cleaning products are very simple, requiring between one and three ingredients. Undiluted white vinegar, for instance, works magnificently on its own: for instance, I can use it for a fabric softener, to clean the toilet bowl, to remove scale from my shower head and to remove mildew. Baking soda is also effective by itself to scour sinks, help unclog slow drains. Here are two recipes I like to use:

Recipe for an All-Purpose Cleaner

Mix in a spray bottle: 1/2 cup of white vinegar and 1/4 cup of baking soda (or 2 teaspoons borax) plus a 1/2 gallon of water. Use for showers, chrome, windows, mirrors, and other surfaces. (Source: www.eartheasy.com)

Recipe for a Homemade Glass Cleaner

Mix in a spray bottle: 1 cup of rubbing alcohol, 1 cup of water, and 1 tablespoon of white vinegar. (Source: organizedhome.com).

If you have a high-efficiency clothes washer, consider making your own detergent. I have used my own detergent for years without a problem with mildew or build-up in the machine. Ingredients

1 bar (or 4.5 ounces) shaved bar soap (a homemade laundry bar, Dr. Bronner's, Kirk's Castile Soap, Ivory, ZOTE, or Fels-Naptha)

1cup borax

1 cup washing soda

Directions: Thoroughly stir together for several minutes. Take this a step further and blend the mixture in a blender or food processor to create a powder that will dissolve easily even in cold water. Store in a sealed container with a small scoop.

To Use: Use 1 Tbsp per small load (or 2-3 Tbsp for large or heavily soiled loads) and remove odors in the re-

Starting a new habit takes time and a little work up front. To make room in my utility closet for homemade cleaners, I had to dispose of my old ones. Since some commercial cleaning products do contain toxic materials, I didn't want to pitch them. Landfills and local watersheds are no place for these substances. The Marshall County Solid Waste website (www.myrecycledepot.org) has a convenient guide to safe disposal of household chemicals. Marshall County residents can bring their household hazardous waste to the Recycle Depot for disposal.

Every once in a while, a nasty cleaning job necessitates a powerful commercial cleaning product. Be smart and buy only the amount you need so you can use it up. But for everyday cleaning, it's healthier to keep your cleaners non-toxic. It feels empowering to say "no" to cleaning products that come with a heavy cost for my family and for the planet.







MCEDC meeting aims to bring Culver into county-wide economic development discussion

The Marshall County Economic Development Corporation played host to a "town hall" style meeting at the Culver Cove Jan. 25.

Kevin Berger, Culver's representative to the MCEDC, reported on the meeting on his blog at easterdayconstruction.com/ blog, describing the event as well attended and going "quite well."

Present were two county council representatives, one county commissioner. and four Culver town council members, as well as three members of the Culver Redevelopment Commission, along with citizens from Culver and Union Township.

Jerry Chavez, President of the MCEDC, led a group discussion on the needs of the county, both in the area of economic development and the deterioration of county roads, said Berger. Handouts were provided showing the an increase in paving costs of 98 perecent since 2003 while highway funds have actually decreased. The Local Option Highway User Tax (LOHUT) was discussed. Chavez said the State of Indiana is giving counties the tools to handle their problems themselves, but that Marshall County "(needs) to use them."

Chavez also noted that the state was considering matching county LOHUT funds, meaning, said Berger, "if we don't have the LOHUT in place, we will

The second funding mechanism to be considered is a County Economic Development Income Tax (CEDIT). One graphic in the handout showed that Marshall County is completely surrounded by counties that currently em-

Everyone working in Marshall County from outside the county pays CEDIT back to their county, and the same goes for those who live in Marshall County and work in a surrounding county. If Marshall County had CEDIT in place, said Roger Umbaugh, Chairman of the MCEDC board, it would capture some of these funds that are already being paid.

Umbaugh also noted that CEDIT is an earned income tax. It would not affect retirees. Again, according to the handout, "Approximately 84 percent of Indiana Counties implement CEDIT to generate the necessary funding for the economic development strategies," reported Berger. Umbaugh said MCDEC

is advocating to control the funds, if they come to be. As a not for profit with representation from the county and all the municipalities, and an independent agency outside the government, the MCDEC can react quickly, said Umbaugh, and can provide emergency funding without dozens of meetings dictated by gov-

ernment. It can also pay over market value for property if MCDEC thinks it would benefit its strategy. The MCDEC can also loan money, among other facets of its flexibility.

Chavez also briefly discussed the Regional Cities Initiative and Marshall County's position in one of the regions receiving an award. The \$42 million dollars to be awarded to the region represents a 20 percent match on projects, he said, adding that another 20 percent can come from local government and the remaining 60 percent must come from private sources.

Kathy Clark, Executive Director of the Lake Maxinkuckee Environmental Council, asked if in-kind donations such as use of land would be considered in the match, with Umbaugh responding it was too early to know all of the fine details, but he would find out.

Questions came in from other attendees wanting to know more about specific problems in Culver, reported Berger, but Chavez said MCDEC is working on broad plans and strat-egies that will affect the county as a whole, and that many of the smaller problems mentioned, while not directly targeted, will see an indirect positive effect. Chavez said the problems in Culver are not unique but are shared by the other communities in Marshall County as well.


